### FSU to Celebrate Student Achievements at Commencement Ceremony



FSU will celebrate the student achievements of its fall 2022 graduating class at the 161st Commencement Ceremony at 9:30 a.m. in a ceremony on **Wednesday, Dec. 21**, in the Cordts PE Center Main Arena.

University System of Maryland Regent Hugh Breslin will confer degrees, and *President Ronald Nowaczyk* will present diplomas to the class.

This year's commencement speakers are Jenna Griffith Newlin,

from the College of Business; *Marie (Summer) Sabatino*, from the College of Education; and *Brian Records*, from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

Newlin, of Oakland, will graduate with a bachelor's degree in accounting and a minor in business administration. She has been involved in numerous campus activities, including serving as vice president of the Residence Hall Association, president and marketing chair for the College of Business Accounting Association, vice president of Beta Game Sigma International Business Honor Society and chapter operations chair and chancellor for Delta Sigma Pi. She has completed three internships at AcountingTasks4U, The Rhodeheaver Group, P.C., and First United Bank and Trust.

Sabatino, of Hampstead, will graduate with a double major in early childhood/elementary education and psychology. ### Department of Theatre and Dance Presents Tony Award-Winning Musical 'Spring Awakening'

FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance will continue its production of "Spring Awakening," a Tony Awardwinning musical, **Thursday, Dec. 8, through Saturday, Dec. 10**, at 7:30 p.m. Directed by *Shea-Mikal Green*, with music direction by *Joshua Ruppenkamp*, performances will take place in the Drama Theatre of FSU's Woodward D. Pealer Performing Arts Center. "Spring Awakening" is a coming-of-age rock musical with music by Duncan Sheik and a book and lyrics by Steven Sater. It is based on the 1891 German play "Spring Awakening" by Frank Wedekind. Set in late 19th-century Germany, the musical tells the story of teenagers discovering the inner and outer tumult of adolescent sexuality and whose struggles stem from their inability to find a voice.

In the musical, alternative rock is employed as part of the folk-infused rock score.

"Spring Awakening" is recommended for mature audiences.

The cast includes *Emily Snyder* (Wendla), *Kassidy Andris* (Ilse), *Dominique Little* (Marta), *Whitney O'Haver* (Thea), *Grace LaCount* (Anna), *Ronnie Breitfeller* (Adult Man), *Emilia Porter* (Adult Woman), *Brian Records* (Melchior), *Hayden Shoemaker-Davis* (Moritz), *Caleb Friend* (Hanschen), *Carson Luther* (Ernst), *Ashlee Casey* (Otto), *Leo Manocchio* (Georg) and *Erick Alas*, *Efrain Santiago*, *Casey Allison* and *Grace Stevenson* (ensemble/understudies).

The Department of Theatre and Dance at FSU will host the Fourth Annual Mountain Maryland Theatre Festival on **Friday, Jan. 20, 2023**, and **Saturday, Jan. 21**, in FSU's Pealer Performing Arts Center.

This year's theme – "YOUR VOICE HERE!" – focuses on the individual power and spirit of the human voice through singing, speaking, movement, creativity, thinking and art. The weekend features exciting engagements for young artists in acting, design and technology, and stage management. There will be professional workshops in all areas, including a radio event with 91.9 WFWM radio; one-act and scene presentations; a Tech Olympics challenge; adjudication opportunities in acting, stage management, and design and technology; a keynote experience; an awards ceremony; and a karaoke dance party.

The Mountain Maryland Theatre Festival promotes and supports regional performing arts programs by creating development and networking opportunities for young artists and their teachers. MMTF is open to kids in grades 8 to12. In 2022, artists from 11 regional schools attended the festival.

#### **Brass and Trumpet Ensembles Will Perform Tonight**

FSU's Department of Music will present its Brass Ensemble and Trumpet Ensemble in concert on Monday, Dec. 5, at 7:30 p.m.

Directed by Joshua Bishop, the performers are Martin Harden, Joseph Orr, Kael Sorensen and Morgan Tichnell on trumpet; Brice Simpson and Sam White on horn; Deandre Cook, Zach Inglish and Casey Swartz on trombone; Alex Frye and Zoe Wenstrand on euphonium; and Doug Holtz and Robert Moffett on tuba.

