CES at FSU will present the Indian Ink Theatre Company in "The Elephant Wrestler" on **Friday, Nov. 6**, at 7:30 p.m. in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall in FSU's Lane University Center.

Inspired by a traditional Indian fairy tale, "The Elephant Wrestler" follows Kutisar, a poor chaiwallah (tea seller) in modern-day Bangalore Train Station as he is challenged to solve the interwoven mysteries of true love, tragedy and joy. The play has enjoyed success touring throughout New Zealand as well as Australia, Asia and the United States. The Sydney Morning Herald described it as "Flawless ... cleverly constructed, full of melodramatic twists and humorous asides," and the New Zealand Listener named it the "Feel-Good Production of the

Year."

Founded in New Zealand in 1997, the Indian Ink Theatre Company blends Western theatrical traditions with Eastern flavors and has been critically acclaimed for its use of live music, heightened theatricality, humor, pathos and great storytelling. The company's remarkable theatrical productions of intimate scale remind audiences of the simple truths of life.

In addition to the public performance, local actors and theatre students can participate in an in-depth theatrical master class with the Indian Ink artists on **Nov. 6** at 7 p.m. in the Lane Center. Attendees will participate in games and exercises that liberate the voice and body to create characters that amplify human emotion, relationships and truth. ### MCTA Presents a Special Evening of Swedish Music

Lydia Levins and Andrea Larson will share the music they've brought home after a year of studying together in Sweden on **Monday, Oct. 26**, at 7 p.m. at Mountain City Traditional Arts, at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. They will perform an energetic and engaging program of traditional music on fiddle, five-string fiddle and nyckelharpa, including waltzes, schottises, polskas and more. This event is free and open to the public with a suggested donation of \$15.

Levins plays Scandinavian and English county dance music on the five-string fiddle and nyckelharpa. In both genres, she is inspired by the bold harmonies she can create. Her talent and passion for playing in the Uppland tradition won her a bronze Zorn Medal in Sweden.

Larson, a teacher and performer, has been playing Swedish traditional music for 20 years and teaching violin for 15 years. Much of her teaching methods have been inspired by Swedish musicians, including her new workshop series devoted to practicing.

These two musicians have been singing and playing Swedish-style fiddle together for about 10 years and spent the 2012-13 academic year studying Swedish music at the Eric Sahlström Institute. Much of their music was born in the central regions of Sweden, with some inspiration from Norwegian and Danish musical traditions. More recently they focused on a new goal – bringing the younger, hipper, living slängpolska tradition to the U.S. and creating a new intensive weekend course for dance musicians.

### Prairie Dog Companion: Discover What These Amazing Creatures Can Teach Us About Ourselves

### Community Benefits From FSU’s Homecoming Service Efforts

#### Homecoming Court Raises More Than \$3,200 for Charities!

FSU Homecoming featured service opportunities in which students raised money for local and national charities and cleaned up the University neighborhood following the weekend’s festivities. FSU’s 2015 Homecoming Court, representing eight campus organizations, raised more than \$3,200 for a variety of local and national charities. These students upheld the more than decade-long fundraising tradition that accompanies Homecoming by raising a total of \$3,285.38.

**Katelyn Currier**, of Alpha Sigma Tau, was recognized for raising the largest amount, \$1,098.56, to support Donate Life America, a nonprofit alliance that is dedicated to educating the public about organ, eye and tissue donations.

**Brandon Holmes** and **Kaniece Hurley** were named Homecoming King and Queen.

Holmes represented Alpha Phi Omega and raised \$341 to support the Cumberland YMCA, an organization dedicated to strengthening the foundations of community through youth development, healthy living and social responsibility. Holmes is also a Bobcat Ambassador.

Hurley’s organization supported the Dove Center of Garrett County, which provides safety, advocacy and counseling to those whose lives have been affected by domestic violence and/or sexual assault. Hurley represented the FSU Lady B.U.G.S., an organization that promotes the welfare of young women, and raised \$414.91.

The Homecoming Court included **Kara Hotchkiss** representing the Delta Zeta sorority, which raised \$630 to support March of Dimes; **Samantha Metz** representing the Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority, which raised \$593.91 for Girls on the Run; **Mikal Davis** representing the Omega Psi Phi fraternity, which raised \$80 for St. Jude Children’s Hospital; **Joey Fallon** representing the Pi Lambda Phi fraternity, which raised \$60 for Garrett County Special Olympics; and **Keaton Zimmerman** representing the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity, which raised \$67 for the Family Crisis Resource Center.

