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## Dance Show Highlights Choreographer's Career



### 'Essential Graham' at FSU Nov. 12-13

Witness the spirited movement and groundbreaking choreography of one of America's most visionary artists when "Essential Graham: Classics from the Martha Graham Dance Company" comes to FSU's Cultural Events Series for evening performances at 7:30 p.m. on **Nov. 12** and **Nov. 13** in FSU's Drama Theatre. This concert brings some of the most exciting moments in the history of dance to the beautiful mountains of Western Maryland.

Founded in 1926 by American dancer and master choreographer Martha Graham—a seminal artist of the 20th century, alongside Picasso, Stravinsky, James Joyce and Frank Lloyd Wright—the Martha Graham Dance Company is one of the oldest and most celebrated contemporary dance companies in the world. In this 80th anniversary season repertory, the company will treat audiences to the whole spectrum of Graham's unique scope and vision, with everything from the power and simplicity of her early solos and all-female

group works to the complex drama and virtuosity of her acclaimed masterpieces.

The evening begins with early solo works from Graham's formative years when she was an artist who burst onto America's cultural scene with theatrical innovations that revolutionized every area of the arts: "Serenata Morisca" (1916), a sensual "serenade" performed by the favorite of a king or Shah; "Lamentation" (1930), an iconic solo that reflects Graham's visceral movement style and her pioneering use of fabric and stage design; "Satyric Festival Song" (1932), a witty selection in which Graham mocks her own serious image, exhibiting a new range of emotions; and "Deep Song" (1937), a classic lament that was created in reaction to the oppression of the Spanish Civil War.

The performance continues with "El Penitente," which features choreography

and costumes by Graham, music by Louis Horst and a set by the renowned sculptor Isamu Noguchi. This selection, which first debuted in 1940, explores the ancient rites of the American Southwest's penitents, a sect that believes in purification from sin through severe penance. The concert continues with "Errand Into the Maze," with choreography and costumes by Graham, music by Gian Carlo Menotti and set by

#### Campus-wide Forum Tomorrow in Dunkle



#### Speaker Sheds Light on Sudan

John Bul Dau, one of the "Lost Boys of Sudan," will speak about his journey from growing up in war-torn Sudan to his position now as a prominent public voice raising awareness about the plight of Sudanese in U.S and around the world on **Wednesday, Nov. 7**, at 7 p.m. in the Lane University Center Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall.

In 1987, Bul Dau's village was attacked by government troops involved in civil war between the Muslim-controlled government in northern Sudan and the non-Muslims in southern

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Noguchi. This work first debuted in 1947 and depicts the maze of the heart's darkness in its battle with the Creature of Fear. Following an intermission, the performance proceeds with "Embattled Garden" (1958), a whimsical story about the Garden of Love and how it is

affected by the knowledge of the world outside. "Embattled Garden" features choreography and costumes by Graham, music by Carlos Surinach and set by Noguchi.

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Sudan. The attack scattered his family, and Dau was forced to travel for three months on foot to reach relative safety in Ethiopia. Dau stayed in a refugee camp in Ethiopia for four years until civil war broke out once again, and he was forced to flee. He wandered hundreds of miles and faced disease, starvation and violence until finally arriving in Kenya. After several years in a refugee camp in Kenya, Dau was sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church in Skaneateles, N.Y., arriving in the United States in 2001.

Despite the initial culture shock of seeing women driving cars and huge stores filled with food, Dau has succeeded in the U.S. He has been able to bring his sister, mother and fiancée from Sudan, works 60 hours a week as a security guard and received an associate's degree at Onondago Community College. He is currently pursuing a degree at Syracuse University's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs.

Additionally, Dau has begun two non-profit organizations to help Sudanese youth in Syracuse and throughout the United States. His move to the U.S. and early experiences in Sudan are the subject of the film "God Grew Tired of Us," and he is the author of a memoir by the same name.

