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Cultural Events Series Opens with Pittsburgh Ballet Performances

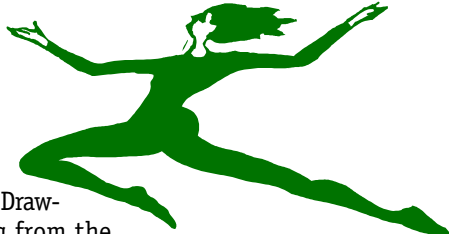
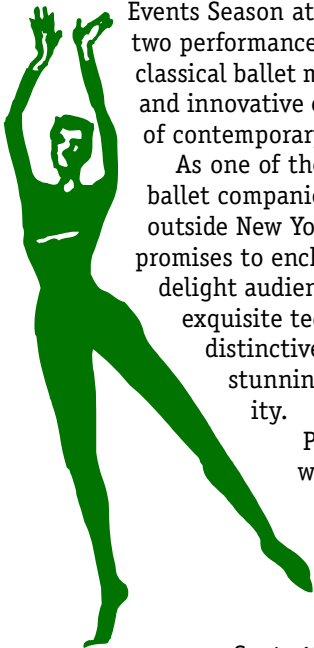

Meningitis, Flu Shots to Be Offered Oct. 5

FSU and VACCESSHealth will again offer the meningitis vaccine to members of the FSU campus community. Flu shots will also be offered.

The cost will be \$75 for the meningi-

tis vaccine and \$15 for the flu shot. The shots will be offered in the Lane Center Multi-Use room from 1 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 5.

A new Maryland law states that students living on campus must either have the meningitis vaccine or have signed a waiver saying they decided against it. That law doesn't cover students living in off-campus housing who are still at risk.

More than half of the outbreaks from 1992 to 1996 occurred in schools, colleges, universities and similar settings. Studies have suggested that college students are more susceptible because they live and work close to one another in dormitories and classrooms. Behavior and social aspects of college life also appear to be risk factors, with smoking, exposure to second-hand smoke, excessive alcohol consumption and bar patronage all increasing the chance that you will contract meningitis from an infected individual.

Symptoms often mimic flu, including fever, severe headache, stiff neck, rash, nausea, vomiting and lethargy. The infection can lead to permanent disabili-

ties or even death. The infection is spread by direct contact, for example from sharing a glass or cigarette or by kissing, or through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes.

The parents of Jesse Gardiner, an FSU freshman who died of meningococcal bacteremia in 1999 spearheaded the effort to pass the Maryland law.

Film Scholar to Open African Am. Film Fest

The nation's pre-eminent scholar on the black presence in film, Dr. Thomas Cripps, will launch the FSU African American Film Festival with a keynote address on Thursday, Sept. 14 at 7:30 p.m. in the Lane Center Multi-Use Room.

Co-sponsored by the FSU Department of History, Center Stage and the African American Studies Program, the lecture and film series are free and open to the public.

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In his lecture, Cripps will set the stage for the film festival and discuss recent innovations from Spike Lee and other current figures involved with African American films.

Cripps, now retired, is distinguished professor emeritus at Morgan State University, and has been a visiting professor at Harvard and Stanford Universities, and the University of Delaware.

A prolific author, Cripps has written authoritative books, articles and essays on African American film and culture.

to the Civil Rights Era."

The African American Film Series features four classic films, with one scheduled per month from Sept. through Dec. All films will be shown in room 201 of the Lane Center at 7 p.m.

The first film, "No Way Out," is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 28. Starring Sidney Poitier and Richard Widmark, this film centers on race and social justice issues. After a black doctor fails to save a gangster's brother's life, the criminal seeks revenge by inciting race riots and ordering mob slayings. This movie, released in 1950, was nominated for two Academy awards and lasts one hour and 45 minutes.
