## **Comedienne to Present Show on Alcohol Abuse**

Wendi Fox, a nationally acclaimed comic appearing nationwide on her "Alcohol Insanity Tour," will stop at FSU on Tuesday, Oct. 10, at 7 p.m. in the Lane Center Multi-Use Room. Her show is free and open to the public.

For the past eight years, Fox has toured the U.S. as a stand-up comic at colleges and clubs, with appearances on radio and television.

Fox tackles the issue of alcohol abuse head-on with information, feeling and a distinctively twisted sense of humor. Drawing from her own experience growing up in an alcoholic environment, she focuses on why people become alcoholics, the painful family legacies alcoholics create and ways for those affected to heal themselves.

"I think part of the problem that we have with alcohol and drugs is that we are trying to avoid being human," she says. "We are trying to avoid pain,

sadness, embarrassment, when, in fact, that is a part of evolution."

According to Fox, ultimately, substance abuse and low self-esteem are intertwined. It's easy for those growing up in alcoholic families to feel victimized. Fox tries to encourage those hurt by alcoholism to realize that they do indeed have the power to improve their lives and thus transform a legacy of hurt into one of hope.

# Nanotechnology Topic of Seminar Oct. 16

Phillip J. Rous, Department of Physics at University of Maryland Baltimore County, will present a seminar titled "Nanoscale Physics and nanotechnology," on Monday, Oct. 16 at 2 p.m. in 335 Tawes Hall.

Nanotechnology is a field of science which strives to control individual atoms and molecules to create devices that are thousands of times smaller than current technologies permit. Until very recently, the arrangement of atoms in all materials was believed to be fixed. However, scientists now think it is possible to move

think it is possible to move these basic building blocks around into precise arrangements, in order to manufacture new and exotic materials, unknown in nature and with some innovative properties: the ultimate in precision engineering. This is, in essence, a new architecture: the creation of man-made structures with particular functions that stretch contemporary technology. As a result, scientists predict amazing applications in the areas of computing, medicine, materials, and space exploration.

Dr. Rous will discuss the extraordinary future of nanotechnology and the ways in which achievements are already being realized. This seminar is free and open to the public.

## Election 2000: Does Religion Matter?

A panel discussion featuring Rabbi Jack Moline of the Interfaith Alliance will be Tuesday, Oct. 24, at 7:30 p.m. in Lane Center room 201. It is free and open to the public.

"Election 2000: Does Religion Matter?" will feature Moline's presentation, which will address the historical role of religion in U.S. political campaigns, including both the positive and the more negative, possibly destructive, uses of religion during these campaigns. He will also offer comments and insights on the current presidential campaign.

Following Moline's talk, a panel of FSU faculty and students will pose questions for discussion. Panel participants include Angelo Bucchino, professor of philosophy; John O'Rorke, assistant professor of political science; Kathy Powell, associate professor of social work; and Michael Llewellyn, president of the Student Government Association. A general question-andanswer period will conclude the evening's presentation. Rev. Larry Neumark of United Campus Ministry will act as moderator.

Moline is the rabbi of Agudas Achim Congregation of Northern Virginia, in Alexandria. A former president of the Washington Board of Rabbis, he has represented the Rabbinical Assembly in a variety of public policy matters. He is an adjunct faculty member of the Virginia Theological Seminary and has contributed to speeches by President Clinton, including his eulogy for the late Prime Minister Itzaak Rabin of Israel.

### **University Police Given Prevention Award**

For the 11th consecutive year, the FSU Police Department has received the Governor's Crime Prevention Award, Category A. The department is one of only 19 police departments in the entire state of Maryland to be honored this year.

"It is my very firm conviction that the participation of each officer, as distinct from having a 'crime prevention officer,' is the reason behind our success," said FSU Chief of Police Brian Shanley. "Everybody did at least four things to contribute. It was noted in our award packet this year that several officers exceeded the minimum requirements for participation in our crime prevention programs. Those officers are well known in our department and across the campus, and deserve special thanks.'

#### **Professor Ross Earns** Mentor Award

Dr. Lee B. Ross, professor of psychology at FSU, was awarded the Mentor Award at the 2000 Career Day Luncheon on Oct. 6.

The Mentor Award is given to a current or retired faculty member who has uniquely and unselfishly provided personal and career inspiration and quidance.

Ross was one of the original group of faculty to create a learning community. He served on the Maryland Critical Incident Stress Management Team and has provided emergency stress management service for East Coast disasters, most recently following Hurricane Andrew in Florida and Hurricane Flovd in North Carolina. The undergraduate curriculum he initiated on death and dying has evolved into a graduate-level course on crisis intervention.

Ross has been described as a wonderful role model for the importance of volunteering and using one's passion for what psychologists know and understand about humanity in a way that helps alleviate human suffering.

"His profound wisdom and gentle, nonthreatening approach, along with his passion for life, are wonderful attributes," his nomination letter reads.

to lift, it may be too heavy for them. -- To request additional packing boxes

instead of overloading a few. -- That accident prevention is the

responsibility of all employees.
