MSO Returns to FSU for a Performance Featuring Three Romantic-Era Masterworks

CES at FSU will present the Maryland Symphony Orchestra on **Friday**, **Nov. 10**, at 7:30 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall of FSU's Woodward D. Pealer Performing Arts Center.

The concert will feature three Romantic-era masterworks. Felix Mendelssohn's hauntingly beautiful "Melusine" overture conveys the folkloric tale of a mythical being. Louise Farrenc's captivating "Symphony No. 3" showcases the composer's skillful use of counterpoint and chromatic harmonies. Ludwig van Beethoven's dramatic and passionate "Symphony No. 7" provides a triumphant finale to a magical symphonic performance.

Prior to the concert, at 6:30 p.m., ticket holders are invited to join MSO Music Director Elizabeth Schulze in the Pealer Recital Hall for Prélude, a discussion of the works to be performed.

Concert tickets are \$40 for adults; \$36 for FSU employees and the military; \$17 for youth under 18; and free for FSU students. PAWS Pantry

The PAWS Pantry at FSU provides food and basic necessities to FSU students at no cost. The pantry is open and available to all students. Students will complete a brief survey and paperwork to register as a pantry member during their first visit. They will be given a numeric identifier for tracking purposes, so their name and information are never used in any reporting. During regular hours, students may come to the pantry and shop from the selection of non-perishable foods and hygiene products (when available).

The pantry is located at Braddock House at 20 Braddock Road. Walk-up hours are 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 3 to 5 p.m. on **Mondays**; 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., 3 to 5 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. on **Wednesdays**; and noon to 3 p.m. on **Fridays**. Other weekdays are by appointment. To schedule an appointment, email <u>pawspantry@frostburg.edu</u>.

Meal cards are available for students! Cards provide up to five free meal swipes at Chesapeake and are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Just ask about them the next time you're at the pantry.

Things to Know About the Student Health Center

The Student Health Center is staffed with two nurse practitioners, two registered nurses and two front office staff. Center hours are **Mondays through Fridays** from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Services offered include treatment for minor illness/injury, women's health/birth control, emergency contraception, immunizations, STI testing, sexual assault resources, allergy injections and wellness and smoking cessation programs.

Student Counseling Center

The Student Counseling Center offers brief but comprehensive counseling services to FSU students, including individual and group therapy.

The center is open **Mondays through Fridays** from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., excluding holidays. Several same-day appointments are available every day for students who are in crisis and in immediate need of speaking with someone.

FSU's Mountain City Traditional Arts will present traditional Irish music on **Wednesday**, **Nov. 1**, at 7 p.m. at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The performance features some of the tradition's most in-demand musicians, including Brenda Castles on concertina, Ivan Goff on uilleann pipes and flute, vocalist Jefferson Hammer on guitar and vocalist

Liz Hanley on fiddle. The live entertainment is open to the public through general admission with a suggested donation of \$15.

Castles is from County Meath. She has two solo albums of Irish music on concertina and performed regularly with Mick Moloney's Green Fields of America collective. She has recently performed solo concerts for the Consairtín festival in Ennis, Temple Bar TradFest, Meath Beo and the Pipers Club in Dublin. This year Castles has produced a short film, "Plight of the Bumble Bee," for which she composed a traditionally inspired soundtrack.

Goff is from Dublin and is a member of Irish traditional band Danú. He has performed/toured worldwide in duets and ensembles with many household names of Irish music. With credits that range from film and theater to appearances with the New York Philharmonic, Goff has also performed in Broadway productions such as Sting's "The Last Ship," "Come From Away" and "Riverdance."

Hamer is a guitarist, singer and songwriter from Brooklyn, New York. He has toured and recorded albums with Anais Mitchell, Sarah Jarosz and Session Americana. The Murphy Beds, his long-running traditional folk duo with Eamon O'Leary, has released two self-produced albums. His original songs and lead guitar work are featured on Alameda, an acoustic and electric collaboration with bassist Jeff Picker and drummer John Fatum.

Hanley is a Brooklyn-based fiddle player, violinist, singer and performer across many genres. She has toured globally with the late Dr. Mick Moloney and the Green Fields of America, the pop-infused prog-folk-rock band Frogbelly and Symphony and the symphonic rock band Emanuel and the Fear. Hanley's debut album of songs and tunes in the Irish tradition, "The Ecstasy of St. Cecilia," was hailed a "gentle work of beauty" by FolkWorld.

FSU's Department of Music to Present Percussion Ensemble

FSU's Department of Music will present its Percussion Ensemble, conducted by *Dr. Mackenzie Jacob LaMont*, on **Friday, Nov. 3**, at 7:30 p.m. The group will be joined by guest performers *Dr. Jay DeWire* and *Cheyenne Jeffries*.

