Fairy Zales Kick Off UZ Season

'Into the Woods' Opens Oct. 12

FSU's University Theatre invites audiences to become enchanted by the power of storytelling when it presents the Tony Award-winning musical "Into the Woods." "Into the Woods," with music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim and book by James Lapine, kicks off UT's Main Stage season, with performances at 7:30 p.m. on Oct. 12, 13, 18, 19 and 20 and matinee showings at 2 p.m. on Oct. 13 and 20 in FSU's Drama Theatre.

A dark yet beguiling take on Brothers Grimm fairy tales, "Into the Woods" weaves together the familiar stories of "Cinderella," "Jack and the Beanstalk," "Rapunzel" and "Little Red Riding Hood" to tell the tale of a baker and his wife who cannot have a child until they break the curse of the witch who lives next door. With wit, wisdom and a magical score, the musical explores the loss of innocence, the price paid for getting the things you really want and what happens after "happily ever after."

Residents of Allegany County have much to look forward to during the fall: the spectacular showcase of trees changing color, cool, sunny days in the mountains— and the annual performance of Hagerstown's acclaimed Maryland Symphony Orchestra, a concert that draws classical music enthusiasts from throughout the region.

Under the exuberant baton of music

director and conductor Elizabeth Schulze, the Maryland Symphony Orchestra will perform its much-anticipated annual fall concert at 8 p.m. Friday, Oct. 12, in FSU's Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. The performance features guest artist and virtuoso pianist Yuja Wang and includes major works in the true romantic style: Smetana's "Bartered Bride Overture" and the deeply emotional "Symphony No. 7" by Dvorák.

Twenty-year-old pianist Yuja Wang, a recipient of the prestigious 2006 Gilmore Young Artist Award, provides the centerpiece of this program, performing the "Piano Concerto: No. 1" by

Tchaikovsky. Wang's virtuosity and poise have critics raving—her January 2008 Kennedy Center appearance has already sold out.

Enjoy a spirited evening of folk dancing and music and learn what makes North America's cultural history so vibrant when FSU presents the North American Festival of Traditional Arts with a daytime percussive dance workshop at 2:30 p.m. and an evening concert at 7:30 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 14.

The North American Festival of Traditional Arts showcases heroes of folk music and dance from Mexico, French Canada and the Southern Appalachian region of the United States in a lively demonstration of the Spanish, French and English heritage in the continent of North America. Check out how each nationality has created its own unique folk music with singing styles and instrumental virtuosity, complemented by percussive dance.

Kick up your heels and learn a few steps of your own earlier in the day by checking out a free percussive dance workshop at 2:30 p.m. in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall in FSU's Lane University Center. Participants will be introduced to three styles of folk dancing: Quebecois, a precise and rapid step dance similar to Irish step dance; Southern Appalachian clogging, a more relaxed and freewheeling dance style with high kicks and jumps, and veracruzano, a physically aggressive style with metered stomping that creates a powerful percussive drive. Then later that evening, the North American Festival of Traditional Arts brings its talented performers to the stage for a concert beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Performing Art Center's Pealer Recital Hall. Take a cultural tour without leaving your seat as dancers demonstrate steps and styles from Mexico, French Canada and the South Appalachian region, performed to diverse folk music. Father, Daughter Combine Creativity

Painter Jennifer L. Collins and sculptor

Charlie Brouwer celebrate their talents as respective artists and honor their relationship as father and daughter in the upcoming exhibition, "This Time, This Place," a show that highlights collaborative pieces they created together, as well as their individual works. "This Time, This Place" will be on view Oct. 5 through Oct. 28 at the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery, with a free, public reception from 6 to 9 p.m. Friday, Oct. 5, that includes a gallery talk from 6 to 7 p.m. in Fine Arts room 132.

Collins and Brouwer first noticed the visible and meaningful similarities in their imagery, themes, metaphors and aesthetic vision when the two first exhibited together in 1998, similarities Collins says reflect their natural relationship as father and daughter. The title of the exhibition, "This Time, This Place," refers to Collins' focus on making paintings that always are based on what the world looks like; she paints specific times and places. Unlike Collins, Brouwer usually pulls the subjects of his work from his imagination, which creates a dynamic collaboration between the two artists.

Civil War Display on View at Library

A new display in Lewis J. Ort Library on view through October commemorates the 145th anniversary of the Civil War's Battle of Antietam, the largest Civil War battle fought in Maryland. On Sept. 17, 1862, Union and Confederate armies clashed on the outskirts of Sharpsburg, just 85 miles east of Frostburg. The battle resulted in nearly 23,000 casualties, becoming the bloodiest single day of the war. The Union victory ultimately resulted in President Lincoln's issuing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Get a Taste at 'Key Ingredients'

"Key Ingredients: America by Food," a Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition that delves into the historical, regional and social traditions that merge in everyday meals and celebrations of the American table, will be on view at the FSU Compton Exploratorium through Nov. 10.

Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas, Assistant Professor of Sociology at FSU, and a committee of area residents including educators, farmers, agriculture extension

agents, historians and artists have created a number of complementary programs and exhibits featuring regional foodways. Three of those exhibits on display with the Smithsonian exhibition are "Cookbooks Through the Ages," which shares a sampling of the history of gional and U.S. cookbooks from the

loan from regional museum collections to test the memory and knowledge of exhibition guests.

Avoid Slip-ups

Here are some safety tips from State Injured Worker's Insurance Fund on how to prevent slips, trips and falls, both here and at home.

Keep all cables, wires and cords, away from walkways; use cord covers.

When you see a paper clip, nail, piece of paper, a pen or pencil, pick it up.

Clean up or report all wet spots to the Physical Plant Staff.

Use caution when walking over loose or broken floor tile, brick, pavement. Watch for loose gravel or stone. Make sure that all rugs are tacked down and not frayed. Report worn or loose spots on carpet or flooring to the Physical Plant Staff.

Use the hand railing when using stairs. Don't carry a load that you can't see over or around, and make sure one hand is free to use the railing. Make sure stairways and hallways are well-lighted.

Be sure that your pants, dresses and skirts aren't so long that they catch your foot while walking.
