The serious challenges facing the U.S. Congress in the coming years will be the focus of two former members of Congress when they enter into a bipartisan dialogue over a two-day event at FSU. All students, faculty, and staff are invited to attend any or all of the three forums.

The two former members will present their viewpoints on several topics of current interest and will then entertain questions from the audience. On Monday, there will be two sessions open to the campus community, one from 10 a.m. to noon entitled "Partisanship and Polarization in Congress," in Lane University Center 201; the second from 2 to 3:30 p.m., discussing "Entering the 21st Century: Challenges Facing the U.S. Congress," also in Lane University Center 201.

In addition, a reception for faculty members to meet the former members of Congress will be held on Monday, Oct. 17, from 4 to 5 p.m. in the Lewis J. Ort Library's Pearl Ort Room (4th floor).

Their visit culminates in a discussion open to the general public, repeating the topic, "Entering the 21st Century; Challenges Facing the U.S. Congress" at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 18, in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. The visit from the two former congressmen, William Goodling, a Republican from Pennsylvania, and James Lloyd, a Democrat from California, is an initiative of FSU's J. Glenn Beall Jr. Institute for Public Affairs, in conjunction with the Congress to Campus Program of the Stennis Center for Public Service.

Goodling represented Pennsylvania in Congress from 1975 to 2001, from the 94th to the 106th Congress. While in Congress, he served as chair of the Committee on Economic and Educational Opportunities and the Committee on Education and the Workforce. Before his political career, he held a number of teaching and administrative positions throughout Pennsylvania.

Lloyd was a member of Congress from 1974 to 1980, serving California from the 94th through the 96th Congress. He spent more than a decade as a Naval aviator. Later Lloyd and his wife, Jackie Lloyd, ran a public relations and advertising firm in West Covina, Calif., a city Lloyd served both as a city councilman and as mayor.

The Congress to Campus Program sends bipartisan pairs of former Members of Congress – one Democrat and one Republican – to visit college, university and community college campuses around the country.

Brady Health Center will offer flu shots for students staring Oct. 26. The cost is \$20, payable by cash, check or Bobcat Express. Students wishing to decrease their risk of getting influenza this season should call x4310 for an appointment.

Individuals at high risk of complications should be vaccinated and include:

- those with long-term health problems as heart disease, lung disease, asthma, kidney disease, metabolic disease, such as diabetes and anemia,
- those with a weakened immune system due to HIV/AIDS or other diseases affecting the immune system; those on long term treatment with drugs such as steroids and those on cancer treatments with x-rays or drugs,
- women who will be pregnant during the influenza season,
- those 65 years of age and older and all children age 6 to 23 months,

Individuals who can spread influenza to those at high risk, individuals who live in dormitories or under other crowded conditions and anyone else who wants to reduce their chance of getting influenza should consider vaccination

Economics majors Robbie Jenkins and **Adam Snyder** participated in the Undergraduate Workshop in Experimental Economics held in June at the Interdisciplinary Center for Economic Science at the Arlington campus of George Mason University. The five-day workshop was sponsored by the International Foundation for Research in Experimental Economics, an organization founded by Nobel Prize winner Vernon Smith. They were chosen through a selective process that accepted fewer than one-third of the applicants and were among an international group of students from toptier institutions. Faculty members from George Mason and the University of Pennsylvania presided over a series of seminars relating to various elements of economic theory. The student participants were challenged to apply the theories in computer simulations of realworld situations involving issues such as energy regulation, gasoline pricing and asset market pricing. The students also participated in a teleconference with Smith, who was awarded the 2002 Nobel Prize in Economic Science "for having established laboratory experiments as a tool of empirical economic analysis, especially in the study of alternative market mechanisms.
