MLK Convocation This Week!

The University will present its annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Convocation, "A Celebration of Life," on Thurs., April 29 at 11 a.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall.

In the afternoon, A STAR! in Western Maryland will hold the second-year dedication ceremony for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Reflection and Education Area in the campus Arboretum beginning at 1:30 p.m.

The keynote speaker for the Convocation is the Honorable Emmett C. Burns, Jr., Maryland House of Delegates.

Burns, the Democratic Delegate from the 10th Legislative District of Baltimore City and Baltimore County since 1995, serves on both the House Judiciary Committee and the Special Committee on Drug and Alcohol Abuse. He also serves as a member on both the Governor's Commission on Adoption and the Task Force on African-American Entrepreneurship in Baltimore City.

Additional remarks will be offered by Dr. Catherine Gira, president. Other speakers include Dr. John J. O'Rorke, chair of the Faculty Senate, and Dr. Christine R. Grontkowski, provost.

Musical selections by the FSU University Chorale include "Steal Away" and "Father's Got A Home, The Family Reunion (A Back Yard Opera)." The Chorale is conducted by Dr. Karen Soderberg with piano accompaniment by Chris McCabe.

Participants of A STAR! in Western Maryland's FSU Arboretum event are asked to assemble at 1:30 p.m. under the tent on the football practice field located at the lower end of University Drive (just off Midlothian Road). Parking is available on University Drive.

In support of the King Convocation, FSU's A STAR! office has organized a multi-stage community service project to further enhance the FSU Arboretum. Working to bring to life some of the many ideas which Dr. King represented, local youth and community volunteers will begin construction of thematic diversity gardens on National Youth Service Day, April 16 to 17. Service will continue during National Volunteer Week, April 18 to 23 and throughout this year's growing season.

On Thurs., April 29, A STAR! in Western Maryland invites participants from the convocation, local youth and community volunteers to recognize and further develop the "King" diversity gardens. All participants are asked to dress appropriately as the Arboretum area will be muddy from April rains.

Math Symposium



The Department of Mathematics will sponsor its 29th Annual Mathematics Symposium on Fri., April 30 from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Lane Center.

The theme of this year's symposium, which focuses on mathematics education, is "The Mind's Eye: Viewing Our World Through Mathematics." The program will emphasize applications of mathematics to environmental concerns with discussion on other topics such as classroom activities and educational issues.

Educators from throughout the tri-state region will be able to choose attendance at over 22 presentations aimed at the elementary, secondary and college levels. Presentation topics include application of mathematics to the Chesapeake Bay, global warming, acid rain, Frostburg weather, solar storms and others.

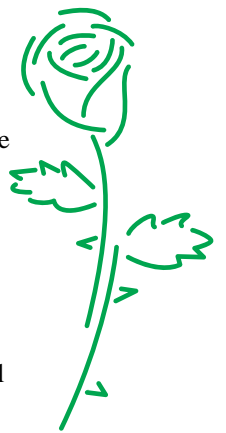

"Stopping AIDS Is My Mission" is the message of Dr. Victoria Cargill. The importance of this message is not to abstain, but to make responsible decisions. Learn the facts, not popular belief.

Dr. Cargill is the coordinating chair of Natural History, Epidemiology and Prevention coordinating committee of the National Institute of Health Office of AIDS Research. An editorial board member of HIV/AIDS Newline, AIDS Care, and several other journals, she is also the author of many publications, and has collaborated on federally funded IRV/AIDS education and risk reduction projects.

She also developed an AIDS education organization known as SAMM -



Stopping AIDS Is My Mission - in Cleveland, Ohio, which was recognized in 1996 by the Secretary of Health and Human Services as a model of outreach and risk prevention. Reaching over 50,000 teens in the greater Cleveland area, they are now part of the AIDS Training and Education Center Network.

Originally designed to educate and heighten awareness among adolescents and young adults of color about AIDS and AIDS prevention, SAMM has expanded to provide AIDS education to inner-city women in housing projects and African-American men in the inner city. The program now includes a volunteer corps of peer-educators who teach AIDS prevention in school systems and the inner city.

- Team breaks camp on Thurs., Aug. 19.

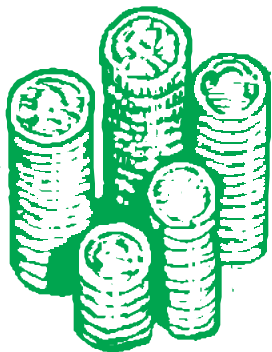


Scholarships Galore!

The Financial Aid Office has several scholarship applications available.

The D.C. State Incentive Grant requirements include: applicant must be an established D.C. resident for at least 18 months prior to filing the application; a U.S. citizen or a permanent resident alien; enrolled or accepted for enrollment in an undergraduate program in an eligible college or university on at least a half-time basis; be enrolled for a full academic year and be in good academic standing. A new application must be filed every year. Receipt of an award in a previous year does not automatically qualify you for an award in a subsequent year.

The Child Care Provider Scholarship Program provides financial aid to qualified Maryland residents who are enrolled or are planning to enroll in a program leading to an associate's or bachelor's degree in early childhood education or child development at a Maryland college or university.

Dr. Allen has had similar Fulbright positions at Dakar, Senegal in 1981-82 and Constantine, Algeria, in 1985-86. He is the author of a profile of Madagascar published by Westview Press in 1995 and several dozen articles and chapters on the Great Island.