The program will include "Vienna Philharmonic Fanfare" by Richard Strauss, "Novorossiysk Chimes" by Dmitri Shostakovich, "Venus" and "Saturn" from "The Planets" by Gustav Holst, "Trumpet Salutations" by Nigel Coombes, "Finale" from "Symphony No. 5" by Pyotr Tchaikovsky and the traditional Christmas carols "Deck the Halls," "The First Noel" and "Adeste Fideles."

Strauss composed his "Vienna Philharmonic Fanfare" ("Wiener Philharmoniker Fanfare") in 1924 for the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra. The fanfare opened the orchestra's inaugural benefit ball to raise money for the musicians' pension fund. It is still performed each year.

"Novorossiysk Chimes" (also known as "The Flame of Eternal Glory" or "The Fire of Eternal Glory") was written by Shostakovich in 1960 for the war memorial in the city of Novorossiysk. The piece consists, mainly, of material Shostakovich had originally written in 1943 as an entry in a contest to compose a new national anthem for the U.S.S.R. "Novorossiysk Chimes" has been playing nonstop at

Heroes Square in Novorossiysk since its opening in 1960. The song's opening phrases have also been used as introductory music for Moscow Radio's late-night news program "CKACWH."

"The Planets" is a seven-movement orchestral suite by the English composer Holst, written between 1914 and 1917. Each movement of the suite is named after a planet of the solar system and its supposed astrological character. The innovative nature of Holst's music caused some initial hostility among a minority of critics, but the suite quickly became and has remained popular, influential and widely performed.

"Trumpet Salutations for Six B-flat Trumpets to the Irish Guards Fanfare Trumpeters" is approximately 90 seconds in length. It was given by the composer to the International Trumpet Guild and published in 2002 by the guild. Coombes is the staff arranger of the HM Band of the Irish Guards London.

"Symphony No. 5" by Tchaikovsky was composed in 1888. The piece is a cyclical symphony, and the recurring main theme is used as a device to unify the symphony's four movements. This motto theme, sometimes dubbed "fate theme," has a funereal character in the first movement, but gradually transforms into a triumphant march, which dominates the final movement.

"Deck the Halls" (originally titled "Deck the Hall") is a traditional Christmas carol. The melody is Welsh, dating back to the 16th century and belongs to a winter carol, "Nos Galan," while the English lyrics, written by the Scottish musician Thomas Oliphant, date to 1862. "The First Nowell," also known as "The First Noel" (or "Noël"), is a traditional English Christmas carol with Cornish origins, most likely from the early modern period, although possibly earlier. "O Come, All Ye Faithful" (originally written in Latin as "Adeste Fideles") is a Christmas carol that has been attributed to various authors and anonymous Cistercian monks.

Performers will include FSU Choral Artists, conducted by *Dr. Scott Rieker*, the FSU Wind Ensemble, conducted by *Dr. Ash Glenn*, as well as the FSU Brass Ensemble, FSU Saxophone Ensemble, FSU String Ensemble, FSU Percussion Ensemble and FSU Jazz Combo. ### **COE Among 55 Educator Prep Programs Recognized for National Excellence**

FSU's College of Education was recently granted national accreditation by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP). The fall 2022 review by the CAEP Accreditation Council resulted in 55 educator preparation providers receiving accreditation, bringing the total to 507 providers approved under the CAEP Accreditation Standards – rigorous, nationally recognized standards that were developed to ensure excellence in educator preparation programs. FSU was one of the 55 providers from 28 states and the United Arab Emirates to receive accreditation for their educator preparation programs.

CAEP is recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation. Accreditation is a nongovernmental activity based on peer review that serves the dual functions of assuring quality and promoting improvement. CAEP is a unified accreditation system intent on raising the performance of all institutions focused on educator preparation. More than 600 educator preparation providers participate in the CAEP Accreditation system, including some previously accredited through former standards.

FSU passed the peer review of the CAEP standards that included the two principles:

- Solid evidence the provider's graduates are competent and caring educators
- Solid evidence the provider's educator staff have the capacity to create a culture of evidence and use it to maintain and enhance the quality of the professional programs they offer

### Dr. James Saku Is Winner of Distinguished Mentor Award

On Nov. 4, *Dr. James C. Saku*, a professor in FSU's Department of Geography, was a recipient of the Bill Kory Distinguished Mentor Award at the 2022 Annual Meeting of the Pennsylvania Geographical Society in Johnstown, Pa.

