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FSU Students' 'Issues' Open Their Eyes to Art

Ask Francesca Pehr to explain the unique power of expression visual art offers, and you'll get a thoughtful and mature answer.

"Artwork can use words to express an idea, but unlike writing, you also have the benefit of line, color, shape, light, value, perspective, unity and other elements and principles that let you communicate ideas and feelings that words cannot always grasp," she says.

As a freshman enrolled in the Art and Design Learning Community at FSU, Pehr is using artwork to address sexual abuse for the class' upcoming exhibition, "We've Got Issues," on view Nov. 2 through Nov. 7 at FSU's Lane University Center Loft. Organized by the class and featuring works

they created this semester, "We've Got Issues" highlights the talents of FSU's art students and reflects what they have

learned from their course together. The exhibition opens with a free, public reception from 4 to 6 p.m. Friday, Nov. 2, at the Lane University Center Loft.

The University's Learning Communities program groups like-minded students together to brave introductory courses in their shared areas of academic interest. Instructor Trish Limbaugh coordinates the Art and Design Learning Community with Randall Rhodes, chair of the visual arts department. During the course, she takes students on fieldtrips to American art landmarks like Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater in Pennsylvania and notable museums in Washington, D.C. To prepare for the "We've Got Issues" show, students must do extensive research on their specific topics and how they've been depicted in art, write artist statements and design a postcard and poster.

"By giving students the 'real-life' experience of planning an exhibit and

creating the artwork, they can experience firsthand the life of a working artist and then decide for themselves based on their own reactions, and not on the opinions of others, whether they want to make the commitment to art and to the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree," Limbaugh said.

For "We've Got Issues," each student selected a current topic or problem—Hurricane Katrina, depression, environmental destruction and the effect the military has on families are among the countless subjects explored in the show. As serious as the content is, the title itself is both literal and tongue-in-cheek. "We've Got Issues" perfectly sums

everything up without taking ourselves too seriously," says Alice Groesbeck, a student who is creating artwork that uses mushrooms to address body image.

"I read about how mushrooms can release spores into the air and contaminate everything around them, causing other plants to grow a sometimes poisonous fungus," Groesbeck says. "I realized this could be a powerful metaphor for peer pressure and how one person's negativity can easily influence another person's thoughts... I hope that by drawing a mushroom infecting a flower to represent body image, the viewer will be affected by my piece and remember it later on."

Live Green

StateLines is introducing a new section devoted to useful information on how to "live green" as part of **FSU's Green Campus Initiative**. Below, please find some helpful tips on how to save energy. Look for more tips in upcoming editions:

- Appliances use 40 percent of their energy when turned off. Unplug these items (CD players, toasters, TVs) when not in use.

- Electric hot water is one of the biggest energy users in most rural homes. Installing a hot water heater timer (\$39.99) could reduce your electric bill from 10 to 50 percent, depending on your hot water usage.

- As the seasons change, shorter days can mean an increased need for lighting. Use compact fluorescent light bulbs, which use 75 percent less energy than their incandescent counterparts and last up to 10 times as long.

- Install a programmable thermostat. Why heat the house when no one is home? Program a thermostat to reflect your daily and weekly habits and save up to \$150 during the first year of the thermostat's operation.

Get a Taste at 'Key Ingredients'

"Key Ingredients: America by Food," a Smithsonian Institution traveling exhibition that delves into the historical, regional and social traditions that merge

in everyday meals and celebrations of the American table, will be on view at the FSU Compton Exploratorium **through Nov. 10**.

Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas, Assistant Professor of Sociology at FSU, and a committee of area residents have created a number of complementary programs and exhibits featuring regional foodways. Speaker Sheds Light on Sudan

John Bul Dau, one of the "Lost Boys of Sudan," will speak about his journey

from growing up in war-torn Sudan to his position now as a prominent public voice raising awareness about the plight of Sudanese in U.S and around the world on **Wednesday, Nov. 7**, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall.

In 1987, Bul Dau's village was attacked by government troops involved in civil war between the Muslim-controlled government in northern Sudan and the non-Muslims in southern Sudan. The attack scattered his family, and Dau was forced to travel for three months on foot to reach relative safety in Ethiopia. Dau stayed in a refugee camp in Ethiopia for four years until civil war broke out once again, and he was forced to flee. He wandered hundreds of miles and faced disease, starvation and violence until finally arriving in Kenya. After several years in a refugee camp in Kenya, Dau was sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church in Skaneateles, N.Y., arriving in the United States in 2001.

Dau has succeeded in the U.S. He has been able to bring his sister, mother and fiancée from Sudan, works 60 hours a week as a security guard and received an associate's degree at Onondago Community College. He is currently pursuing a degree at Syracuse University's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs.

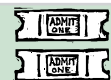
Additionally, Dau has begun two non-profit organizations to help Sudanese youth in Syracuse and throughout the United States. His move to the U.S. and early experiences in Sudan are the subject of the film "God Grew Tired of Us," and he is the author of a memoir by the same name.

For this year's campaign, registration tables will be in the Lane University Center from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Wednesdays, **Nov. 14** and **Dec. 5**.

Here are a few tips :

1. If you need to change your party affiliation, your application must be received at the Board of Elections office Monday, **Nov. 19**, by 9 p.m.
2. The last day to register to vote in the Maryland Primary Election is Tuesday, **Jan. 22**, at 9 p.m.
3. When you register, please make sure the person who registers you is certified to do so in Maryland. If they can't produce a certification card, don't register with them.
4. If you need an absentee ballot, make sure you request one early. The deadline to make a request for the Primary by mail or fax is Tuesday, **Feb. 5**. To apply after that date (through Election Day), you must apply in person at your local board of elections.
5. If you choose to mail your form, make sure it is postmarked on the deadline date or earlier, or your vote won't count.

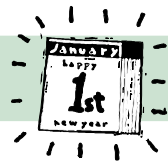
