Dance Concert to Feature Guests, Student Works

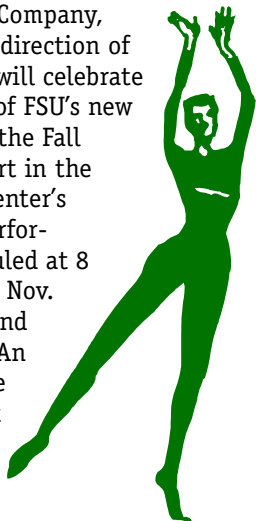
The FSU Dance Company, under the artistic direction of Dr. Barry Fischer, will celebrate the inauguration of FSU's new dance major with the Fall Dance 2001 Concert in the Performing Arts Center's Drama Theater. Performances are scheduled at 8 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 1, Friday, Nov. 2 and Saturday, Nov. 3. An additional matinee performance is set for Saturday at 1 p.m.

Featured works include a variety of modern and jazz dance pieces choreographed by FSU students majoring in dance, members of the FSU Dance Company and FSU Dance Club, professionals from the Martha Graham School of Dance and Dr. Fischer. Guest artists Martin Lofsnes and Elizabeth Auclair from the Martha Graham Dance Company will perform a duet by Graham dancer/choreographer Erica Dankmeyer. Lofsnes will also perform a solo work. Five solo works and one group piece choreographed by the six dance majors will be highlighted, and the Company will perform a group work choreographed by the Dance Company and Club.

The concert includes a diverse array of music including works by John Cage, Antonio Vivaldi, Dead Can Dance, Santana, Peter Gabriel, David Sanders and Mr. President.

Fischer has selected two works as a commentary on the current world situation, and, he says, "going forward." He has dedicated "Steps in the Street," which was performed in last spring's FSU Dance Company Concert, to the cause of anti-terrorism and world peace. Fischer used this somber 1936 work originally choreographed by Martha Graham as the basis for his New York University doctoral dissertation. Auclair will dance the title role. To conclude the concert on an upbeat note, he created "Put Me Up," a modern jazz piece he describes as "uplifting and highly spirited."

Many of his works are inspired by mythology, Christian scriptures, current issues and the surroundings of his Western Maryland home.

Points of Pride



FSU's College of Education got good news from the visitation team from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. The team, a combination of national and state reviewers, was on campus from Oct. 20 to 24.

At the conclusion of their visit in a meeting with FSU officials, the team reported favorably on its meetings with people on campus and its review of FSU's education programs, according to College of Education Dean Susan Arisman.

The NCATE Unit Accreditation Board meets in the spring, and FSU should hear about accreditation soon afterwards.

This is an important step for FSU since NCATE accreditation is now required by the state of Maryland for most institutions that offer teacher education.

The NCATE team visit was the culmination of nearly three years of effort. Individual subject areas first had to meet standards set by national associations designated by NCATE. FSU has been recognized by the national associations for secondary math, early childhood education, reading, master's level administration and supervision, secondary English, secondary social studies, physical education, all four disciplines offered in secondary science - physics, biology, chemistry and earth science - and elementary education. The only approval that is pending is for the health component of the health and physical education program, and an answer is expected from that group soon.

Dr. **Randall Rhodes**, Department of Visual Arts, presented a paper titled

"From the Barque into the Abyss: Prints and Drawings by I.R. Llewellyn." The paper was presented at the session of "Postmodernism and Cynicism" at the 15th Annual National Conference on Liberal Arts and the Education of Artists, New York City, Oct. 16 to 19.

Dr. Ron Barry, Department of Biology, has obtained an \$82,000 grant from the National Park Service, through the Chesapeake Watershed Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Unit (CW-CESU), to survey the mammals of the Thomas Stone National Historic Park (Maryland), George Washington Birthplace National Monument (Virginia), and Colonial National Historical Park (Virginia). Ron also serves as associate editor of the *Journal of Mammalogy*.

The FSU Alumni Association will honor two alumni, **Gladys Faherty** of Frostburg, Md., for the Alumni Service to Alma Mater and **Mary Flannery**, Nahant, Mass., for the Distinguished Alumni Achievement.

Faherty (Class of '55) has a long history in local education as a physical education teacher, librarian, media specialist and classroom volunteer. Faherty is a current member and was past president of the FSU Alumni Association Board of Director and also serves as a member of the executive board of the FSU Foundation, Inc. In 1983, she and her husband, through the FSU Foundation, created the Wensel-Faherty Scholarship which is presented to full-time freshmen from Allegany or Garrett County high schools. To date, nearly 40 students have benefited from this fund.

A 1982 graduate of Frostburg State, Flannery studied psychology, but discovered art while on campus. She combined her two academic loves and pursued a career in art therapy. In 1988, Flannery and two partners founded Raw Art Works, an art therapy organization in Lynn, Mass., that is committed to transforming the lives of people, especially youth, through the creation of visual art. RAW received the prestigious Coming Up Taller award, a national honor.

Recently, Flannery relinquished her role as executive director, but continues as president of RAW, which now offers a wide range of services. She initiated "Arts in Work, Works in Art," interactive corporate workshops designed to promote creativity and teamwork within the workplace. Other programs target the elderly, women recovering from abuse, incarcerated youth, families in distress, young adolescent boys, children in public housing, high school students and middle school youth with disabilities.

