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Allegany County Opportunity Scholarship to Benefit County Residents at FSU, Allegany College of Maryland

Allegany County Commissioners Michael W. McKay, Creade V. Brodie Jr. and William R. Valentine discussed a draft resolution at the commissioner's public work session on Thursday, Dec. 5, establishing the Allegany County Opportunity Scholarship, designed to benefit Allegany County residents attending either Allegany College of Maryland or FSU.

Funds for the scholarship will be provided from a portion of Allegany County Government's share – 2.25 percent – of the annual gross revenue generated by the video lottery machines at Rocky Gap Casino Resort. The county receives revenue monthly from the state.

Fewer than one in five Allegany County residents, 16.3 percent, have earned a bachelor's degree or higher. The county ranks 22 of 24 of Maryland's 23 counties and Baltimore City. The commissioners intend to use a portion of these funds for the Allegany County Opportunity Scholarship for ACM and FSU students, understanding the impact of ACM and FSU on the education and career preparation and career advancement opportunities the two institutions provide to members of this community.

The resolution will be voted on at the **Dec. 19** commissioners' public business meeting.

"The commissioners want and need to educate our youth at the collegiate level right here in Allegany County. The Allegany County Opportunity Scholarship is a positive step to help accomplish many goals," Commissioner Valentine emphasized. "This encourages population retention and growth, enhances the quality of the local workforce for current and prospective employers and supports economic development and the associated prosperity it creates."

The commissioners have determined that the future well-being of Allegany County depends on having an educated and skilled workforce. However, many county residents face financial barriers to pursuing post-secondary education. Funding through the Allegany County Opportunity Scholarship will provide additional financial resources to increase educational opportunities, enhance economic development and support the continued well-being of the community.

The scholarships will be administered through ACM's and FSU's respective nonprofit foundations, Allegany College of Maryland Foundation, Inc., and the FSU Foundation, Inc. Specific criteria will be determined by each institution. The first awards are scheduled to be made for the fall 2014 semester.

"We applaud the Allegany County Commissioners for this unique, forward-thinking plan that recognizes the importance of education to our citizens and to the county's economic development," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "Their keen vision and true leadership will create wonderful possibilities for our local students, and we congratulate them for their wisdom."

ACM enrolls more than 1,700 credit and over 5,000 continuing education workforce development and professional development students from Allegany County per academic year. Of FSU's 5,474 total students (fall 2013), 738 undergraduate students and 183 graduate students are Allegany County residents.

FSU in U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges for Veterans

FSU has been named one of the top-ranked schools in the 2014 edition of the U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges for Veterans rankings recognizing schools that participate in federal initiatives helping veterans and active service member apply, pay for and complete their degrees.

"This recognition is further evidence of Frostburg State University's commitment to ensuring that our veteran and active-duty military students have access to the opportunities that higher education will provide," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "They have earned our gratitude."

The 234 schools in the new list scored well in terms of graduation rate, faculty resources, reputation and other markers of academic quality. To qualify for the new rankings, the schools had to be certified for the GI Bill and participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program, two federal initiatives that help veterans reduce the cost of school. The schools were also required to be members of the Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges Consortium, a group that works to simplify credit transfers and give veterans credit for military training and national tests such as the College-Level Examination Program.

Only 40 of the nearly 200 regional universities in the Northeast, the subsection that includes FSU, made the list. In total, there were 234 ranked schools across all 10 U.S. News Ranking categories. Slightly less than one-fourth of schools numerically ranked in the 2014 Best Colleges rankings offered all the benefits needed to be eligible for the Best Colleges for Veterans ranking.

U.S. News said that it publishes these separate rankings because there are additional factors that veterans and active service members should consider. The data on veteran benefits was collected as part of a broader survey of undergraduate schools by U.S. News in spring 2013.

FSU's Center for Creative Writing to Host Book Release and Signing



FSU's Center for Creative Writing will host a book release and signing on **Tuesday**, **Dec. 10**, at Main Street Books, 2 E. Main St., Frostburg, at 7:30 p.m. The event will showcase a novel, "Clamor," and a book of prose poems, "Notes for the Novice Ventriloquist," by FSU faculty member *Gerry LaFemina*.

"Clamor," LaFemina's debut novel, is about the emotional journey of a punk rock star, Johnny Malice, as he attempts to reconcile his past and his family with his present. The story attempts to bridge emotional distances as part prodigal son and part indie concept album, forged from Malice's mosaic of sexual deviance, emotional codependency and distorted rock and roll.

"Notes for the Novice Ventriloquist" is a compilation of LaFemina's curious and quirky prose poems. From surrealist art to magic shows and mythological creatures, these poems paint a canvas in which the real and what may be real are framed together.

