M.Ed./Administration Earns Recognition

One of 42 accredited nationwide

FSU's master of education program in administration and supervision has joined an exclusive club: It is one of only 42 supervisory programs nationwide to receive national recognition by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

"National recognition boosts faculty morale and positions FSU as a leader in the state," said Dr. Susan Arisman, dean of the FSU College of Education.

NCATE accreditation has been mandated by the state of Maryland. FSU's programs are either currently under review or have already been approved. Accredited programs include the master in education in reading, the undergraduate program in mathematics education and the early childhood education program. In addition, the FSU elementary education program is part of a pilot study of new national NCATE standards.

NCATE estimates there are about 500 universities and colleges that offer programs in educational administration. Only 16 states are represented among the 42 accredited educational administration programs. FSU's program is offered at its Frostburg campus and the FSU Hagerstown Center.

Recreation Program Gains Accreditation

FSU's Recreation and Parks Management program has received accreditation from the National Recreation and Parks Association/American Association for Leisure and Recreation, a distinction reached by just over a quarter of the U.S. institutions that offer undergraduate recreation curricula.

FSU received the honor at the NRPA national conference in Phoenix, Ariz., in early October.

FSU Student Chosen for "Daily Show" Gig

While you're checking out election results this Tuesday, watch for senior psychology major Emily Dorezas, who recently was chosen to serve as a special election night correspondent for Comedy Central's "Daily Show with Jon Stewart," the nightly news parody on the cable network.

As part of her prize package, Dorezas will fly to New York City for a six-night stay and act as the live online correspondent from Comedy Central's "Indecision 2000" election-night party. She will also show up in clips during the TV show's election-night coverage.

Dorezas auditioned for the gig at a local wine-tasting festival. She was selected as one of four finalists who were later voted for online. Emily, who often does stand-up comedy, walked away with 43 percent of the online vote by performing a little campaigning of her own. "I put up posters in the FSU computer labs. And, also, I have a lot of friends who are bored at work and could get online and vote for me."

Her audition included reading cue cards with a "late-breaking bulletin" about New York GOP Chairman William Powers verbally attacking Hillary Clinton. Dorezas ad-libbed a line about her grandfather carrying a photo of Powers in his purse and challenged Powers to answer "why." The improv was not new to Dorezas, who has been doing stand-up for about a year. She spent the summer in Chicago bartending and performing at open mic nights at the Windy City's comedy clubs. She frequently takes a break from her FSU studies to travel to Chicago and perform.

Growing up in Elkton, Md., Dorezas, who was voted "Most Likely to Host a Late Night Talk Show" in high school, was inspired by comedians Bob Newhart, Eddie Murphy and Ellen DeGeneres.

While in the Big Apple, she is looking forward to meeting Senator Bob Dole who serves as an election analyst for Comedy Central. "He should be there (at the party.) I don't think he's doing anything else on election night."

Fame, fortune or otherwise, Dorezas plans to move to Chicago after her December graduation. Will she include her alma mater in her comedy act?

"I already have," she quips. "There's loads of material."

lowed by a question-and-answer session.

"Leap into Darkness," which Bretholz wrote with Baltimore Sun columnist Michael Olesker, is the gripping account of Bretholz as a young boy and his series of audacious escapes from the Nazis' Final Solution. He survived the Holocaust by escaping from the Nazis (and others) not once, but seven times during his almost seven-year ordeal crisscrossing war-torn Europe.

He leaped from trains, outran police and hid in attics, cellars, anywhere that offered a few more seconds of safety. First he swam the River Sauer at the German-Belgian border. Later he climbed the Alps on feet so battered they froze to his socks—only to be turned back at the Swiss border. He crawled out from under the barbed wire of a French holding camp and hid in a village in the Pyrenees while gendarmes searched it. And in the dark hours of one November morning, he escaped from a train bound for Auschwitz.

Bretholz arrived in the United States in 1947 and settled in Baltimore, where he worked in the textile business and then as a bookseller for many years. He continues to lecture extensively about his Holocaust memories.

Collegium Musicum will sing two pieces. One is "Zot Jerushalayim" (This is Jerusalem), arranged by Karen Sarnaker. The other is "Zol Shoyn Kumen Di Ge'uleh" (Let the Redemption Come) a poem by Shmerke Kaczerginski, set to music by Joshua Jacobson. Kaczerginski was one of those Holocaust survivors who traveled around Europe visiting the displaced persons and sending a message of courage and hope. His poem expressed the feelings of the survivor trying to make a new beginning, determined never to give up on life, faith in humanity or the vision of a better world.

free and open to the public.