The Alumni Achievement Awards will be presented to the winners at the 2001 Career Day Luncheon on Friday, Nov. 2, in the Lane University's Center's Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall.

Judith Dieruf, a professor in the Department of Visual Arts, has been chosen to receive the annual Mentor Award.

Last year, Dieruf celebrated her 20th year at Frostburg State. She is currently the head of Painting and Drawing in the Visual Arts Department.

Dieruf established the graphic design program at Frostburg in 1981 which became a degree in 1987. She built the painting program from six to approximately 40 majors and established the internship program in graphic design and fine arts (supervising nearly 70 interns over the years in local and regional cities such as Baltimore, Washington, Pittsburgh and New York.)

She has exhibited her work numerous times both in this country and abroad. Dieruf has taught 11 overseas classes at Oxford University, St. Edmund Hall, England, and the University of Trieste, Italy, in conjunction with Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

Dieruf will be presented the award at the Career Day Luncheon along with Alumni Achievement Awards.

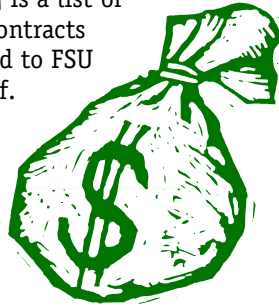

Climbing Wall

The FSU climbing wall, a state-of-the-art indoor rock climbing practice facility, is open to the public three days a week through the Activities for Life Center.

The climbing wall is open to the public during the fall semester for a small fee Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 6 to 9 p.m.. Additional hours and fees are available for climbing parties.

The climbing wall, in room 170 of the Cordts Physical Education Center, state-of-the-art indoor rock climbing practice facility. The wall allows beginners to learn basic climbing skills, while intermediate and advanced climbers can work on refining particular climbing skills and experiment with new moves. The 35-foot vertical section of the wall features four lanes with many challenging routes, including an overhang. There is also a 50-foot of traverse wall with a number of features, including a challenging bouldering cave.

sports and other cultural events during the afternoons. Scholarships are available from the CIE. Contact Tom Carr at x4747.

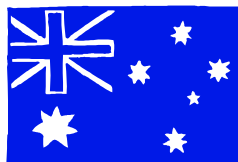
Rowe Scholarship Deadline Nov. 1

earn a semester of FSU credits while studying in Denmark should apply now for next spring semester's exchange program with the KDAS School of Teacher Training in Copenhagen. Students complete projects and spend several weeks in Danish schools practicing student teaching skills. All courses are in English. Financial aid transfers and scholarships are available.

Octoberfest or Mayfest in Germany

FSU students who would like to take part in UMUC's semester programs in Schwabisch Gmund in southern Germany are

advised to apply to the CIE. The campus is part of the University of Maryland system, and all credits transfer back to FSU. Live in a beautiful medieval village and study on a campus with students from over 100 countries. All teaching is in English, and German instruction is offered as well. Scholarships are available from both FSU and UMUC. Students may apply for fall or spring.

Study in Limerick, Ireland

Students interested in taking part in the Ireland Exchange Program in Limerick should come by the CIE for information about the spring 2003 program. Participants in the program study at Mary Immaculate College and take one FSU class and three MIC classes. All financial aid will transfer and scholarships are available.

Semester Overseas for Same Price as FSU

The International Student Exchange Program allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of over 200 locations. Students may take financial aid with them and may apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in either English or other languages. For the price of an airline ticket, this is a great way to earn credit towards your FSU degree while enjoying life in a foreign culture. Apply now for summer and fall 2002.

Choose from over 20 Locations to Study

FSU affiliates with the American Institute for Foreign Study (AIFS) which offers study abroad programs in a variety of locations at universities around the world. Programs are open to all majors. Study in Prague, South Africa or Japan. You may register at FSU and use your financial aid for all programs. AIFS offers scholarships to qualified students.

Scholarships Available for Overseas Study

In addition to taking financial aid overseas, students may apply for a variety of scholarships for study abroad programs. The CIE offers scholarships for all FSU programs in the amount of \$500 and \$1,000. Some departments also offer scholarships for overseas study. There are additional scholarships available from study abroad organizations, such as AustraLearn and ISEP, and there are two new scholarships available for

residents of Maryland (MIEA) and for U.S. students on financial aid (Gilman). There are also national scholarships, such as the Rotary scholarship, the NSEP scholarship and the Fulbright.

Gain Work/Volunteer Experience Overseas

Students interested in working abroad should come by the CIE for information about internships, volunteer organizations and paid work overseas. Many organizations help students obtain jobs and work permits, and some help to arrange housing as well. Students can choose from short experiences (1 to 2 months) to longer experiences (4 to 12 months), or even look into a more serious commitment (1 to 3 years). Destinations are available throughout the world.

Learn More About Study Abroad

Students who would like to learn more about study abroad opportunities and how they fit into a degree program, may come to the CIE. The staff will provide an overview of study abroad programs and requirements and have application forms available. Scholarship and financial aid information will also be available. Students may use the CIE library and computer to search for programs. Videos are also available.
