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FSU Finalizes Climate Action Plan

FSU Aiming for Climate Neutrality by 2030



FSU President Jonathan Gibraltar and the Learning Green, Living Green Committee have finalized the University's Climate Action Plan and submitted it to the campus community and the American College and University Presidents' Climate Commitment

(ACUPCC). With a goal of climate neutrality by 2030, FSU will begin implementation of all 49 strategic initiatives in the plan within two years.

The plan documents FSU's commitment to reducing campus greenhouse gas emissions and outlines initiatives designed to achieve an overall goal of climate neutrality as well as a set of steps that will teach students the skills they will need to help society do the same.

"One of the greatest challenges we face today is the threat of global warming. Our nation's colleges and universities should be the leaders in both action and education that set the stage for the mitigation of carbon dioxide and turn us from our current path. The faculty, staff and students of Frostburg State University took this to heart and spent the better part of two years drafting our Climate Action Plan," Gibraltar said. "In it, we will develop and implement strategies to become carbon neutral by 2030. This is a goal I truly believe we can and will accomplish."

The CAP provides a framework that will guide FSU; it is divided into five structured areas to ensure a multifaceted approach to addressing climate neutrality:

Mitigation Strategies – Implementing strategies that will reduce FSU's carbon footprint

Education – Strengthening environmental sustainability studies throughout all areas of the curriculum to ensure that every FSU student is exposed

Research – Providing FSU students, faculty and staff opportunities to engage in research opportunities relating to climate change and environmental sustainability

Outreach – Connecting with all FSU constituents to promote sustainability and encourage others to get involved

Finance – Identifying ways to finance the CAP, faculty research relating to environmental sustainability as well as Learning Green, Living Green as a whole

FSU has already made a number of moves toward reducing its carbon imprint, from adding hybrid vehicles to its fleet and mandating the purchase of Energy Star appliances to promoting research into renewable energy, the most visible example being the WISE (Wind-Solar Energy) wind turbine and solar array helping to power the Fuller House on campus. Student groups have been promoting recycling and energy savings with "Blackout Days," encouraging lights-out in unused offices and classrooms. FSU rated an 85 in "The Princeton Review's" Green Rating Honor Roll. These efforts have been coordinated by LGLG, the University's broad-based green campus initiative. As a signatory of the ACUPCC, FSU receives support and resources designed to help the school achieve the outlined climate objectives and has access to a supportive network of peer institutions that share insights into best practices.

Six hundred fifty college and university presidents have joined the ACUPCC, a comprehensive climate change initiative through which schools are committing to neutralize greenhouse gas emissions on their campuses, dedicate research and programs to the development of climate change solutions and train their students to address the climate crisis on graduation. Gibraltar was a charter signatory and is a member of the ACUPCC leadership circle.

"I congratulate Frostburg State University on its commitment to climate neutrality and for contributing to this first sectorwide effort at creating climate action plans," said Toni Nelson, program director of the ACUPCC. "The collective impact of schools throughout the nation fighting climate change is tremendous," she added.

Launched in 2007, the ACUPCC is a network of 650 signatory schools, representing all 50 states and the District of Columbia. This high-visibility effort to address global warming garners institutional commitments to neutralize greenhouse gas emissions and accelerate the research and educational efforts of higher education to equip society to re-stabilize the earth's climate. Staking Our Claim CHILL Gearing Up for Exciting Second Year!



Thanks to a generous contribution from AstraZeneca Pharmaceuticals LP, FSU is gearing up for another

promising year with CHILL ("Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles"), a campuswide wellness initiative.

"We are thrilled that AstraZeneca was so pleased with the progress we made in the important first year of this project that they wanted to continue their philanthropic support for another year," said B.J. Davisson II, vice president for University Advancement and executive director of the FSU Foundation, Inc. "This program would not happen would it not be for their very serious commitment to wellness and prevention. Together, we can do great things for young people."

