FSU's 2006-2007 International Film Series begins with "Fahrenheit 911" at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 28, in the Lane University Center Atkinson room 201. The series is sponsored by FSU Center Stage.

One of the most controversial and provocative films of the 21st century, "Fahrenheit 9/11" is Academy Awardwinning filmmaker Michael Moore's searing examination of the Bush administration's actions in the wake of the tragic events of 9/11. The film shows us a nation kept in constant fear by FBI alerts and lulled into accepting a piece of controversial legislation, the USA Patriot Act. "Fahrenheit 9/11" takes us inside the war in Iraq to tell the stories we haven't heard, illustrating the awful human cost to U.S. soldiers and their families.

opens one hour prior to curtain. Group discounts are available when booked in advance.




# UPC Presents Rock Band 'Alternate Routes'

"Alternate Routes" is a young, dynamic rock band with a strong emphasis on songwriting and storytelling. The group, which recently released its debut album, "Good and Reckless and True," was formed in 2002 when vocalist/guitarist Tim Warren and guitarist/vocalist Eric Donnelly began collaborating and found that despite different respective styles and major influences, they shared a similar vision of the songwriting process and a strong desire to develop a style that was uniquely their own. # Five Artists Combine Creativity in Exhibition

An exhibition at FSU's Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery is taking a closer look at how the passage of time and images from dreams shape memory and imagination. Featuring a colorful mix of paintings, collages and other works by four distinct artists, "Instigators of Memory" will be on view at the gallery through Sept. 27.


Gail Watkins, an artist based in Annapolis, Md., creates richly collaged abstract paintings that play with perceptions of time by fusing the Pop art aesthetic of American comic strips with ancient motifs and antiqued surfaces.

Connecticut-based Ann Weiner also relies on familiar imagery in her mixedmedia artwork. Weiner uses antique dolls, emblems of childhood and innocence, to depict the progress of a spiritual journey.

Elizabeth Austin, an artist who lives in Paris and New Hampshire, paints otherworldly landscapes on the reverse side of thick, plastic panels.

Marian Bingham, or Bing as she is professionally known, also infuses her paintings and photographs with familiar imagery that is timeless and unforgettable.

**Karen Treber**, General Counsel of FSU, was featured in the Aug. 13 edition of USA Weekend. She was one of four "Parents Who Make Schools Better" chosen from across the United States. Each year in a back-to-school issue, USA Weekend salutes parents who are making a real difference in their local schools. Their dedication is a benefit to the kids around them—and an inspiration to the rest of us.

Treber was cited for making math fun for elementary students. After attending Maryland Parent Leadership Institute workshops two years ago—modeled after Kentucky's groundbreaking Center for Parent Leadership at the Prichard Committee—Treber decided to focus on boosting academic performance in the often-tricky topic. Treber thought, Why not make math a sport? Hence, the concept of "Mathletics" was born. Nearly half the students came to Frost Elementary on a school night to be a part of the program, which included many math activities turned into games, with all the students and parents dressed in their favorite team's uniform, AYSO soccer shirt, even a Green Bay Packers cheesehead.

Ahmad Tootoonchi, chair of the Department of Management, recently announced that the *College of Business* has established its own refereed journal for the first time in its history. *Journal of International Business Disciplines* has been recognized as a refereed publication and will soon be printed in the Cabell's Directory of Publications, which is well known in the institutions of higher education globally. ## Voter Registration Campaign Resumes

The Student Center for Volunteerism and Brothers of Iota Phi Theta's Raise Your Vote Voter Registration Campaign resumes on Monday, Sept. 25.

The results of the first part of the campaign are: 63 Maryland voters were assisted in getting absentee ballots and one Delaware voter was assisted in getting an absentee ballot.

This marks the second part of the campaign, which began at the start of the semester. During this part of the campaign, students will be able to register to vote in the Maryland General Election. Also, students can request absentee ballots for their home states' elections.

Any student who needs to register to vote or would like to pick up an absentee ballot application can visit our table in the Lane University Center, Second Floor Lobby, every Monday and Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The tables will run from Monday, Sept. 25, to Thursday, Oct. 12. A last chance to register to vote for the Maryland General Election will be held from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 12. A last chance to request absentee ballots will be held on Wednesday, Oct. 25, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

With this being an election year, there are many groups that are trying to help students to register to vote or request absentee ballots. We would like to remind the students planning to register to vote or who are planning to request absentee ballots to make sure that the person from whom they are requesting help to register is certified to register people to vote in the state of Maryland. If you have any questions, please make sure to ask to see the volunteers' certification card as proof of their certification.

If you are trying to register someone to vote and you are not a certified Voter Registration Volunteer, you could be fined or even serve jail time for performing this act illegally. 


# Join in on Day of Caring and Sharing


### Spend a Semester in Cyprus

### Emergency Evacuation Procedures

For Staff, Faculty and Students:

• All employees and students shall be familiar with a primary and an alternate evacuation route from each area within the building where they work. The individual instructor shall be familiar with a primary and an alternate evacuation route from each area where he or she teaches. These procedures should be shared with students during the first meeting of each class and each time a fire alarm is sounded. Evacuation routes are any clear hallway that leads to the stairs and/or directly outside.

• Emergency evacuation from the building when the alarm is sounded applies to all faculty during teaching and non-teaching times.

• DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR.

• When an alarm sounds, immediately evacuate the building in a safe and orderly manner. The instructor shall immediately release the class, telling the students to proceed in a safe and orderly manner to the nearest clear stairs (exit). Be sure to remind them, "DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR." The instructor shall also evacuate immediately.

• Take your books, coat and other personal items.

• Assist any individual requiring additional help with directions to the stairs or directly outside.

• Instruct all occupants that you may

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# meet while evacuating to evacuate the building immediately.

• When safely out of the building contact the University Police at x4222 by cell phone or from another building.

• Do not congregate at the entrance of the building. Move across the sidewalk or the street away from the building. The instructor will assist in preventing students and other occupants from congregating near the building exits.

• No one shall re-enter the building the University Police give the "all clear."

• When safely out of the building, contact the University Police at x4222 by cell phone or from another building.
