Dance Concert Benefits Graham Company

The FSU Dance Company's Spring Dance Concert, under the direction of Dr. Barry Fischer, will be held on Thursday, May 4, at 8 p.m., Friday, May 5, at 8 p.m. and Saturday, May 6, at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. Guest artists will be Tommy Parlon and Julia Smith from Washington, D.C.

Two new works for the FSU Dance Co. will be prepared by local choreographers Krista Cave, with a modern jazz work, and Kari-Ann Rocco's contribution for a modern ballet work. The concert will also include new works by Fischer and students.

Faculty and staff are invited to a free 30-minute preview of the concert at noon on Thursday, May 4.

Proceeds from Friday night's performance will benefit the Martha Graham Dance Company, the oldest such dance company in the country, as part of the FSU Dance Company's new charity campaign, DanceAid America.

In the fall of 2005, the FSU Dance Company dedicated one evening of funds from the Winter Dance Concert to Hurricane Katrina relief efforts. From this has grown an ongoing program aimed at generating aid to other groups in need of funding. This year, DanceAid America has decided to donate the proceeds from the Friday night performance of each dance program's run to a charity organization. Establishing the DanceAid America program as an ongoing charity event at FSU is company director Fischer's brainchild.

Some time after the success of the Katrina program, Fischer received a call from a long-time associate, Janet Eilber, the artistic director of the internationally recognized Martha Graham Dance Company.

Graham was a mentor of Fischer's and the mother of modern dance. Most recently, the company she founded has fallen on hard times.

UT Season Winds up with Depression-Era Drama

University Theatre will present James Leonard Jr.'s Depression-era drama "The Diviners" on Friday, May 12, and Saturday, May 13, at 8 p.m. in the F.

Perry Smith Studio Theatre of the Performing Arts Center. Admission is \$5.

Directed by FSU student Christie Clark, "The Diviners" takes place in the mythical town of Zion, Ind., where water and faith are in short supply. With echoes of Steinbeck's "The Grapes of Wrath," the story centers around the relationship between an emotionally disturbed adolescent Buddy Layman, who possesses the gift of "divining" or water-witching but has a fear of water, and a preacher named C.C. Showers who wanders into town looking for work. In his attempt to help Buddy get over the fear, which stems from a childhood incident that resulted in the death of his mother, Showers finds that faith, not just water, is difficult to tap in this small community.

Commencement Tickets Available May 1

Tickets will be required for all guests attending the 128th Commencement Ceremony on Saturday, May 27, in the Cordts PE Center Main Arena. The Colleges of Business and Education will hold their ceremony at 10 a.m.; the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will recognize its graduates at 2 p.m.

Students graduating with a major from the College of Business or the College of Education will be provided nine tickets each. Students graduating with a major from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will be provided eight tickets each. The differential is based on the projected number of graduates from each of the three Colleges.

Only graduating students who have been cleared by the Registrar's Office are eligible to pick up tickets. All tickets must be claimed in person, and a valid FSU ID must be presented. No tickets may be retrieved "by proxy" (i.e., no graduating student can send someone else to claim tickets).

Tickets will be available beginning Monday, May 1, at the Lane Center Box Office during regular hours (9 a.m.-4 p.m., Monday-Friday). On Friday, May 26, tickets are available through 3 p.m.; at 3:30 p.m., tickets will be available in the Cordts P.E. Center until 5 p.m.

The Student Government Association will also make unclaimed tickets available at two "Free-for-All" ticket distributions: Thursday, May 18, 5 to 7 p.m., in the Lane University Center; Friday, May 26, 5 to 7 p.m., in the Box Office of the Cordts PE Center. The same "graduating students only" policy applies.

Summer Math Program Seeks Young Minds

The Maryland Summer Center for Mathematics: "Mystery + Mastery * Beauty + Power = Infinity!" at FSU is seeking applications of talented children currently in grades 4 to 7. This Maryland Summer Center runs from July 5 to 14 (weekend excluded). Content will emphasize the beauty of math and joy of exploration. Students will be challenged to develop perspectives and tricks of mathematicians, as well as exploration strategies and empowering habits of mind. Last year's program received very

strong reviews from State evaluators. Those who participated in last year's program are still eligible, and the mathematics content will be new.

The instructional team includes Co-Director Dr. Gerry Wojnar (FSU), Co-Director Pam Deering (Instructional Designer at Allegany College), Associate Director Dr. Marc Michael (FSU), visiting fractal specialist Dr. Len Brin from Southern Connecticut State University, and FSU graduates LeeAnn Zlomek (Washington Middle mathematics school improvement specialist, former Maryland Council of Teachers of Mathematics Teacher of the Year) and Teresa Vogtman (Braddock Middle School MathCOUNTS leader), plus some FSU students. Courses Focus On Museums as Resources

Creativity and collaboration between University of Maryland, FSU and Allegheny College of Maryland has led to a new series of graduate-level classes that feature museums as resources for developing special projects for use in public schools.

This summer, faculty from the three institutions will teach three courses on museums as educational resources, featuring materials at the C. William Gilchrist Museum of the Arts in Cumberland. Educational materials produced in these courses will be used in the after-school program of Allegany County Public Schools. The series is designed as part of a graduate degree program, to meet teacher recertification requirements or others who meet enrollment requirements.

The classes offered are: "The Arts: Contrasts and Connections," "Museums as Educational Resources" and "Practicum in Museum Education."

The first course, "The Arts: Contrasts and Connections," will be offered May 30- July 7, on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 p.m. to 8:20 p.m. at FSU. This arts integration course will emphasize the inter-connectedness among the disciplines as the young learner experiences them.

Second in the series is "Museums as Educational Resources," which is offered July 6-26, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to noon. The class focuses on using museums as a resource to support instructional goals for K-12 schools. Participants will look at the Gilchrist Museum materials and design appropriate activities. The third course, which will be held during fall semester, is titled "Practicum in Museum Education." Instructional materials designed in the second course will be developed into an interdisciplinary after-school program in selected Allegany County Public Schools.