Percussion Ensemble students are *Benjamin Alvey*, *Gavin Baker*, *Jen Barnhart*, *Bryce Campbell*, *Jacob Deaver*, *Sam Dolly*, *Jacob Hunt*, *Joseph Louie*, *Eileen Martin*, *Joe Rubens* and *Julia Seddon*.

They will perform "Crown of Thorns" by David Maslanka, "Gainsborough" by Thomas Gauger and "Ionisation" by Edgard Varese.

The title "Crown of Thorns" is an obvious reference to Christ's crown of thorns, but the name first came to Maslanka as a possible title for a piece after seeing a plant called "Crown of Thorns" at the New York Botanical Gardens. Crown of Thorns is a thorny desert plant from the Middle East, and the rambling, interweaving, vine-like stems suggested music to him. The imagery is Christian, but the experience transcends religion, and is universal. The music is at times sober and reflective, but more often filled with a liberated energy and joy.

"Gainsborough" is a highly melodic, very popular percussion quintet written in three movements. This piece remains a favorite because of its playful textures, demanding parts and appealing tonality. The first movement is a sprightly dance that mostly features quick lines between two marimbas, with interruptions from the timpani and battery percussionists. The slow, hesitant second movement has a more modal and metallic sound, highlighting the bells and vibraphone. A jazzy recitative appears in the middle of this movement. The final movement is quick and rhythmically active with a healthy amount of call and response between sections. It moves through several styles, finishing with a flourish.

Varèse composed "Ionisation" between 1929 and 1931. Although not the first piece written for percussion ensemble, it is probably the most well-known and influential. Nicolas Slonimsky, the musicologist, conductor, pianist and composer to whom "Ionisation" was dedicated, conducted the premiere in New York in 1933 at a concert sponsored by the Pan-American Association of Composers. Varèse himself played the sirens. The performance was described by a critic as "a sock in the jaw." The piece was first published in 1934.

Admission is \$10 for adults; \$5 for seniors, the military, and FSU faculty and staff; and free for students and children. The Jeremiahs Return to Mountain City Traditional Arts



FSU's Mountain City Traditional Arts will present the Jeremiahs on **Sunday, Nov. 5**, at 3 p.m. at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The live entertainment is open to the public through general admission with a suggested donation of \$15.

Calling their music folk-traditional with an urban twist, the band has rapidly built a solid reputation in Ireland and beyond. They shape their sound with Dubliner Joe Gibney's vocals, joined by vocalist Niamh Varian-Barry on fiddle, Julien Bruneteau from Brittany on whistle and flutes and Dublin-based James Ryan on guitar and bouzouki. They have travelled extensively, with a wonderful mixture of newly composed songs and tunes in the folk genre and a well-

selected catalogue of older folk songs.

A talented singer and songwriter with a melting pot of influences, Gibney, with his instantly recognizable timbre, offers a diverse repertoire of songs, from rousing sea shanties to emotional traditional songs of hardship, love and loss.

Former lead singer of American supergroup "Solas" and multi-instrumentalist Varian-Barry is a musician and composer from Cork City with a unique and individual style. She has a reputation as an exceptional communicator of the arts. Her powerful vocals have been praised worldwide and she is a trained viola and fiddle player.

Bruneteau hails from Bordeaux in France and began playing the flute at age 11. While studying jazz at the Conservatoire of Agen and attending the prestigious Didier Lockwood school in Paris, he immersed himself in the works of great artists such as Chris Potter, Stéphane Guillaume and Benoît Sourisse. Bruneteau is a flute player of great sensitivity with an amazing ability to improvise.

Accompanist Ryan has amassed a wealth of experience, having already performed in more than 14 countries. He draws on a wide range of influences from different genres and traditions, which is evident is his unique percussive backing style. An established teacher, Ryan is also an experienced sound engineer.

Deutsch-Amerikanisches Klarinettentrio in Faculty-Guest Artist Series Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present Deutsch-Amerikanisches Klarinettentrio in a Faculty-Guest Artist Series concert on **Sunday**, **Nov. 5**, at 7 p.m.

Deutsch-Amerikanisches Klarinettentrio is an international clarinet trio and chamber ensemble consisting of clarinetists *Dr. Mark Gallagher*, Jeffrey Boehmer and Hendrik Wüster. During this performance, they will perform "Four Sinfonias, BWV 787, 788, 789 and 799" by Johann Sebastian Bach, "Fifth Trio in G Minor, Op. 8, No. 2" by Jacques Bouffil, "Trio for Clarinets (E-flat/B-flat/Bass)" by Alfred Prinz, "Divertimento No. 2 in B-flat Major, K. 439b" by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and "Divertimento No. 2" by Javier Zalba.