LaFemina is the director of the Frostburg Center for Creative Writing at FSU, where he is an associate professor of English. He is the author of nine previous collections of poetry and prose, including "Vanishing Horizon" and "Steam Punk." LaFemina has received many awards, including a Pushcart Prize, an Irving Gilmore Emerging Artist Fellowship Award, a Michigan Council for the Arts and Cultural Affairs Individual Artist Fellowship and a Bordighera Prize in Poetry. He holds a master of fine arts degree and a master's degree in literature with an emphasis on 20th-century literature from Western Michigan University.

Two New Library Displays for December

The Ort Library presents two new displays for December.

The first display, located on the third floor (by the main entrance), provides information on the end of Prohibition 80 years ago (1933) with the passage of the 21st Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The temperance movement swept the U.S. during the 1820s and '30s. By World War I, this cry for the prohibition of alcohol gained increasing popularity, which culminated in the passage of the 18th Amendment in 1919 prohibiting the creation, sale and transportation of alcohol. By the late 1920s, the mood in the U.S. had swung back to allowing the creation of liquor by legitimate businesses. By 1933, the 18th Amendment outlawing alcohol had been repealed.

The second display, located on the fifth floor, recognizes December as AIDS Awareness Month. AIDS Awareness Month is a key opportunity to raise awareness, commemorate those who have passed on and celebrate victories such as increased access to treatment and prevention services. Learn more about HIV/AIDS through statistics and background information as well as see what titles the library has on AIDS. Included in the display is the book "And the Band Played On" by Randy Shilts. Published 20 years ago, "And the Band Played On" was quickly recognized as a masterpiece of investigative reporting. Shilts' expose revealed why AIDS was allowed to spread unchecked during the early '80s while the most trusted institutions ignored or denied the threat. One of the few true modern classics, it changed and framed how AIDS was discussed in the following years.

Finally, the display on food insecurity, located on the third floor (between the four stand-up PCs) continues through the end of this month. This display looks at hunger for those living in Allegany and Garrett counties. According to the latest U.S. Census data, more than 30 percent of households in Allegany County and almost 28 percent of households in Garrett County have incomes of less than \$25,000, which can make purchasing food difficult.

The Ort Library will collect for the Frostburg Food Pantry through the end of the semester. A collection box is located by the display.

Dr. Mary M. Herman Rubinstein, a neuropathologist and senior staff scientist in the Clinical Brain Disorders Branch of the Division of Intramural Research Programs, National Institute of Mental Health, and her husband, Dr. Lucien J. Rubinstein, developed a great appreciation for art and acquired a noteworthy collection over the years, including lithographs, colorful,

The couple built notable careers in the field of neuropathology and pathology and have published many articles in esteemed journals. Lucien, who passed away in 1990, provided the inspiration for their remarkable art collection.

FSU LGLG Committee Takes on Sustainability Through Activity Meetings

With hopes of a more sustainable campus and in support of environmental action, FSU's Learning Green, Living Green Committee at Large has started to get active in its approach to sustainability through activity-based meetings.

At the most recent meeting on Nov. 14, FSU students joined up for the committee's second activity meeting, taking paintbrushes to the windows of the Lane University Center to help

decorate windows with environmental action messages based on ecology-centered themes. Students from the Introduction to Sustainability Studies class also participated in the meeting to help paint the designs they developed based on issues that they had been discussing in class.

In a previous activity meeting, over 1,400 acorns were planted in nursery trays by 26 students in about 40 minutes for the Frostburg Grows Project.

"If these trees survive, they have the potential to remove around 1,400 tons of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and supply enough oxygen for 2,800 people," said Lawrence A. Gingerich, Safety and Sustainability coordinator. "This is sustainability for the long term."

Keeping in line with the University's emphasis on experiential learning, FSU's Learning Green, Living Green Initiative engages students, faculty, staff and community members to develop and coordinate programs and projects that create sustainable solutions to environmental, social and economic needs. Through the LGLG sustainability initiative and numerous related measures, including activity meetings, the University helps to address environmental issues and create sustainable solutions for daily living.

Everyone should sign up for Burg Alerts, which can be sent as text messages to your cell phones (standard texting rates apply) and as free emails. Unless FSU closure is announced on the outlets above, WE ARE OPEN. Likewise, the message under option 2 at the main University number will announce the closure or announce, "There are no delays or closures at this time."

FOR FACULTY/STAFF: Personnel compensation for closures or delays will be based on the appropriate cancellation/delay message as presented on the FSU voice-mail system. A reminder: Essential personnel are required to report to work in the event of any cancellation or delay. These individuals have been notified of their "essential" status by their department heads. There is no set-up fee. The two-color name tag, which includes a name and pin fastener, is \$3. Each additional line (e.g., title and department) costs 55 cents. For a magnet fastener instead of a pin, add 95 cents (plus shipping).

When you order, you will need the credit card information and the name(s) and title(s) of each person ordering a name tag. Send names and titles through email only and make sure that spelling and wording are correct before ordering. There is a minimum order of \$10.

Orders usually take up to 3 weeks. If you are ordering name tags for an event, include the event date in your email.