Participants spent a three-week period raising money for their selected charities. Candidates required sponsorship from a University organization, needed to raise a minimum of \$50 and wrote a short essay, which accompanied their names on the ballot. The Homecoming King and Queen were chosen by a popular vote that took place during the week of Homecoming.

The winners were crowned on Thursday, Oct. 15, during the pep rally and were presented during halftime of the football game on Saturday, Oct. 17.

Three Remarkable Employees Honored With Staff Awards for Excellence

FSU honored three outstanding employees, *Lyndsey Baker*, *Joni Smith* and *Patrick Fairall*, at its recent Fall Convocation. The annual Staff Awards for Excellence recognize exceptional service to the institution. Recipients are nominated and chosen by their colleagues. This year’s award winners have served FSU for 29 years.

Baker, a Frostburg resident, was honored in the Exempt (salaried) employee category. She joined the FSU community in the spring of 2012 in a part-time role as the Maryland Strategic Prevention coordinator. Her commitment to seeking additional grant funds and her dedication to work led to a full-time position in 2014. Baker is responsible for uniting community members, administrators, law enforcement, city officials, bar owners, health practitioners, high school representatives and others to address underage and high-risk consumption of alcohol. Her commitment to changing the community’s perceptions has helped reduce high-risk alcohol consumption at FSU.

Smith was honored in the Non-exempt (hourly) employee category. The Frostburg resident has been employed as a graphic artist in FSU’s Office of Publications for seven years. Smith has a very strong work ethic, a creative approach to her assignments and a congenial and helpful attitude when working with faculty and staff. Professional, eager to help, conscientious, detail oriented and budget conscious are just a few of the phrases contained in her letters of support. Phrases such as these make it easy to understand why Smith is such a great asset to the FSU team and an exceptional employee.

Fairall, of Cumberland, was honored under the Non-exempt employee/facilities-maintenance category. He has been an FSU employee for nearly 19 years. For his first 13 years, Fairall worked as a painter. In 2010, he began working for the Physical Plant’s multi-trades shop as a moving and storage specialist. Fairall is one of the employees who works tirelessly behind the scenes to ensure every FSU event is set up smoothly and broken down without a hitch. 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# Dr. Greg Wood Presents Results of Research on GM Anti-Union Practices

*Dr. Greg Wood*, an associate professor of history and director of the Honors Program at FSU, presented a research paper at the Labor Studies Program at Michigan State University on Oct. 17. His paper, titled “GM Never Surrendered: On Anti-Union Politics in Organized Workplaces,” examines General Motors managers’ antipathy for UAW committeemen in the 1960s automobile industry, and their efforts to roll back the gains of organized labor in the auto plants of Michigan. Wood argues that GM anti-union practices continued well into the unionized era of the automobile industry.

# Interim President Bowling Provides Info on Interim Sexual Misconduct, Relationship Violence and Stalking Policy and Procedures

*Interim President Thomas Bowling* recently issued a University-wide email detailing the University’s new set of Interim Sexual Misconduct, Relationship Violence and Stalking Policy and Procedures.

The policy complies with law and USM procedures, but also sets expectations for maintaining a safe, inclusive, nondiscriminatory environment. It is hoped the policy and procedures will help create a campus that is intolerant of harassment and violence, while at the same time establishing a supportive environment in which individuals who have experienced sexual misconduct, relationship violence or stalking feel safe in coming forward, reporting an incident and getting help.

At a more detailed level, the policy clarifies what is prohibited conduct. This includes gender-based harassment, sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual exploitation, sexual intimidation, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, complicity and retaliation. It applies to all members of the University community, including students, faculty and staff.

It also outlines new procedures for responding to incidents of sexual misconduct, relationship violence and stalking, allowing for survivors to receive greater support while ensuring accountability through an investigation and an adjudication process that is fair and impartial.

It includes information on ways to report an incident, including an option for online reporting ([www.frostburg.edu/titleix/policies/prohibited-conduct-reporting-form](http://www.frostburg.edu/titleix/policies/prohibited-conduct-reporting-form)) and provides a variety of resources where survivors can get support. Individuals may also call the Sexual Misconduct, Relationship Violence and Stalking Tip Line at 301-687-3434.

These policies replace the University’s previous Sexual Harassment and Sexual Assault policies. Bowling has approved the new document, but the policies are considered interim policy and procedures because the University will seek thoughtful feedback from the campus community before the document is finalized. The President’s Advisory Committee Against Gender-Based Violence is forming a subcommittee of students, faculty and staff from across campus who will review and comment on the interim policy and procedures.

The University will also conduct training for faculty, staff and students on the new policy and procedures throughout the year. Watch for these in the coming months.