The "Inventions and Sinfonias, BWV 772–801, "also known as the "Two- and Three-Part Inventions," are a collection of 30 short keyboard compositions by Bach: 15 inventions, which are two-part contrapuntal pieces, and 15 sinfonias, which are three-part contrapuntal pieces. They were originally written as "Praeambula" and "Fantasiae" in the "Klavierbüchlein für Wilhelm Friedemann Bach," a clavier booklet for his eldest son, and later rewritten as musical exercises for his students.

Bouffil was a French composer and clarinetist. He was a pupil of Xavier Lefèvre at the Paris Conservatoire, gaining a First Prize in 1806. His compositions for clarinet duet and trio are some of the most worthwhile written for the medium.

Prinz was an Austrian composer, clarinetist and music educator. In 1947 he was awarded a gold medal at the Geneva Music Competition and in 1971 he won a composition award from the city of Vienna. His compositional output includes seven symphonies, many concertos, several works for solo piano, songs and chamber music. He composed "Trio for Clarinets" in 1997.

Mozart wrote "Five Divertimenti (K. 439b)" for three basset horns in 1785. Divertimenti are light pieces performed by several solo instruments in a chamber setting. Movements of a divertimento often include various musical forms such as sonata, minuet and trio, and rondo. While the basset horn's invention dates back to around 1770, Mozart and Mendelssohn were among the few famous composers who wrote pieces for the instrument.

Zalba's early training as a clarinetist helped to develop his love of chamber music and he later became interested in jazz. As a Cuban, the range of popular rhythms of the Island has been an important influence on him. He has performed concertos by Mozart and by Bach, worked with the Irakere group, Cubanismo, Afrojazz, Tropicana Cabaret Orchestra and the Buena Vista Social Club. He is a professor at the Amadeo Roldán Conservatory and the Superior Institute of Art.

FSU's Department of Music Celebrates Adolphe Sax Birthday With Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present a birthday celebration recital in honor of Adolphe Sax, the Belgian musician and inventor of the saxophone, on **Monday**, **Nov. 6**, at 7:30 p.m.

The program will include "Le cirque: Fanfare" by Joaquín Turina, arranged by Jacques Laroque; "Dinant, la voix cuivrée" by Alain Crépin; "Nimrod" from "Enigma Variations" by Edward Elgar, arranged by J.J. Ashley; "Moderato and Allegro" by Erland von Koch; "Moderato quasi Marcia" from "Serenade, Op. 44" by Antonín Dvořák, arranged by Clair W. Johnson; and "The Lone Ar-ranger Goes Sax Mad!" by Philip R. Buttall, re-arranged for saxophone ensemble by Nigel Wood.

Turina was a Spanish composer of classical music. His works include operas, chamber music, piano works, guitar pieces and songs. Much of his work shows the influence of traditional Andalusian music. "Le cirque: Fanfare" is from his album "Piano Works."

Crépin is a Belgian saxophonist, composer, music educator and conductor who has written numerous works for symphonic bands and orchestras. In 2002, he was invited to write a piece for large saxophone ensemble. He used the popular Dinant folk song "Les batteurs de cuivre" ("The Coppersmiths") and arranged it in three different styles by making delicate use of harmonies.

Elgar composed his "Variations on an Original Theme, Op. 36," popularly known as "Enigma Variations," between 1898 and 1899. It is an orchestral work of 14 variations on an original theme. Elgar dedicated the work to his friends, each variation being a musical sketch of one of his close acquaintances. The name Nimrod refers to music editor Augustus J. Jaeger. Nimrod is described in the Old Testament as "a mighty hunter before the Lord," Jäger being German for hunter. "Nimrod" is sometimes used at British funerals, memorial services and other solemn occasions. An adaptation of this popular piece appears at the ending of the 2017 film "Dunkirk."

Von Koch was a Swedish composer. He wrote symphonies, ballets, an opera and other compositions, including music for film. He composed the nine-minute piece, "Moderato and Allegro for Saxophone Chamber Orchestra" in 1981.

"Serenade for Wind Instruments, Cello and Double Bass in D Minor, Op. 44, B. 77" is a chamber composition Dvořák wrote in 1878. The Serenade evokes the old-world atmosphere of musical performances at the castles of the Rococo period, where the worlds of the aristocracy and the common folk merged. It is composed in a Slavonic style (shortly before Dvořák's "Slavonic Dances"), though not quoting folk songs directly. The opening march pays tongue-in-cheek homage to the serenades of Mozart and central European windband music.

"The Lone Ar-ranger" is a fun potpourri of familiar tunes that flash by, often tantalizingly quickly, based on the finale of Gioachino Rossini's "William Tell Overture." Rossini's music was used as the signature tune for "The Lone Ranger," one of the first Westerns to hit TV in the early 1950s.

