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## The Language Company Officially Opens Frostburg Branch, Recognizes Partnership With FSU, Frostburg Community

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The Language Company (TLC), an organization that provides English-as-a-second-language instruction and cultural opportunities to individuals seeking educational, professional and personal enrichment, held a ribbon-cutting of TLC-Frostburg on Monday, Oct. 28. TLC-Frostburg is a new branch of the nationwide company that works in partnership with FSU to bring more international students to the Western Maryland area.

"Over the last five years, The Language Company has been a true friend to Frostburg State University," said FSU Vice Provost John Bowman. "TLC has helped the University establish a strong presence in China and through its extensive international contacts is now helping us to recruit students in other far-off places, including South Korea and the Middle East."

TLC, which accepted its first students in Frostburg in March, has 14 sites across the United States, many in major cities. TLC-Frostburg has been gradually adding students and teachers to the point that the center now has 21 students and employs six teachers, according to Robert Fedorow, TLC-Frostburg's director. The intention is for the program to continue to grow to as many as 100 students at a time.

Students who come to TLC-Frostburg to attend the Intensive English Program have the opportunity to connect with FSU, including working with FSU students as conversation partners and having access to the University library, athletic facilities, athletic events and campus social activities. Qualified students may then choose to continue their educational path in FSU's undergraduate or graduate programs.

"The opening of TLC-Frostburg is a logical next step in how our University can expand its world of experiences and truly internationalize our campus for our students, faculty and staff," said President Gibraltar. "It opens the doors for our students to share ideas with TLC-Frostburg students while working with them as conversation partners and getting to know them while they're visiting our facilities and attending our events. Ultimately, it builds a strong bridge between our two schools. ... We would love to have TLC-Frostburg students join the Bobcat family following their completion of your programs."

"The City of Frostburg also benefits from TLC-Frostburg, as it provides residents in our community with opportunities to get to know students and to help them feel at home here," Gibraltar said. "This positions Frostburg as not just a warm and welcoming community, but a warm and welcoming global community, with friends around the world."

TLC's offerings include programs such as an Intensive English Program and special programs such as Academic Test Preparation and English for Professionals. ### CES LIVE! at StarScape Event – Jazz Vocalist Catherine Russell



FSU's Cultural Events Series, as part of its club series, LIVE! at StarScape, will present jazz vocalist Catherine Russell on **Friday, Nov. 22**, at 8 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall.

A soulful jazz and blues singer, Russell, whom the Washington Post called "a wonderfully charismatic performer with a show-stopping voice," offers a performance reminiscent of legendary divas like Bessie Smith and Billie Holiday. National Public Radio's Marc Silver said, "With a voice that wails like a horn and whispers like the snake ... she's finally claiming her place in the pantheon of 21st-century jazz divas."

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Her gift as a musician comes to her naturally. Her father, the composer Luis Russell, was the longtime bandleader for jazz legend Louis Armstrong. Her mother, Carline Ray, performed with the International Sweethearts of Rhythm, the first integrated all-women’s band in the U.S.

Russell, who has recorded and performed with such legends as David Bowie, Paul Simon and Steely Dan, has also been a regular hit at major festivals like Chicago Blues, Montreal Jazz, Bern International Jazz and Tanglewood Jazz. She has performed for sold-out audiences at the Kennedy Center, Yoshi’s in San Francisco and the Skirball Cultural Center in Los Angeles, and has appeared on nationally syndicated NPR shows, including “Mountain Stage,” “JazzSet,” “Weekend Edition” and “World Café.”

Tickets are \$20 for adults and \$17 for youth under 17. Corporate and group discount rates are also available.

Since the spring of 2000, Edwards has been featured on six recordings: “El Cumbanchero,” “Cathedral Hill” and “Fretworks” with the Baldwin Ensemble and three recordings featuring the music of Baltimore composer Karen Amrhein: “... for Moonlight,” “Yule Like This” and “Giving Voice” (ASCAP).

Edwards directs the Ark & Dove School of Music, which provides music lessons to underprivileged children who show promise.

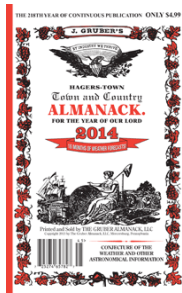

## “Lore and Legends About the Hagerstown Almanack” by Bill O’Toole



Prognosticator Bill O’Toole will give a talk, “Lore and Legends About the Hagerstown Almanack,” on **Saturday, Nov. 16**, at 2 p.m. A Washington County native, O’Toole has been the prognosticator for the Hagerstown Town and Country Almanack since 1969. He has also written for two other almanacs, one for the continental U.S. and the other for Quebec Province in Canada. He’ll share highlights of the fabled almanac’s prestigious history, discuss its predictions and share some intriguing regional weather-lore.

With a strong background in mathematics (41 years teaching math and computer science at Mount Saint Mary’s College) and a long-time interest in astrophysics, O’Toole attributes his accuracy to a combination of methods that include using specialized software to precisely calculate phases of the moon, close analysis of sunspot activity and the tracking and noting of El Niño and La Niña cycles.

The Hagerstown Almanack has been a mainstay tradition in the Mid-Atlantic region for well over two centuries, providing farmers with seasonal weather forecasts as well as important astronomical information considered to be vital to agricultural success. It furnishes some of the most accurate weather predictions available, as well as health, home and gardening tips. There are even predictions of the gender of unborn children.

### Three New Library Displays for November

The Ort Library is exhibiting three new displays through November.

The first display, on the third floor (by the main entrance) is a remembrance of the day, 50 years ago (Nov. 22, 1963), when President John F. Kennedy was killed in Dallas. The display presents a timeline of events as they happened that fateful day. Additionally, several books about the subject that are available at FSU are shown. The display also provides examples of some of the front pages of newspapers from around the country that have been collected on microfilm. The library owns a copy of the microfilm titled “Memorial Collection of Newspapers on Microfilm: Chronicling Events of the Assassination of John F. Kennedy, November 22-26, 1963” (E842 .M45). If you would like to see this newspaper collection, stop by the second floor of the library.

The second display, also on the third floor (between the four stand-up PCs) looks at food insecurity of local residents. According to the latest U.S. Census data, more than 30 percent of households in Allegany County and almost 28 percent of households in Garrett County have incomes of less than \$25,000, which can make purchasing food difficult. The Ort Library will collect donations for the Frostburg Food Pantry through the end of the semester. A collection box is located by the display.

The final display, on the fifth floor, recognizes the 150th anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln’s Gettysburg Address given on Nov. 19, 1863. His speech was one of many given that day to remember those killed during the first three days of July during the Battle of Gettysburg. Lincoln was there to dedicate a national cemetery.
