FSU Foundation Within \$1.2 Million of Goal Leading Into Final Year of Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg

At a gala celebration honoring leading donors during the recent Leadership and Homecoming Weekend, FSU and the FSU Foundation, Inc., set the stage for the final push of Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg. With less than a year left to go, the campaign is less than \$1.2 million short of its \$15 million goal.

"We owe it to those who have come before us to continue Frostburg's legacy of putting quality education within reach of students who will benefit from a college degree and make the most of it," said President Jonathan Gibralter to the approximately 130 guests assembled in the historic Lyric Theatre on Main Street in Frostburg. "Persistence is what has led Frostburg State to where it is today. It is what will continue to push this institution to redefine itself as a distinctive and distinguished university."

As of Nov. 4, \$13.8 million had been raised in the campaign, 92 percent of the goal, including \$3 million since last year's Leadership and Homecoming Weekend. The Staking Our Claim campaign will come to a close June 30, 2011.

Several individuals and organizations were additionally singled out for recognition. Special honorees during the evening included:

• Carey and Mary Beth Fisher were honored for their leadership support of the unrestricted Annual Fund. Carey is a 1975 graduate and Mary Beth graduated in 1976. Their support of the Annual Fund dates

back 20 years, and they have given more than \$30,000 over the course of the campaign.

- The corporate honoree was Daly Computers, represented by Daly's CEO *Ryan Yu* and his wife, Daly legal counsel *Margaret Yu*. The Yus and their colleagues learned about FSU through Daly's business relationship, providing many of the computers that are used by the University. Daly has provided \$25,000 in scholarship funds, much of which has supported FSU's growing transfer population.
- Sandi Saville was the first donor under a new program called Presidential Merit Scholarships, created with the intention of recruiting more high academic achievers to FSU. With a \$25,000 commitment, she established the Sandra K. Saville Presidential Merit Scholarship for the Arts to benefit aspiring artists.

- Dennis and Dawn Thomas, longtime supporters of leadership initiatives at FSU, most recently established the Dennis and Dawn Thomas Presidential Leadership Scholarship, benefiting members of the FSU President's Leadership Circle who have an interest in public policy and public service. They were introduced by Robert Kesler, the inaugural recipient of their scholarship.
- Carl "Bucky" and Jane Belt, with the Belt Group of Companies, made a significant campaign gift to be divided between athletics, which rely solely on gifts and student fees for support, and unrestricted funds. Bucky Belt is also a member of the FSU Foundation Board of Directors and the campaign steering committee.

Gibralter praised those who were honored, saying, "You have been heroes to our students, who above all else, are the reason for everything we seek to accomplish at Frostburg State University."

Attendees were treated to performances by the FSU Vocal Jazz Ensemble, soprano and FSU junior **Britany Poindexter** and a clarinet duet by Assistant Professor **Mark Gallagher** and his student, **Sarah Galvin**. A gourmet meal was provided by Aramark, created by award-winning Executive Chef Greg Carter.

Heralded as "spectacular" and "a veritable dynamo," Koehler has appeared across the United States, Europe, Canada and China in recital, concert and opera. Koehler's other stage credits include operetta and musical theatre.

Koehler has performed as a soloist in oratorio and other choral orchestral works, and she is a regular performer and featured soloist with the American Spiritual Ensemble. She has also been on the faculty of the prestigious Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts since 2001. She is a member of the voice faculty at West Virginia University and at the American Institute of Musical Studies (AIMS) in Graz, Austria. In June 2008, Albany Records released Koehler's recording of John Jacob Niles songs titled "The Lass From the Low Countree," performed with Douglass at the piano.

As a collaborative pianist, Douglass has been involved in genres including



chamber music, vocal arts, opera, choral arts, symphonic repertoire, jazz, cabaret and musical theatre. In 2004, he began teaching in the

summer study program at AIMS in Graz as the instructor of collaborative piano and a vocal coach in the Lieder Studio. Douglass joined the faculty of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro as an assistant professor of collaborative piano and vocal coach in 2005 and is an active clinician. His performances have included recitals and television/radio broadcasts across the United States and Europe.

Fourth Annual Music and Writing Workshop

The FSU Center for Creative Writing will host its fourth annual Music and Writing Workshop, Saturday, Nov. 20, on the FSU campus. The program features three seminars designed to focus on the intersection between the arts of music and writing. The program is free and open to the public, with priority registration for FSU and local students. Sign-up is on a first-come, first-served basis, and space is limited in each workshop.

Jennifer Merrifield will present "Music as Muse," exploring the musicality of language. She will discuss how people are already in tune with the rhythm of sentence and rhymes and the sounds of words, and ask writers to consider the music they

love as inspiration, regardless of the genre.

Dennis Hinrichsen will talk about "Lyric Writing." During this seminar, participants will listen to successful songs in various genres to get a sense of how the lyrics relate to melody, music and audience. Hinrichsen will discuss the process of writing new lyrics for existing or new music, and songwriters are encouraged to bring lyrics in progress or whole songs, as well as their instruments, to work on the art of lyric writing. Those with music but no songs or lyrics are also welcome to contribute.

Gerry LaFemina's workshop includes those who may not be musicians or creative writers. His talk is called "Scene and 'Zine," and his intent is to create a Western Maryland music 'zine. LaFemina will focus on review writing, interviewing bands and other aspects of 'zine creation.

Merrifield is a poet who teaches creative writing, literature and composition at Potomac State College of West Virginia University. Her collection of poems, "American Proper," was released in 2008. Hinrichsen is author of five books of poetry. His most recent is "Kurosawa's Dog," winner of the 2008 FIELD Poetry Prize. He teaches creative writing and lyric writing at Lansing Community College in Lansing, Mich. LaFemina is a poet, fiction writer and musician whose most recent book is "Wish List: Stories." He teaches at FSU and directs the Frostburg Center for Creative Writing.

Living costs are generally lower than at FSU and courses are taught in English.
