## Roots Theatre to Present “Twelve Angry Jurors”

The Roots African American Theatre Organization will present the play “Twelve Angry Jurors” Thursday and Friday, Feb. 10 and 11, at 8 p.m. each night in the Performing Arts Center Studio Theatre. The cost is \$2.

“Twelve Angry Jurors” is based on “Twelve Angry Men,” the Emmy-award winning television movie by Reginald Rose, adapted for the stage by Sherman L. Sergel.

The play is about a jury panel trying to reach a verdict in a murder trial.

Eleven of the jurors

are ready to convict the boy in the murder of his father, but one juror disagrees and sets out to change the others’ minds.

Directed by Tony Washington, a 1999 FSU graduate, “Twelve Angry Jurors” is being presented by The Roots African American Theatre Organization in collaboration with the Dramatic Publishing Company, the Performing Arts Center at FSU and the Communication and Theatre Arts Department.

The theater troupe is a student organization that started as a reading group. Since 1996, the group has produced plays with the aim of promoting African American playwrights and encouraging young African American actors.



## International Film Fest to Show “Life is Beautiful”

The International Film Festival will feature the Academy Award-Winning “La Vita e Bella” (“Life is Beautiful”) on Tuesday, Feb. 8, at 7 p.m. in the FSU Lane Center, room 201.

Presented in Italian with English subtitles, this moving film tells the story of a family sent to a concentration camp. The father, played by Roberto Benigni, determined to protect his son both psychologically and physically, convinces the boy that everything around them is part of a zany game. In order to win you have to obey the uniformed men pretending to be nasty, never ask for food or rest no matter how badly you

want it and keep quiet in a hiding place when others are sent to “shower” from which they will never return.



## "Millennium Evenings at White House" Available

The Ort Library has the seven-volume video collection titled "Millennium Evenings at the White House," a series of lectures and cultural showcases. The series was presented by the White House Millennium Council, The National Endowment for the Humanities and Sun Microsystems in 1998 and 1999 to highlight American creativity and

inventiveness through ideas, art and scientific discoveries.

Volume 1 is "The Living Past: Commitments for the Future." American historian, Bernard Bailyn discusses the core American ideas that shaped the nation and which we must continue to pursue.

Volume 2 is "Imagination and Change — Science in the Next Millennium." Stephen Hawking, Cambridge University, draws on his deep understanding of the laws of science and their effect on human life.

Volume 3 is "A Celebration of Poetry in American Life." Present and past Poets Laureate of the United States Robert Pinsky, Robert Hass and Rita Dove recite excerpts of famous poems and speak about the evolution of poetry through the century.

Volume 4 is "Jazz, an Expression of Democracy." Grammy award-winning artist Wynton Marsalis and celebrated jazz pianist Marian McPartland explain how the development of this unique American art form reflects the make-up of our democracy. Included in the presentation are jazz musicians, scholars and a 17-piece jazz band.

Volume 5 is "The Meaning of the Millennium." Professor Natalie Zemon Davis and Professor Martin Marty examine the meaning of the millennium from both historical and religious perspectives.


Volume 6 is "Women as Citizens: Vital Voices Through the Century." Professors Nancy Cott, Alice Kessler-Harris and Dr. Ruth Simmons discuss the history of American women in civic life in the 20th century.

Volume 7 is "The Perils of Indifference: Lessons from a Violent Century." Nobel Peace Prize-winner Elie Wiesel discusses the need for individuals to exercise their moral consciences in the face of injustice.



## Visual Arts and DGEF Offer Design Workshops

The Department of Visual Arts, in collaboration with Dynamic Graphics Educational Foundation (DGEF), will offer two Web site design workshops on campus in March.

The first three-day workshop, entitled "Hands-On Web Page Design," will run from March 20-22. This workshop is specifically structured for graphic designers who need to learn how to translate their print-based skills to Web-based design. Attendees should have electronic design experience (Macintosh or Windows) and be comfortable with Photoshop. Participants will learn the "do's and don'ts" for converting images, find out which Web image file formats are best for their projects, understand the quality JPEG files, and learn alternatives to transparent GIFs and bit-depth constraints.

Topics covered in lectures, demonstrations and hands-on assignments will cover HTML basics, layout principles for the Web, using FTP, file management, incorporating animation, multi-purposing Web content for other media, creating frames and an adaptive palette for photos and using a browser-safe palette.

Workshop fee includes one-to-one computer use, a comprehensive workshop manual and files of class projects. Attendees will also receive a bonus CD including a selection of Dynamic Graphics royalty-free images.

Each participant will create a Web site using Photoshop, Illustrator, BBEdit, Navigator/Explorer, as well as a variety of shareware programs. The course manual also includes a Web glossary, HTML tips for visual designers, valuable references and link lists, and article reprints.

The second workshop, "Advanced Web Design," is scheduled for March 23-25. This intensive three-day advanced workshop will help current Web content developers expand their working skills to produce more dynamic, state-of-the-art Web sites.

Attendees should have completed the previous "Hands-on Web Page Design" workshop or have mastered equivalent skills with basic and intermediate-level Web design before taking "Advanced Web Design." Although participants in this advanced workshop will be exposed to Java Script, it should be noted that this is not a programming class.

## Would-Be Teachers Eligible for Scholarship

If you are an education major and would like to become a classroom teacher in the Maryland public schools upon graduation, the new Maryland Teacher Scholarship may provide an annual \$3,000 scholarship for you.

To qualify, a student must have a cumulative 3.0 grade point average, be a Maryland resident and be a full-time student. In addition, a recipient must agree to work full-time in Maryland for one year for each academic year the award is received.

To apply for this scholarship, an applicant must complete the Maryland HOPE Scholarship Program application and submit it to the Maryland State Scholarship Administration by Wednesday, March 1. The application is available in the Office of Financial Aid, 114 Pullen.

## Business Students Offer Free Tax Help

Free help preparing 1999 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by

volunteers from FSU's College of Business accounting and business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS.

Help is offered to taxpayers who file Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Dr. Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. Student volunteers will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in FSU's Frampton Hall.

At your appointment, bring the tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, interest and dividend statements (Form 1099), a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses.


##### 3. Study Geography in Germany