Organized by the class and featuring works they created this semester, "We've Got Issues" highlights the talents of FSU's art students and reflects what they have learned from their course together. **The exhibition opens with a free, public reception from 4 to 6 p.m. Friday, Nov. 9, at the Lane University Center Loft.**

The University's Learning Communities program groups like-minded students together to brave introductory courses in their shared areas of academic interest. Instructor Trish Limbaugh coordinates the Art and Design Learning Community with Randall Rhodes, chair of the visual arts department. During the course, she takes students on fieldtrips to American art landmarks like Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater in Pennsylvania and notable museums in Washington, D.C. ### 411 on Weather-Related School Closings

Here are a few guidelines for finding out if FSU will experience a closing or delay on bad weather days:

Information will be available at the MAIN UNIVERSITY NUMBER (x4000, option 2). You can access the system after 6 a.m. for the most reliable, up-to-date information regarding delayed openings and cancellations. Instructions are attached. Notification of delays or closures will also be made on the main page of the FSU Web site ([www.frostburg.edu](http://www.frostburg.edu)) and through campus e-mail.

You may also register for text message or e-mail notification through the new e2Campus text messaging notification system. If you haven't signed up yet, go to the "Technology" link on the FSU home page ([www.frostburg.edu](http://www.frostburg.edu)), choose "Text Messaging Alerts" and follow the instructions. You must use your FSU user name and password to access the site. Don't forget to do the final verification portion of the signup, or you won't receive the messages.

FSU still subscribes to [www.schoolsout.com](http://www.schoolsout.com), which offers e-

mail and text message notification. Visit the site to learn more.

Unless FSU closure is announced on voice-mail or the radio—WE ARE OPEN. On most cancellation days, the University will be closed until 5 p.m. A decision on evening classes and events will be made by 3 p.m. that day. Likewise, the message under option 2 at the main University number will either announce the closure, or announce, "There are no closures or delays at this time."

Personnel compensation for closures or delays will be based on the appropriate cancellation/delay message as presented on the FSU voice-mail system. A reminder: "Essential personnel" are required to report to work at regular time in the event of any cancellation or delay. These individuals have been notified of their "essential" status by their respective department heads. A list of these employees is available in the Office of Human Resources.

In the event of liberal leave, it is expected that everyone will make an effort to report to work and class. The final decision with regard to your own personal safety resides with you. If, in your judgment, it is not safe for you to come to work or to class while the University is still open, you must contact your supervisor or faculty member and provide this information. Employees will be charged for the appropriate leave time. The announcement of liberal leave neither relieves essential employees of their need to report to work during inclement weather nor does it cancel classes.

### Help Available for Alcohol Abuse

FSU President Jonathan Gibraltar and Allegany College of Maryland President Donald Alexander submitted a letter to the Sunday, Oct. 21, issue of the *Cumberland Times-News*, endorsed by a number of local agencies, urging a community-based approach toward dealing with alcohol abuse among college students. Those who endorsed the letter urged that information regarding community and university resources for students with substance abuse issues be shared. There are many resources throughout the county and on the Internet, but three are immediately available to the students and local community: **Alcoholics Anonymous, the Allegany County Health Department and Counseling and Psychological Services at FSU.**

A local Alcoholics Anonymous group meets several times a week at the Frostburg Presbyterian Church on Broadway. This group has assisted numerous people in dealing with their addiction to alcohol. During this year's campaign, FSU students will have the ability to register to vote in the Maryland Primary Election, request an absentee ballot and get general information about voting in Maryland.

For this year's campaign, registration tables will be in the Lane University Center from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Wednesdays, **Nov. 14**, and **Dec. 5**.

Here are a few tips to ensure that your vote counts:

1. If you need to change your party affiliation, your application must be received at the Board of Elections office Monday, **Nov. 19**, by 9 p.m.

2. The last day to register to vote in

the Maryland Primary Election is Tuesday, **Jan. 22**, at 9 p.m.

3. When you register, please make sure the person who registers you is certified to do so in Maryland. If they can't produce a certification card, don't register with them.

4. If you need an absentee ballot, make sure you request one early. The deadline to make a request for the Primary by mail or fax is Tuesday, **Feb.**

5. To apply after that date (through Election Day), you must apply in person at your local board of elections.

5. If you choose to mail your form, make sure it is postmarked on the deadline date or earlier, or your vote won't count.
