student organizations and their advisors. The Director of Student Activities, with the help of a graduate assistant, will work with the Campus Activities Board and Center Stage. Reflecting the two-pronged focus of her work at Frostburg, **Cherie Krug** now holds two titles as director of the Center for Volunteerism and National Service Programs and as executive director of the Western Maryland Alliance for Service and Volunteerism. She will oversee a host of service initiatives. She will be assisted by **Tony Washington**, assistant director of the Center for Volunteerism, a new administrative assistant and managers for each service program. Last, but not

least, is the Director of the Lane University Center, who will supervise the staff and activities to support the entire department's services.

2001-2002 Cultural Events Series Announced

Another exciting season of the performing arts begins this fall as FSU presents the 2001-2002 Cultural Events Series. Artists from around the globe and the country will appear on campus to celebrate and share their talents with area audiences.

Parent's Weekend will bring the Massenkoff Russian Folk Festival to

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Frostburg for a special show on Saturday, Sept. 29 at 8:30 p.m. in the Cordts Center Main Arena. This exciting production stars celebrated singer Nikolai Massenkoff and features the Balalaika Ensemble with soloists and the Russian Souvenir Dancers. A treat for the entire family, the Festival celebrates the Russian spirit and its diverse and rich cultural heritage. This tour of The Massenkoff Russian Folk Festival is presented in partnership with the FSU Campus Activities Board.

On Saturday, Oct. 13 at 8 p.m., Grammy-winner Poncho Sanchez and his Latin Jazz Band will heat up a cool Frostburg fall evening with some red-hot Latin jazz. This performance will take place in the Cordts Center Main Arena. The veteran conguero - translate "conga player" - is on a mission to share his musical passion for what he describes as homegrown American music for everybody. Members of the audience will be challenged to keep their bodies still during this show. This tour of Poncho Sanchez is made possible by a grant from the Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation in partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts Regional Touring Program.

In celebration of Homecoming Weekend, the band America will perform on Saturday, Nov. 3, at 9 p.m. in the Cordts Center Main Arena. Opening for America will be singer-songwriter Jonathan Edwards. One of the most beloved and influential groups of the 1970s, America now features original members Dewey Bunnell and Gerry Beckley. The group's clean vocal harmonies, uncluttered arrangements and evocative lyrics continue to attract fans around the globe. Some of their top hits include "A Horse With No Name," "Ventura Highway," "I Need You," "Tin Man," "Sister Golden Hair," "Muskrat Love" and the 1980s hit, "You Can Do Magic." Their collection, *History/America's Greatest Hits*, has sold more than 4 million copies. Edwards is best known for his '70s hit, "Sunshine." This tour of America and Jonathan Edwards is presented in partnership with the FSU Alumni Association.

Christmas From Dublin with Three Irish Tenors returns to Frostburg for two performances after last year's sell-out show. The Tenors will take the stage on Monday, Nov. 20, and Tuesday, Nov. 21, at 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. Tenors Ciaran Nagle, Anthony Norton and Tom Cregan join Irish harpist Jacqueline Whelan, seanachai (storyteller) and comedian Jimmy Kennedy, plus a heavenly host of Irish dancers and musicians, for a distinctively Irish



celebration of the Christmas spirit.

The hit musical "Big River - The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" comes to the FSU Performing Arts Center's Drama Theatre on Sunday, February 3 and Monday, February 4. Sunday's performances are scheduled for 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., and Monday's performance will take place at 7:30 p.m. Mark Twain's beloved classic comes to life with music, performed by a pit orchestra, from country songwriter Roger Miller and libretto by William Hauptman. The winner of seven Tony awards, including Best Musical, "Big River" showcases the American spirit through America's most beloved form of entertainment, the Broadway musical.