Originally launched in September 2008, CHILL has successfully developed and organized various educational outreach activities focused on health and wellness over the past year, including workshops led by nationally renowned fitness expert Scott Cole, a "Biggest Loser" student competition and campus community walks organized in affiliation with popular University traditions like Homecoming. CHILL also offered student health screenings, which helped students become more informed of how to take charge of and improve their personal health. With AstraZeneca's support, FSU was also able to hire April Baer, project coordinator for University

Wellness, and Registered Nurse Julie Miller. As a result of CHILL's success and the University's overall focus on health and wellness, in spring 2009 FSU was recognized as a "Fit-Friendly Company" by the American Heart Association and received a "Worksite Innovation Award" from AHA for its efforts to promote and foster an institutional culture of health and physical activity in the workplace.

AstraZeneca's new contribution of \$228,000 ensures the mission to make FSU a national model for campus health and wellness can continue. CHILL is organizing a variety of activities this fall centered on the theme "The Amazing Race" that will encourage participants to push themselves – or race – to reach various goals and events that promote overall well-being. Planned fall semester activities include fitness education ("The Amazing Race for My Personal Best," "The Amazing Race to Homecoming" and "The Amazing Race for Fitness") and a community race in downtown Frostburg ("The Race to Main Street"), as well as efforts to encourage students to give back to the community that overlap with FSU's Office of Leadership and Civic Engagement ("The Amazing Race for Service"). CHILL will also offer "The Amazing Race for Reading" with FSU's Lewis J. Ort Library, which will provide texts to engage the mind and help students think about wellness from different perspectives.

"It is so rewarding to see how excited this campus and our community are for wellness. Within one year, CHILL has become a new fixture on this campus," Baer said. "We hope to grow and provide resources for our students to inspire them to lead healthier, happier lives."

'Body Mapping' on Display at Roper

"Body Mapping," an exhibition of paintings and drawings that explore the human body from each artist's standpoint, will be on display in the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery. The exhibition will run through **Sunday, Oct. 4.**

The collection features enigmatic painted, oil-glazed wood panels by Eileen Senner displaying glowing, fragmented torsos set in dark expanses of undefined space; hand-painted photographs by Kaethe Kauffman that probe the body's dynamics that bring muscular substructures to light; watercolors by Tina Blondell that appropriate poses and symbols inspired by biblical and mythic heroines; and pencil drawings by Giedra Montvila, who draws on her experience as a runway fashion model to take issue with the barrage of media-generated glamour propaganda. Each artist's focus differs, covering metaphysical issues, bodily mechanisms, personal growth patterns and society's obsession with appearances.

FSU Publication Receives Honors

The Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) has named FSU a Bronze award winner of its 2009 Circle of Excellence awards program. FSU was recognized for its campaign case statement, "Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg," in the category of Individual Fundraising Publications: Case Statements and General Cultivation Publications. This year, 692 institutions from around the world submitted more than 2,860 entries in the awards program.

The "Staking Our Claim" campaign case statement was created by GCF Marketing with several members of the FSU Communications and Media Relations team: Colleen Stump, associate vice president for University Advancement and director of Publications; Becca Ramspott, public information specialist, Technology and News Media; and Ann Townsell, assistant director of Publications. The FSU Foundation used the campaign case statement to kick off a \$15 million comprehensive campaign, Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg.

"The goal of this piece was to issue a call to action to alumni, donors and other friends of Frostburg State University to step up to the plate and get involved in helping FSU continue to provide an exceptional educational experience to its students and faculty," Stump said. "The case statement relied on a multifaceted approach that included compelling personal stories about notable donors, persuasive data and statistics and strong messages about how dire the current economic situation is for funding higher education. We're very pleased this piece was recognized by CASE."

During the 2009-2010 academic year, FSU will participate in the Collegiate Learning Assessment program as part of its goal to promote transparency and consistency in the assessment of student learning and development. The CLA measures students' critical thinking, analytic reasoning, problem solving and written communication skills. It compares freshmen and senior academic achievement and examines whether improvement in average student performance between entry and graduation is in line with students at other institutions.
