Agnew Prosecutor George Beall to Speak

George Beall, the prosecutor who led the investigation that culminated with the conviction and resignation of U.S. Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, will speak at FSU Tuesday, Sept. 30, at 11 a.m. in FSU's Lane University Center Atkinson Room (201).

The Frostburg native will discuss the events 30 years ago that thrust him, then a 35-year-old U.S. Attorney for Maryland, into the national spotlight. The lecture is free and open to the public.

At the height of the Watergate scandal, investigators in Maryland were looking into other corruption – that of kickbacks being paid to public officials by architects, engineers and contractors doing business with public agencies in the state. Before becoming Richard Nixon's vice president in 1969, Agnew had been governor of Maryland and a Baltimore County executive. Investigations pointed to misconduct by Agnew as far back as 1964.

With the investigation beginning to implicate Agnew, the possibility that the president and vice president would both face charges of official misconduct was a daunting possibility for the nation. Agnew resigned as Vice President on Oct. 10, 1973, pleading "no contest" to charges of tax evasion.

Beall's personal papers concerning the Agnew investigation and resignation are now housed in the Beall Archives at FSU's Ort Library, which also house the papers of his father, J. Glenn Beall, and his brother, J. Glenn Beall Jr., both of whom served in the U.S. Senate.

Beall was at the center of a unique and crucial turning point in our country. He has seldom spoken publicly about his role, making his appearance at FSU a rare opportunity for anyone interested in this important time in American history.

'Journey to a Hate Free Millennium' Presented

FSU's Division of Student and Educational Services will present the awardwinning documentary "Journey to a Hate Free Millennium" at 7 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 22 in the Lane University Center Manicur Assembly Hall. The event will also include a presentation by the film's producer/director Brent Scarpo.

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"Journey to a Hate Free Millennium" seeks solutions to ending hate and hate crimes. The film centers around true stories taken from national headlines including the student shootings at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado; the tortuous dragging death of James Byrd, Jr., an African-American man in Texas; and the brutal beating and death of Matthew Shepard, a gay college student in Wyoming.

The 35-minute documentary addresses the subject of hate by searching out the origins of how it is "taught and learned," the scope of its danger beginning with childhood taunting to murder. Viewers are invited to create their own vision of a world free of hate, where senseless acts of violence are a thing of the past. The program utilizes the documentary in an interactive, multi-media presentation that impacts and changes views of hate in their world.

Filmmaker Scarpo has 15 years of experience as a producer, writer, director, actor and casting director in Hollywood. In addition to his work on "Journey to a Hate Free Millennium," he is the founder of the non-profit New Light Media, which is dedicated to stimulate, educate and impact the world through multimedia works. Prior to founding New Light Media, Scarpo served as a casting director for six years casting television projects, commercials and motion pictures including "The Shawshank Redemption," "That Thing You Do" and "Air Force One."

'Joining to End Violence Against Women'

Former NFL Football player Donald McPherson will present the lecture "Men and Women: Joining Together to End Violence Against Women" at FSU on Tuesday, Sept. 23, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center Manicur Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

McPherson travels to various venues to discuss the issue of stopping violence against women. He and his work were profiled in the October 2002 issue of "0," Oprah Winfrey's magazine, and he was also a guest on the "Oprah Winfrey Show" that same year.

A native of West Hempstead, N.Y., McPherson is the founder and executive director of the Sports Leadership Institute at Adelphi University in Garden City, N.Y. He played for the Philadelphia Eagles for two seasons, before being traded to the Houston Oilers, only to return to Philadelphia. In 1991, he headed north to the Canadian Football League, joining the Hamilton Tiger-Cats (1991-93) and Ottawa Rough-Riders (1994).

Upon retiring from professional football in 1994, McPherson worked as co-director of Athletes in Service to America, director of Sports in Society's Mentors in Violence Prevention Program, a gender violence prevention program designed to encourage men to take a proactive position in the effort to stop men's violence against women.

As program coordinator of the Student-Athlete Leadership Program, McPherson trains thousands of high school student-athletes in motivational speaking and group work dynamics. His training includes mobilizing students within their respective school districts and communities to address selfesteem, substance abuse, violence prevention, bullying and teasing, and academic issues. By using sports as an educational tool, student athletes learn to teach, using their personal experiences as motivating examples for young people.

In 1997, Don was called to testify before the United States Congress on behalf of a resolution to create a national summit that would address violence in sport and society. He is regularly quoted in print articles and has been featured on several television shows including "A& E: Investigative Reports," MSNBC, Fox News, ABC's "Nightline," "The Phil Donahue Show" and Court TV and WNBC's "Today in New York."

Lyons has a rich background integrating social work and history, and he regularly teaches "The Vietnam War: Senior Seminar" and "The Holocaust and the American Experience." He is a professor of Social Work at Stockton College in Pomona, N.J. He also serves on the associated faculty in Historical Studies and the faculty in the Master's in Holocaust and Genocide Studies. He received his Ph.D. in Community Work and Policy from Bryn Mawr Graduate School of Social Work and Social Research in 1980.

Lyons' other books include "Philadelphia Communists, 1936 –1956;" "Class of '66: Living in Suburban Middle America" and "New Left, New Right, and the Legacy of the Sixties."



'It is the policy of FSU that the academic programs and services of the University shall be available to all qualified students who have been admitted to its programs, regardless of their religious beliefs. Students shall not be penalized because of observances of their religious holidays and shall be given an opportunity to make up, within a reasonable time period, any academic assignment that is missed due to the individual participation in religious observances. Allegheny Highlands Trail Annual Ride

Come and show your support for the construction of the Maryland section of this major interstate hiker/biker trail on Saturday, Sept. 27.

Participants will be riding from the Frostburg Depot to the Big Savage Tunnel along the proposed route of the AHTM. This ride will cover six miles up a gentle grade of one to two percent over a rough but not rugged surface of dirt and railroad ballast. With a mountain or hybrid bike children as young as ten should be able to handle this pleasant ride.

Notable features of this year's ride will be a tour of the almost completed trailhead at Frostburg and the newly completed Big Savage Tunnel. Bring lights if you wish to ride through the tunnel.

Registration and check-in will be at the Depot from 10 to 11 a.m. The group will be leaving the Depot at 11 a.m. and arriving at the Big Savage Tunnel about noon. The group will be returning to Frostburg about 1:30 p.m. where they will have lunch at the Whistle Stop Cafe and a briefing on the status and construction schedule for other sections of the Maryland section of this trail.

FSU has been awarded a five year continuation for the Upward Bound project. Funded by the U.S. Department of Education, Upward Bound helps Allegany County high school students to prepare for higher education. Participants receive instruction in literature, composition, mathematics and science on campus on Saturdays during the school year and daily throughout a six-week summer session. The project has helped hundreds of local students gain the preparation to enter and succeed in college during its 21 years at FSU. The FSU proposal received all 300 possible points from the field readers and was one of the toprated among the approximately 770 programs in operation throughout the United States. The grant, written by Tim Malloy, Connie Ralston and Elena Steele, will bring FSU at least \$1,934,690 during the five year grant cycle.