#### Andy Duncan Will Be Instructor at Writers' Workshop

*Andy Duncan*, a professor in FSU's Department of English and Foreign Languages, has been announced as the Week One instructor of the 2023 Clarion Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers' Workshop at the University of California San Diego. Subsequent instructors at the six-week workshop, which draws seriously aspiring English-language writers from around the world, include Alaya Dawn Johnson, Tochi Onyebuchi, Anjali Sachdeva, Charles Coleman Finlay, Rae Carson and faculty director Jac Jemc.

Founded in 1968 by Robin Scott Wilson at Clarion State College in Pennsylvania, the Clarion Workshop has convened since 2007 at UCSD, where it is supported by the Arthur C. Clarke Center for Human Imagination. This will be Duncan's fourth summer as a Clarion instructor. The 2023 application period opened Dec. 1.

On Oct. 5, project director *John Short*, vice president for University Advancement, was awarded a \$100,000 Program Open Space Award by the Allegany County Government for the FSU Bobcat Track Resurfacing Project. The project was approved for funding by Allegany County in July 2020.

On June 27, project director *Dr. Kate Sheehan*, an assistant professor in FSU's Department of Biology, was awarded a \$26,850 Research Publication Grant in Engineering, Medicine and Science by the American Association of University Women for the project, Influence of a Pathogenic Yet Intermittent Bacterium on the Microbiome of Seabirds.

#### **Online Scholarship Selection Process**

Blackbaud Award Management (Academic Works) will be used for awarding FSU Foundation scholarships and awards for the 2023-2024 academic year. The system was launched on Nov. 15, two months earlier than last year.

Volunteers are needed to serve on the Institutional Scholarship Review Committee. If interested, contact Mariah Brodbeck, Financial Aid counselor in the Financial Aid Office, at 301-687-4301 or <a href="mailto:mlbrodbeck@frostburg.edu">mlbrodbeck@frostburg.edu</a>. Department scholarship committees that need it can receive training and support for learning the scholarship review process using Academic Works by contacting Brodbeck. Also, department chairs should send the list of people serving on their committee to Brodbeck no later than Friday, Dec. 16.

All institution and department scholarship applications must be submitted through Blackbaud Award Management (Academic Works) unless previous arrangements have already been made. Students eligible for any scholarship award should be directed to complete the online application process at <u>https://frostburg.academicworks.com</u>. Students will need to sign in with the same username and password they use in the PAWS system.

Students will continue to receive announcements through email, social media and other forms of communication to encourage applications. Anyone over the minimum 2.5 GPA requirement should apply.

**Friday, Jan. 20** – Deadline for online review of applicants by scholarship selection committee(s) and ranking sheets returned to the Financial Aid Office.

Wednesday, Feb. 1 - System reopens for second round of applications

**Tuesday, Feb. 28**, at 11:59 pm – Deadline for students to complete second round of online applications. Note students who completed the application by **Jan. 3** do not need to resubmit unless they have updated information.

**Friday, March 17** – Deadline for online review of applicants by scholarship selection committee(s) and ranking sheets returned to the Financial Aid Office. Any scholarships that were not awarded during the first round or didn't have at least five eligible recipients for the ranking sheets should be reviewed again at this time.

**Monday, March 27** – System reopens for final round of applications. Ongoing awarding will occur for all remaining scholarship dollars.

Should your department need assistance in meeting these deadlines or if your department is unable to devote the time necessary to complete this process in a timely manner, contact Brodbeck.

Recipients will be verified by Financial Aid, and the FSU Foundation will make notifications to recipients as soon as possible after the **Jan. 20** and **March 17** deadlines. Recipients will be asked to accept the awards by **Feb. 28** or **Monday, May 1**. Acceptances for new students will require a deposit.

Financial Aid will distribute the funds to as many eligible students as possible. The actual award provided to a given recipient will be communicated to departments by the FSU Foundation. Final selection will be confirmed by Financial Aid and announced only by the Foundation, as funding may not be available or the ranked student may be ineligible for reasons unknown to the department. Therefore, faculty/staff should not promise any student a scholarship or a specific amount of an award until formal notification is received from the Foundation.