On Sunday, March 3, the Tibetan Monks from the Drepung Loseling Monastery will present "Sacred Music Sacred Dance for World Healing" at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. The performance promises to transport audiences to the exotic world of Tibet with the famous multiphonic singers, who practice a type of overtone singing unique to the Tibetan culture, along with masked dancers clad in colorful costumes and accompanied by traditional temple instruments. The Drepung Loseling Monks were featured on the Golden Globe nominated soundtrack of the movie "Seven Years in Tibet." This tour of the Tibetan Monks from the Drepung Loseling Monastery is presented in partnership with the FSU Center for International Education.

The pioneering dance company, Philadanco, otherwise known as The Philadelphia Dance Company, will appear on Saturday, March 16, and Sunday, March 17, in the Performing Arts Center's Drama Theatre. Saturday's performance is set for 8 p.m., while Sunday's performance is a matinee at 2 p.m. This company from the City of Brotherly Love has, according to Dance Magazine, established itself as one of America's foremost dance ensembles. Known for its adventurous choreography that fuses ballet, modern and ethnic dance influences, Philadanco has performed at many world-renowned venues including Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center, Jacob's Pillow and Madison Square Garden. Other performances include collaborations with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Louis Bellson Orchestra and the Duke Ellington Orchestra.

Concluding the season on Thursday, April 4, is "Edgar Allan Poe - Once Upon a Midnight," featuring John Astin. This play will take place at 7:30 p.m. in the

Performing Arts Center's Drama Theatre. Known to millions as Gomez, the patriarch of TV's "The Addams Family," Astin proves that he is capable of serious theatre as he transforms himself into the misunderstood genius and visionary. Using a blend of the historical with the supernatural, this show confronts the misconceptions and distortions of Poe to reveal the man known as the father of modern detective fiction and a pioneer of science fiction. Along the way, Astin shows the poet's macabre humor, loving tenderness and inner torment as Poe struggles with his inner demons and the lure of alcohol.

Tribute to Noted Composer Planned

The FSU Department of Music will celebrate the achievements of American composer Emma Lou Diemer in a special concert on Saturday, Sept. 22 at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall.

The composer will be in attendance at this event, which is free and open to the public.

Highlighting the evening will be the world premiere of Diemer's "Trio for Piano, Violin and Cello," commissioned for FSU's Chamberlain Trio, with Dr. Ellen Grolman Schlegel on cello, Dr. Joan DeVee Dixon on piano and Dr. Laura Kobayashi on violin. The Collegium Music, under the direction of Dr. Karen Soderberg, will perform "Three Madrigals" and "Kyrie." FSU percussionist Ron Horner will present "Toccatto for Marimba," and trombonist Bryan Anton will perform "Psalms 1 and 122 for Bass Trombone and Piano." The Laurel Brass, composed of Anton, Lori Anton and Sandra Woodward, will conclude the concert with the world premiere of the "Quartet for Trumpet, Horn, Trumpet and Piano."

Before the concert, at 7 p.m., Diemer will speak regarding her life in music and career as a composer. At the concert's conclusion, audience members will have the opportunity to speak with the composer and all participating musicians. During the week preceding the concert, Diemer will be composer-in-residence at FSU to speak with students, lecture in selected music classes and act as mentor and advisor to students interested in composition.

On Sunday, Sept. 23, at 4 p.m., Diemer will present an organ recital of her compositions at St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Centre St., Cumberland.

Best known for her choral and keyboard works, Diemer has produced a diverse and sophisticated repertoire that also includes works for orchestra, symphonic band, chamber ensemble, voice, solo instruments and electronic instruments. More than 100 of her 350 compositions have been recorded, with many considered standard pieces.

Throughout her 50-year career, Diemer has considered communication with her audience as her highest musical priority. Her style is characterized by motoric, driving rhythms, along with lyrical, sweeping melodies and unusual, provocative harmonies.

A consummate musician, she is a teacher and accomplished performer as well as a composer. She holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music and Yale University, and studied with noted composers Paul Hindemith and Roger Sessions. Now Professor Emerita at the University of California, Santa Barbara, she has also taught at the University of Maryland, College Park and the Arlington, Va., public schools. Her awards include a Fulbright Fellowship to Brussels, Yale University's Distinguished Alumni Certificate of Merit and the Kennedy Center's Friedham Award.

