Frostburg State University Reaches Highest Enrollment Ever!

Continuing a four-year upward trend, FSU is celebrating another year of increased enrollment. With a total 5,470 students attending the University, FSU's undergraduate population has swelled to a record 4,866 students.

"In the past four years, Frostburg State University has clearly defined itself as a premier comprehensive, public institution," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "Our research shows that FSU is increasingly the first-choice destination for students where they know they will get the highest quality of education."

The strongest area of growth comes in the 3,299 students who chose to return to FSU from the previous semester, 4 percent more than in the previous year, which was already a two-decade high point. Nearly 74

percent of students who were first-time, full-time freshman in fall 2009 returned to FSU for the fall 2010 semester, a 2 percent larger share than in the previous year. Gibralter's goal is to eventually have nearly 80 percent of freshmen return to FSU.

The fall 2010 freshman class also brings with it a higher mean grade point average and SAT score.

More students are choosing to live on campus as well. The University's 11 residence halls are filled to capacity. Edgewood Commons, the public/private apartment complex on campus, has only one vacancy and is at its highest occupancy ever. In all, 2,055 students are living on campus, the most in FSU's history.

FSU is continuing a broad base of initiatives to ensure the success of its students and assist them in completing

their education at FSU. These include FSU Connections, learning communities that allow freshmen to explore an area of interest; the Center for Advising and Career Services, providing essential support for transfer students and those who have not decided on a major; an array of academic support services and monitoring programs; assistance with the financial aid process; and a new tool called MAP-Works, which helps students and their instructors identify areas that might derail an otherwise strong student. All these measures are designed to keep a single area of weakness from sinking a student's entire college career.

CHILL Invites Students to Think Healthy

For the third year in a row, FSU's students are invited to participate in free bio-medical health screenings made available through Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles (CHILL), a student wellness initiative. The screenings will be held from 8 a.m. to noon on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 21 and 22, and Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 29 and 30, in the Leake Room of FSU's Cordts PE Center. Students will be able to have their blood pressure, body mass index, body composition, blood sugar and cholesterol levels checked, all while earning CHILL prizes.

To complete the screening, students will need to refrain from eating or drinking anything but water for at least eight hours before the screening. The screenings involve having a vial of blood drawn to check blood sugar and cholesterol levels. Student will have access to follow-up care at Brady Health Center and access to physical trainers and other programs.

In exchange for the student's time, each participant will receive a complimentary breakfast, a free CHILL T-shirt, and be entered in drawings for other CHILL prizes. The first 25 students in line each morning will also receive a bonus CHILL prize.

To be eligible, students must be at least 18 and not have any previous diagnosis concerning their blood sugar or heart health. Students who do not qualify for this screening are encouraged to contact the Brady Health Center to make an appointment to have the screening performed later.

Originally launched in September 2008 with a contribution from AstraZeneca Pharmaceuticals LP, CHILL promotes health practices and education among college students and the local community. Since 2008, CHILL has performed over 1,150 screenings with nearly 77 percent of the results indicating at least one health concern. The goal of CHILL's screenings is to get students thinking about the lasting impacts that diet and exercise habits can have on their bodies. CHILL hopes to screen 500 students during the 2010-2011 academic year.
