University Theatre will present "Icarus," by Edwin Sanchez, a drama based on the famous Greek myth about a man whose efforts to fly fail because his artificial wings melt when he flies too close to the sun.

Performances are Nov. 17, 18, and 30, and Dec. 1 and 2 at 8 p.m. in the PAC's F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. A matinee will be Nov. 18 at 2 p.m. It is recommended for mature audiences.

The New York Times describes the play as a "contemporary fable about the perceptions of beauty."

The central character is Primitivo, a disabled boy trying to rise above his physical limitations. With help from Mr. Ellis, a janitor of dubious sanity, his disfigured sister, Altagracia, rescues Primitivo from the hospital and brings him to a deserted beach. Primitivo dreams of becoming a famous swimmer who can swim so far and with such strength that he touches the sun. Across the boardwalk lives "the Gloria," an over-the-hill actress obsessed with her looks. Beau, a mysterious man who hides his own disfigurement and

eventually falls in love with Altagracia, completes the cast.

Appearing throughout the U.S. in clubs and coffeehouses, Allard has shared the stage with some of the finest performers in the business, including Nanci Griffith, John Prine and Tracy Nelson. "Her euphonious country pop dances with tender lyrics and homey melodies that make you feel as if she's playing in your living room," says the Richmond Times-Dispatch.

Green's harmonica prowess has also won critical praise. The Dispatch says, "With his jack-in-the-box stage presence and impeccable harmonica, Gary Green could be a musical event all by himself."

Allard won the 1999 WAMMIE (Washington Area Music Association Award) for Best Female Country Vocalist, after three previous nominations for this award from 1996-1998. 

"Raisin in the Sun" Next in African Am. Fest

The third film of the FSU African American Film Festival, "Raisin in the Sun," will be shown Thursday, Nov. 30, at 7 p.m. in the Atkinson Room, Lane Center room 201. Co-sponsored by the FSU Department of History, Center Stage and the African American Studies Program, this showing is free and open to the public.

Starring Sidney Poitier and Ruby Dee, this 1961 drama centers on the fortunes of the five-member Younger family, who share a tiny apartment on Chicago's south side. Members of the family - the widowed Ruth Younger, her daughter Beneatha, her son Walter Lee, and Walter's wife and son - eagerly await the delivery of a \$10,000 check from the dead father's life insurance policy. Ruth wants to use the money to buy a house and pay for Beneatha's medical school tuition, but Walter has other ideas. When the money is entrusted to him, he invests it poorly. Yet, at a critical time in all of their lives, he redeems himself.

In just over two hours, the film touches

on themes of race, class, gender, generational conflict and even Afrocentrism vs. assimilation. The end result is a moving drama and a sharply etched portrait of both a family and American society.