Now in her mid-seventies, Diemer is busy with commissions, which include "Homage to Tchaikovsky" for the Santa Barbara Symphony. She is the subject of a 300-page biography written by FSU Department of Music faculty member Dr. Grolman Schlegel. The book was recently published by Greenwood Press.

"The Black 14" Film, Lecture Offered Sept. 6

The FSU African American Studies Lecture Series will present a film and lecture, "The Black 14," on the role played by African American football players during the struggle for civil rights during the 1960s. The presentation, which is free and open to the public, will be Thursday, Sept. 6, at 7 p.m. in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall in the Lane Center.

The speaker, Dr. Niyi Coker Jr., professor of theatre and director of African American Studies at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, is the producer of "The Black 14." The film is not just a football story; it is the story of courage and commitment of Black athletes in the struggle for human dignity and racial equality in America. The film and lecture will be followed by a discussion.

'The Storm is Passing Over' Presented at Roper

"The Storm is Passing Over," an exhibit celebrating the musical life of Maryland's African American Community from Emancipation to Civil Rights, will be presented in FSU's Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery from Monday, Sept. 10, to Wednesday, Oct. 3.

A public reception will be held Friday, Sept. 28, from 7 to 8:30 p.m.

One of the most endangered resources in Maryland are materials documenting the musical history of the African-American community. Peabody Institute Archivist Elizabeth Schaaf has been interviewing musicians and their families, collecting oral histories, precious photographs, and other cherished memorabilia and has put together this dramatic exhibition of photographs, vintage recordings and documents.

"The Storm is Passing Over" shows much of the wealth of material that has been gathered together at Peabody. It is hoped that this exhibition will demonstrate the importance of continuing the search for lost materials and encourage the preservation of what we have.

Child, Family Psychology Certificate Offered

FSU now allows its psychology majors who are interested in working with children, adolescents and their families

to enhance their degrees with FSU's new Undergraduate Child and Family Psychology Certificate program.

The program is designed to provide a good foundation in child, adolescent and family psychology. The program includes service-learning, internship and research opportunities. Once completed, the certificate will be included in the student's transcript.

This type of organized experience will benefit a variety of students. Many students who will later work in the human services field will provide services to children or adolescents and their families. The child and family psychology experience is also potentially helpful to students interested in pursuing graduate study in a related area, such as clinical child and family psychology or developmental psychology. This concentrated experience will be useful in helping students determine, before graduation, if they would like a career that involves working with children, adolescents and their families.

The certificate program involves a sequence of four courses. After students take introductory courses in general psychology and child development or adolescent psychology, participants in the certificate program must attend an orientation meeting before they take the Child and Adolescent Disorders class (PSYC 489) and other related 400-level classes.

Stafford Loan Counseling for First-Time Borrowers

All students receiving a Stafford Loan for the first time should have recently received information regarding an entrance counseling requirement. The entrance counseling is mandatory for all first-time borrowers and must be completed before Stafford Loan money can be credited to a student's account. Students who have borrowed through the Stafford Loan program in the past do not need to complete another entrance counseling session.

Students who are required to complete an entrance counseling session have two options:

1. Complete the entrance counseling on-line by visiting www.educaid.com. Choose the button for online seminars (standard entrance) located on the right side of the frame. From there, follow the directions to complete the online quiz. The results will be automatically e-mailed to the Financial Aid Office and the entrance counseling requirement is complete.

2. Attend an in-person entrance counseling session on Wednesday, Sept. 5, or Thursday, Sept. 6, in the John Leake Room, Cordts PE Center. Sessions will be offered at 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. on both days. No RSVP required, simply show up PROMPTLY at the one session that is most convenient for you.

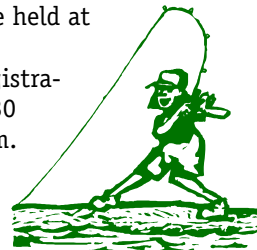
