

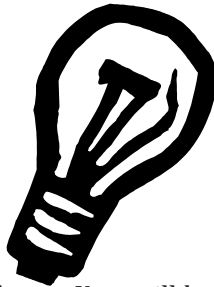

FSU Focuses on Entrepreneurship, Environment



2nd Trident Initiative Conference Sept. 6-7

The Trident Initiative at FSU and the U.S. Small Business Administration's Western Maryland SCORE Chapter 682, will host their second annual conference, "The Odyssey ... From Entrepreneurial Opportunity to Regional Economic Prosperity," on Thursday, Sept. 6, and Friday, Sept. 7, in FSU's Lane University Center.

The event focuses on possibilities for collaboration within the tri-state region of Western Maryland, southwestern Pennsylvania and northern West Virginia in order to foster regional economic development. This year's conference will also feature an in-depth FastTrac® workshop called "Listening to Your Business," offered by the Kauffman Foundation, and include case studies that depict the entrepreneurial "odyssey" of a new business and establish the linkage between entrepreneurial initiative and economic progress for the surrounding region.

This conference also recognizes and honors leading entrepreneurs of the region with a view to showcasing the region's best practices in small business. Accordingly, two awards, Model Entrepreneur of the Year and Young Entrepre-

neur of the Year, will be presented at the conference.

The conference will be of interest to aspiring as well as practicing entrepreneurs, the academic community of students, faculty and staff of regional educational institutions, economic development agencies, city governments, as well as the region's citizenry at large. The program consists of hands-on, practical and educational forums, with the participation and presentation by regional business resource providers and representatives from governmental agencies and academic institutions.

Renewable Energy Symposium All Set

Learn more about the possibilities of new energy sources and energy conservation methods, ideas, products and practices when FSU hosts the Renewable Energy Symposium and Exhibition Sept. 14 and 15 at the Compton Science Center on campus.

The two-day gathering, organized by FSU's Dr. Oguz Soysal and Hilkat Soysal, in collaboration with the Maryland Energy Administration, will bring together various facets of the academic and professional community from around the region, including faculty and students, entrepreneurs, small business owners, local and state administrators, legislators, media and industry representatives. The conference will explore topics such as a critical assessment of wind and solar energy potential; the socio-economic implications, design considerations and financial incentives of wind and solar energy; and the environmental impacts associated with wind and solar energy development.

The conference will also offer the public an opportunity to check out FSU's new Wind-Solar Energy Genera-

tion System (WISE) that was constructed near the Fuller House at 19 Braddock Road this summer. The grid-connected hybrid generation system, which features a 1.8 kW Skystream 3.7 wind turbine mounted on a 33-foot monopole

tower and 10 solar panels, was constructed as part of a University-wide project Dr. Soysal began in 2006 with funding from a Maryland Energy Administration grant. In addition to the presentation of many papers highlighting ideas and challenges in renewable energy, the conference will also include displays of various renewable energy products and projects.

The Symposium and Exhibition are open to the public for a small registration fee to cover distributed materials and lunch. Registration is \$20 for students, \$60 for non-student participants. Interested parties may also register on site at the conference.

A student can register/pay and take the BITS Test only once per semester. NO credits are associated and/or available with this option. All students, faculty and staff are urged to sign up for the e2Campus™ emergency notification system that was implemented to alert the FSU community in case of emergencies or campus evacuations. You can opt to receive text messages on your cell phone, e-mail or both.

From the FSU home page (www.frostburg.edu), look for the technology link at top right, and select Text Messaging Alerts. You will be prompted to insert your FSU user name and password, then you will be taken to the signup page. When signing up, you must have the cell phone in your possession or be logged into the e-mail address you are using so you can respond to the validation code that will be sent.

Participation is free, although depending on your individual cell phone plan, there may be a small charge to receive messages. You may also opt for notification of weather-related class cancellations as well.

Check Out 'Science Sundays'

FSU presents "Science Sundays" this year, with free programs offered in both the Tawes Hall Planetarium and the Compton Science Center Exploratorium every Sunday.

The 45-minute Planetarium shows are at 4 and 7 p.m., followed by a 30-minute tour at approximately 5 and 8 p.m. of the Exploratorium, which will feature revolving displays of FSU's extensive collection of mammal specimens from around the world.

This fall, the Planetarium will explore the solar system, with shows on "The Inner Planets" in September, "The Giant Planets" in October and "Solar System Dwarfs" in November. The Exploratorium will feature African mammals, a display of satellite photos called "Earth as Art" and a Smithsonian exhibit on food traditions called "Key Ingredients" (from Sept. 28 to Nov. 10 only).

During the winter, the Planetarium will investigate "Heavenly Connections" in December, "Music of the Heavens" in January and "Calendars Around the World" in February. The Exploratorium will show North American mammals such as brown bears, mountain lions, antelopes and wolves.

In the spring, the Planetarium's focus

will be "The Ancients and Sky" in March, "Animal Sky Stories" in April and "Report on Planet Earth" in May. Eurasian mammals such as wild boars, Argali sheep, Saiga antelope and sloth bears will be on view in the Exploratorium.