The Foundation Board of Directors adopted a policy that Foundation funds shall not be used to exceed the actual cost of attendance when combined with other scholarship and/or grant monies.

### **Announcements About Weather-Related Closings and Delays**

Here's how to find out if FSU will be closed, have a delayed opening or close early on bad weather days. The following applies to inperson classes and activities and on-campus employees only, and for the FSU campus only. See the note below for teleworkers and online classes.

If the campus is closed:

In-person classes are canceled.

In-person employees and hybrid teleworkers who are scheduled to be on campus the day of the closure should not report to work.

Essential personnel are required to report to work at their scheduled time.

If a delay is announced:

In-person classes scheduled before the announced opening time are cancelled. Classes after that time occur as scheduled.

In-person employees and hybrid teleworkers scheduled to be on campus that day should begin their shifts at the announced opening time.

Essential personnel are required to report to work at their scheduled time.

If an early closure is announced:

In-person classes scheduled after the announced closure time are cancelled. Classes before that time occur as scheduled.

In-person employees and hybrid teleworkers scheduled to be on campus that day should end their shifts at the announced closure time.

Essential personnel are required to remain at work until their scheduled time.

Teleworkers/online classes:

Fully online classes will continue regardless of campus status.

Teleworkers, whether regular or hybrid, who are scheduled that day to work remotely will follow their regular schedule. (Those who do not work must use accrued leave time.)

Payroll/personnel information:

**Essential personnel are required to report to work in the event of any cancellation or delay.** These individuals have been notified of their "essential" status by their department heads. If you are unsure of your status, check with your supervisor.

Personnel compensation for closures or delays (in-person only) will be based on the appropriate cancellation/delay message as presented on the FSU voicemail system.

The most reliable information regarding delayed openings and cancellations will be from FSU-controlled outlets (email, Burg Alerts, University voicemail, website). Notification of delays or closures will be made through these outlets:

Via Burg Alert (<u>https://www.frostburg.edu/information-technology/Services/burg-alerts.php</u>) text and email alerts. More information is below.

Through campus email.

Main University number (301-687-4000, option 2) after 6 a.m.

On the top of the main page of the FSU website (www.frostburg.edu).

Through local radio stations.

Via Twitter (twitter.com/frostburgstate).

On the FSU Facebook page (www.facebook.com/frostburgstateuniversity).

Everyone with an FSU email is automatically signed up for Burg Alerts to that email. Burg Alerts, in addition to weather notifications, alert the campus in an emergency.

You may also opt to have alerts sent as text messages to your cell phones (standard texting rates apply) and to other email addresses. To sign up, click <u>https://www.frostburg.edu/computing/fsualert</u> or click the Emergency link at the bottom of the FSU front page. Follow the instructions, using your FSU username and password to access the site. You have the option of having alerts sent to two cell numbers and six email addresses. (You may add your family members, or they may create their own accounts at the link above.) **Make sure to follow the validation steps to activate your choices.** 

If you spend any time in the Frostburg area, it is highly recommended that you sign up for the text alerts to ensure you are notified of emergencies or weather-related schedule changes.

Unless FSU closure is announced on the outlets above, we are open. The final decision regarding your safety resides with you. If, in your judgment, it is not safe for you to come to work while the University is still open, you must contact your supervisor and provide this information. In the event that liberal leave is announced for employees, it is expected that everyone will make an effort to report to work. Employees who take liberal leave will be charged for the appropriate leave time. The announcement of liberal leave does not cancel classes, nor does it relieve essential employees of their need to report to work during inclement weather.

### **Practice Ladder Safety This Holiday Season**



Every year, hospital emergency rooms treat thousands of people who are injured from falls involving holiday decorations.

Here are some tips to make your holiday decorating safer:

Use the right ladder for the task at hand.

Inspect the ladder for any damage before using it.

Never use furniture as a ladder.

Follow the 1-to-4 rule for extension ladders: for every 4 feet the ladder rises, move the base out 1 foot from the structure.

Always keep three points of contact on the ladder: two hands and one foot, or two feet and one hand.

And remember that decorating is much easier and safer to do if the task is not left to one person!