FSU's program is the only accredited four-year program in Maryland.

The accreditation applies to all of FSU's collaborative programs with The Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC), Garrett Community College and Allegany College of Maryland.

In addition, FSU was commended by the same organization for its collaborative program, in particular for the program with CCBC Catonsville and its effort to bring under-represented groups in to the recreation industry, according to Dr. Susan Arisman, dean of the FSU College of Education.

Started in 1977, the program currently has about 90 majors at all its sites.

The process of accreditation took more than a year and a half, including preparing a self-study for review by the NRPA, as well as a campus visit by two academics and a practitioner in the recreation industry.

"It's the process of quality assurance, and that's what we're into in this college - quality," said Dean Arisman.

Accreditation allows graduates of the FSU program to sit immediately for the Certified Park and Recreation Specialist exam, according to Dr. Robert B. Kauffman, director of the recreation program and an associate professor of Recreation and Parks. Graduates of other programs are required to complete additional coursework.

It also gives the University added visibility and credibility when defending its programs to state decision-makers, he said. Accreditation indicates that the University has put a significant amount of resources into the program and that it is "fulfilling the body of knowledge considered to be the standards for one going into the field," Kauffman said.

He has been called “the Baron of Bad Taste,” “the Pope of Trash” and “the Sultan of Sleaze.” Now acclaimed and campy moviemaker John Waters will discuss all forms of shock value in film at FSU.

Philosophical Forum: ‘God and The Big Bang’

The Department of Philosophy’s Philosophical Forum, “God and the Big Bang,” will be Monday, Nov. 6, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in Lane Center 201.

Presenters will be Dr. Greg Latta, Dr. Greg Klebanoff and Dr. Angelo Bucchino. Latta, an associate professor of physics, will briefly explain the experimental evidence for the Big Bang – how we know there was a Big Bang. Klebanoff, lecturer in the Department of Philosophy, will be the featured speaker. He will examine the strength of recent claims that science has shown that our universe is divinely “fine-tuned” so as to permit our existence. Bucchino, a professor of philosophy, will discuss arguments for the existence of God and suggestions for strengthening the “fine-tuning” argument.

Acclaimed Novelist John Dufresne to Appear

Writer John Dufresne will come to FSU for a fiction reading and book signing on Thursday, Nov. 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lane Center’s Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall (Multi-Use Room). Sponsored by FSU’s Department of English and the Western Maryland Writers’ Workshop, this event is free and open to the public.

A native of Worcester, Mass., Dufresne brings an eclectic background as social worker, cab driver, bartender, house painter and actor, among others, to his fiction. He holds an MFA in creative writing from the University of Arkansas.

Dufresne’s novel “Louisiana Power and Light,” named a Barnes & Noble Discover Great Writers selection and a New York Times Notable Book, is being made into a movie by Miramax Films. Oscar-winner Billy Bob Thornton will star in and direct the production, with the screenplay to be written by Dufresne.

His second novel, “Love Warps the Mind a Little,” also named a New York Times Notable Book, inspired the following comment from The New York Times Book Review: “It is the ability of Mr. Dufresne...to render big-picture agony in its tiniest domestic moments that makes his book both astounding and wise.” Dufresne has also published a collection of short stories titled “The Way That Water Enters Stone.” He is working on a new novel, “Deep in the Shade of Paradise,” due out in fall 2001, and a novel about love and death in Louisiana titled “Shiver-de-Freeze.”



Prestigious Awards to Go to Exotic Locations

The National Security Education Program (NSEP) offers U.S. students an opportunity to strengthen international awareness and communication in countries deemed crucial to national security. Each year the NSEP awards a number of scholarships to students who want to take part in overseas study in countries worldwide except in Western Europe, Canada, Australia and New Zealand. Scholarships cover a semester, summer or year abroad and are substantial awards. Returning students benefit from employment opportunities with the U.S. Government. This year's FSU deadline for applications is Nov. 15.

Semester Overseas for Same Price as FSU

The International Student Exchange Program (ISEP) allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of over 200 foreign locations. Students may take financial aid with them and may apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in either English or in other languages. Are You Creating an Office Hazard?

The Health and Safety Committee would like to call attention to a hazard that may be growing in faculty and staff offices: large amounts of combustibles (old newspapers, monthly magazines, cardboard, etc.) Office space is at a premium and the Maryland State Fire Code says that a large amount of combustible material is fuel for any

potential fire. Office-dwellers are asked to look at your areas and remove and dispose of unwanted combustibles.
