Roots Music Series Brings Workshops to FSU

The Allegany Arts Council, in cooperation with Dr. Ken Roberts and WFWM Public Radio, will present musician workshops on bluegrass vocals, flat-picking guitar and bluegrass bass on Saturday, Oct. 28, as part of the "Roots Music Series" of workshops and concerts. The instructors will consist of members of the Kenny and Amanda Smith Band, winners of the International Bluegrass Music Association's prestigious "Emerging Artist of the Year" award in 2003. Amanda Smith will conduct a vocal workshop from 1-2:30 p.m. Kenny Smith, widely considered one of the most important and influential flat-picking-style guitarists of his generation and a two-time IBMA Guitarist of The Year winner, will hold a guitar workshop from 2:30-4 p.m. In addition, bassist Zachary McLamb will hold a bluegrass bass workshop from 2:30-4 p.m. The workshops will be held in rooms 328 and 358 of the Compton Science Center. Registration is \$25 a workshop.

The Roots Music Series was established to encourage and sustain "traditional" music in our community. The Roots Music Series showcases a variety of musical traditions, such as bluegrass, folk, country, blues and gospel, in order to educate, instruct and nurture local musicians, and to increase awareness and interest in these important art forms among area residents.

FSU Alum To Give Reading Of Novel

FSU's Center for Creative Writing is pleased to announce its first visiting writer for the fall semester. Frostburg alumnus and Garrett County resident Roger Alan Skipper, the author of *Tear Down the Mountain: An Appalachian Love Story*, will give a reading at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 26, in the Cordts PE Center Leake Room.

Born in the Appalachian mountains of Western Maryland, Skipper received a public school vocational education, then served in the U.S. Navy during the Vietnam era. A career in the construction/building supply industry progressed from menial jobs to a top-level management position in a multi-store retail outlet.

In 1999, at the age of 47 and shortly after paying his youngest son's final

college tuition bill, Skipper resigned his position to pursue companion lifetime goals: his own college education and a career as a novelist. The award of the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Graduate Scholarship following his graduation from FSU propelled him to a graduate degree in writing. Skipper lives near his birthplace in the mountains, where he writes, hunts wild ginseng, picks the banjo and builds musical instruments.

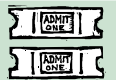

Students who aspire to receive a Ph.D. and faculty and staff who can recommend students with Ph.D. potential are invited to attend an information session on the 2007 McNair Scholars Program on Monday, Oct. 30, in the Leake Room, Cordts PE Center. The director of the University of Maryland, College Park McNair Program (with seven places reserved for FSU students) will be visiting to speak with faculty and staff only at 10:00 a.m. and with faculty and students at 11:00 a.m. Current participants will display their research and be available to answer questions.

To be eligible, a student must be a low-income, first-generation college student or be from a group that is traditionally underrepresented in graduate education programs (such as Hispanic, African American, or Native American students, or women in science and technology). The ideal candidates will have completed their sophomore year by May 2007 and have a GPA of 2.8 or higher. Juniors also are considered. Participants receive unparalleled support, including two paid summer research experiences, coursework and assistance in preparing for graduate school. The application deadline for summer 2007 is before Thanksgiving.

Points of Pride



Kathleen Powell, associate professor of social work, recently facilitated a workshop at the 28th Annual International Symposium on Social Work with Groups Oct. 12-15 in San Diego. The workshop was based on her sabbatical project, which focused on narrative approaches with older adults. Her sabbatical enabled her to work with groups of older adults in the four senior centers in Allegany County. The groups utilized a variety of creative approaches to enable participants to explore their own life stories. Stories resulting from the groups will be published in a book that will be distributed through the Allegany County Human Resources Development Commission, the agency that sponsors the local senior centers.

Francis Tam, professor of physics & engineering, conducted a hands-on and minds-on active physics electrostatics and electric current workshop with Washington County Public Schools secondary school teachers on Oct. 12, and another one for elementary school teachers on Oct. 13. The workshops are under a grant from MSDE Math-Science Partnership, "Physics - Unraveled: The Treads of the Universe," with Washington County and Howard County.

Dr. Spencer Deakin, Director of Counseling, co-presented at the 2006 Association of University and College Counseling Directors conference in Vail, Colo. The panel presentation was titled "Moving into a New Paradigm: Campus-Wide Collaboration for Prevention and the Care of Students."

University Police has won the Maryland State Governor's Crime Prevention Award for the 17th time since 1990. FSU Police won the award under Category A, which includes efforts on all fronts of crime prevention. The purpose of the award, stated by the application,

is "to recognize those departments who have incorporated an overall outstanding crime prevention program as an integral part of their daily operations."

In order to win the award, University Police implemented personal, residential and commercial security programs, as well as provided crime prevention training and public information/media activities and officer recognition for crime prevention. The University Police have also supported the National Crime Prevention "McGruff" campaign by displaying the character on posters throughout campus and in the residence halls.

University Police also offered training presentations for university employees and used e-mail and a weekly column in the FSU student newspaper as means to inform the campus community about crime prevention.
