Hail to the Redskins!

The Washington Redskins' fifth consecutive summer training camp at FSU officially gets under way Sun., July 25, and will run through Thurs., Aug. 19. Once again, fans can expect a summer camp season packed with exciting events highlighted by the Redskins/Steelers scrimmage Sat., Aug. 7.

The team will hold daily practice sessions, open for the public to watch, beginning Mon., July 26, at 3 p.m. Fans can watch their favorite players in action and even have opportunities to get autographs as the team moves from the field to the locker room. Practice sessions are Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 to 11 a.m. and again from 3 to 5 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday practice sessions are from 3 to 5 p.m.

Fan Appreciation Day, the camp's most popular event, is scheduled for Wed., Aug. 4, with a rain date of Thurs., Aug. 5. Additional information or changes to this schedule will be announced later.

A special Redskins/Steelers practice, sure to entertain Washington and Pittsburgh fans alike, will begin at 3 p.m. Tues., Aug. 3. This event is free and open to the public. The popular scrimmage between these two preseason rivals is scheduled for Sat., Aug. 7 at noon. Tickets for this event are on sale at the FSU



Bookstore in the campus Lane Center, The Book Center in Cumberland and Kmart at the Country Club Mall in LaVale. Mail and will-call orders can be made by calling x7044.

The scrimmage will be held rain or shine. There will be no refunds or exchange of tickets. No alcoholic beverages, coolers, glass bottles or tailgating will be permitted. Fans are also reminded that there will be no re-entries after ticketholders enter the stadium.

The primary public parking lot for the camp's events will be the Stadium Lot next to Bobcat Stadium. The parking fee is \$3 per car. Also, a reminder: Fans are not allowed into the Cordts Physical Education Center when the Redskins are using the facilities.

There will be no evening practices Tues., Aug. 10, and Thurs., Aug. 12 as the team will be in transit for a practice in Latrobe with the Steelers and a pre-season game with the New England Patriots.

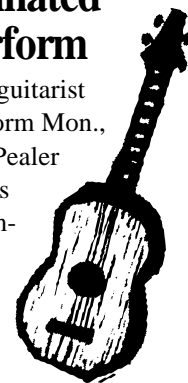

Grammy-Nominated Guitarist to Perform

Grammy-nominated guitarist Paul Galbraith will perform Mon., Aug. 2, at 7 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall. The event is presented by the Performing Arts Center and Cultural Events Series and is sponsored in part by the Maryland State Arts Council.



Tickets are \$5 and are available in the Lane Center, Main Street Books in Frostburg, The Book Center in Cumberland and at the door.

Galbraith was nominated for a 1998 Grammy Award for Best Solo Instrumental Album for his double CD of "The Complete Solo Bach Violin Sonatas and Partitas" (Delos). The CD reached *Billboard* magazine's top 10 on the classical charts, was chosen one of the two best CDs for 1998 by *Gramophone Magazine* and received a four star rating in *Stereo Review*.

Galbraith was featured recently on National Public Radio's "All Things Considered" and "Performance Today" and toured the U.S. last year as soloist with the Moscow Chamber Orchestra. Since winning a silver medal at the Segovia International Guitar Competition at age 17, Galbraith has performed all over the world.

Galbraith has a unique playing style. His guitar is supported by a metal endpin, similar to a cello, that rests on a wooden resonance box. The eight strings and unusual design of his guitar increase the instrument's range and musical possibilities.

New Option for Psychology Students

FSU's Psychology Department is offering a new Child and Family Option for all undergraduates. The child and family focus will provide students with an in-depth look into child and adolescent psychology.

"The idea is to provide the student with a foundation in developmental psychology, child/adolescent disorders, and a developmentally based approach to understanding children, adolescents, and their families," says Dr. Jason H. Edwards, FSU assistant professor of psychology and coordinator of the option.

Students who enroll for this option will be required to take a sequence of three courses. The first two courses establish an understanding of child and adolescent psychology. Students are given several options that range from an internship to conducting research to fulfill the third course requirement.

The development of this study opportunity was based on student need. Often graduates at the baccalaureate level work with children, adolescents and their families.

The new option has been in the planning stage for a year and a half and will be implemented in the fall of 1999.

Western Maryland Regional Internet Lab interns at FSU established the Web site for the radio station by using the RealAudio server, which allows listeners to tune into a radio station while they are surfing the Internet.