Directed by *Dr. Brent Weber*, Saxophone Choir personnel are *Eileen Martin* on sopranino saxophone; Weber and *Raegan Barrett* on soprano saxophone; *Alex McNemar*, FSU alum *Josh Foreman*, *Hailey Beining* and *Blake Burhoe* on alto saxophone; *Gwen Fazenbaker*, *Tammy Burns* and *Courtney Sechler* on tenor saxophone; and *Gabe Hicks* and *Vincent Hangarter* on baritone saxophone.

FSU's Department of Music Presents Jazz Combo in Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present its Jazz Combo, conducted by *Tom Harrison*, in concert on **Wednesday, Nov. 8**, at 7:30 p.m.

The members of the Jazz Combo are *Max Partlow* on tenor and soprano sax/flute, *Joey Orr* on trumpet/flugelhorn, *Sam White* on trumpet/trombone, *Riley House* on piano/alto sax, vocalist *Catherine Owens* on piano, *Andrew Gula* on guitar, *Isaiah Alexander* and Harrison on bass and *Ben Alvey* on drums.

The FSU Jazz Combo will perform an assortment of traditional jazz standards, swing, Latin and modern jazz styles.

Vocal selections interpreted by Owens will include the ballads, "A Sunday Kind of Love," made popular by Etta James and many others, and "Body and Soul" recorded by such notables as Coleman Hawkins, Billie Holiday and Louis Armstrong. Other vocal standards include a Count Basie favorite "April in Paris," and the song "All of Me," the definitive versions coming from Holiday, and then later by Frank Sinatra.

Herbie Hancock's classic "Canteloupe Island" was recorded in 1964 for his album "Empyrean Isles" while he was still in Miles Davis' group. The song has been recorded by and sampled by countless artists.

"Happy People," a 2002 composition by the great saxophonist Kenny Garrett, who also played with Miles Davis, leans toward the funky side of jazz.

In 1976, pianist and composer Cedar Walton penned the Afro-Cuban and swing tune "Bolivia," which has become a jazz standard.

"Red Clay" is the title song from the 1970 album release by trumpeter Freddie Hubbard and is in the soul-jazz fusion style that became popular on the CTI recording label.

The theme song from the 1959 romantic tragedy film "Orfeu Negro" ("Black Orpheus") is a bossa nova written by Brazilian guitarist Luiz Bonfá.

The often-performed jazz classic "Lady Bird" was composed by Tadd Dameron, a pianist and composer who was known for writing arrangements for the Count Basie, Dizzy Gillespie and other big bands.

The Miles Davis and Victor Feldman song "Seven Steps to Heaven" was the title cut from the 1963 album by Davis and is in an uptempo swing style. Herbie Hancock ended up as pianist on the recording, as Victor Feldman didn't want to leave the West Coast to join Davis in New York.

The Modern Jazz Quartet's pianist John Lewis wrote the swing tune "Afternoon in Paris" in 1949 and it has become a jazz standard.

Andy Duncan, a professor in the Department of English and Foreign Languages, has launched his Weird Western Maryland pages at https://www.frostburg.edu/personal-arduncan with a starter set of 70-plus items from his years of research into area ghosts, monsters, UFOs, superstitions, conspiracies, oddities, eccentricities and mysteries.

Points of Pride

Tick Talk Highlights Dr. Rebekah Taylor's Research



For its Science Week, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources recently visited Western Maryland to learn more about the increasing prevalence of ticks in the area and about a community program designed to highlight the issue to inform local residents.

DNR and FSU are working together on an initiative to study the rising prevalence of ticks and Lyme disease in Western Maryland.

Dr. Rebekah Taylor, an associate professor and chair of FSU's Department of Biology, leads the project and works with students to test ticks submitted to her lab for Lyme

disease. Taylor noted that many residents in Western Maryland aren't as familiar with tick safety and preparedness since ticks were historically rare in the area. The data collected by her team is used to inform medical professionals and citizens about the increasing rates of Lyme in ticks in the area. She said about 40 percent of the ticks tested in her lab end up being positive for Lyme disease. Taylor has a background in immunology and started studying ticks after her son contracted Lyme disease from a tick bite.

Health and Safety Messages

Give Wildlife a Brake!



Follow speed limits. Many animals are hit simply because people drive too fast to avoid them. Taking it slow makes the roads safer for other drivers and pedestrians, too.

Watch for wildlife in and near the road at dawn, dusk and in the first few hours after darkness. Keep in mind that where there is one animal, there are probably others.

Be especially cautious on two-lane roads bordered by woods or fields, or where streams cross under roads. Slow down to 45 mph or less.

Scan the road as you drive, watching the edges for wildlife about to cross. This will also make you more aware of other hazards such as bicyclists, children at play and slow-moving vehicles.

Use your high beams whenever possible.

Lower your dashboard lights slightly. You'll be more likely to see your headlights reflected in the eyes of animals in time to brake.