Get a Taste at 'Key Ingredients'

Everyday meals and celebrations across America are rooted in historical, regional and social traditions. These traditions, including those associated with Western Maryland, will be highlighted in a series of activities this fall, including a local showing of "Key Ingredients: America by Food," a Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition that will be on view at FSU's Compton Science Center Exploratorium Sept. 28 to Nov. 10.

FSU and the surrounding community have been expressly chosen by the Maryland Humanities Council and the Smithsonian Institution to host "Key Ingredients" as part of the Museum on Main Street project, a national/state partnership that brings exhibitions and programs to rural cultural organizations.

Through a selection of artifacts, photographs and illustrations, "Key Ingredients" examines how culture, ethnicity, landscape and tradition influence foods and flavors. The exhibition looks at the evolution of the American kitchen and how food industries have responded to the technological innovations that have enabled Americans to choose an ever-wider variety of frozen, prepared and fresh foods.

An interactive Web site, www.keyingredients.org, has been developed in conjunction with the exhibition. The site invites people across the country to share their family recipes and food stories, learn about other food traditions and identify favorite small town eateries.

"Key Ingredients" is part of Museum on Main Street, a unique collaboration between the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES), state humanities councils across the nation and local host institutions. Speed Through Shakespeare

Ever wonder what William Shakespeare's most memorable scenes would be like if they were performed in fast forward, hitting all the highlights? Don't miss the chance to find out when FSU's Cultural Events Series presents a laugh-out-loud parody of Shakespeare's most timeless tales of love and tragedy in "The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged)" at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 19, in the Lane University Center's Alice R. Manicur Hall.

An off-Broadway smash hit and the longest running comedy in London, this roller-coaster tribute to the immortal bard manages to condense his 37 plays and 154 sonnets into a hysterical two-hour performance by three actors. All 16 comedies become one story featuring a shipwreck, an influential duke and three sets of identical twins. Irreverent and hilarious, the dauntless cast speeds through 75 different characters, dozens of costumes and nearly 100 props. And in the true spirit of Shakespeare's Globe, "Shakespeare Abridged" requires its performers to improvise.

Audience members who are interested in making this performance a unique dinner theatre experience may purchase a \$25 ticket that includes admission to the show as well as a choice of a delectable meal featuring either a steak or vegetable primavera entrée. 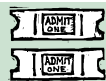

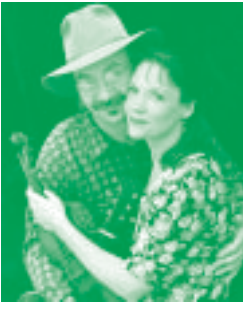


Celebrate Appalachian Culture at Festival

The public is invited to learn more about the region's rich cultural heritage during FSU's Second Annual Appalachian Festival Sept. 21 and 22. The event brings together a variety of performers and craftspeople to celebrate the natural landscape, history, food and musical and artistic offerings of Western Maryland and the surrounding areas. Film, live music performances, storytelling and public demonstrations of timeless traditions are among the countless festivities that make up this year's event, many of which are free and open to the public and suitable for the whole family.

The Appalachian Festival kicks things off with a special screening of two films at 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 21, at downtown Frostburg's historic Palace Theatre on Main Street. The Palace will show "The True Meaning of Pictures" by Jennifer Baichwal, a documentary that examines the work of Shelby Lee Adams, a photographer who takes pictures of Appalachian "mountain people." "Ready for Harvest: Clearcutting in the Southern Appalachians" by Anne Lewis Johnson, a film that explores the complex questions associated with extensive logging in the Southern Appalachian Mountains, will also be viewed. Tickets to see both films are \$5.50 and may be purchased at the door.

Then Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., FSU's Upper Quad comes alive with a variety of activities, demonstrations and music performances, all free and open to the public. Regional music, displays and sales of traditional arts and crafts, Appalachian food, history presentations, children's activities, environmental talks, storytelling and more will be going on throughout the day. Featured musicians include the Allegheny Drifters, Sparky and Rhonda Rucker, FSU's own Greg Latta, the Critton Hollow String Band and many more. Festival goers can also enjoy handmade crafts, including spinning, seat caning and quilting, created by

and Molly Mason at 7:30 p.m. at the Palace Theatre. Ungar and Mason perform a variety of musical selections, including hard-driving Appalachian melodies, Cajun and Celtic fiddle tunes, stirring Civil War classics, sassy songs from the Golden Age of swing and country and moving original works. Playing together since the late 1970s, they gained widespread recognition for their soundtrack work in Ken Burns' PBS series, "The Civil War," including the haunting performance of Ungar's original composition, "Ashokan Farewell."

Tickets for the Ungar and Mason concert are available for purchase at Frostburg's Main Street Books (2 E. Main St.) and at the Allegany Arts Council in Cumberland (52 Baltimore St.). Tickets are \$15 general admission; \$13 in advance; \$8 for students and children 17 and younger. Allegany Arts Council members can pay \$12 for an advance ticket or \$13 at the door.

The book is composed of two sequences of poems. The first is based on 20 drawings from a Depression-era book for kids on putting circus on in one's hometown. Each prose poem shares a title with the figures, though that's where the similarities end. The book includes reproductions of several of the drawings. The other sequence features "Clown Baby" a child born a clown but not of clowns.
