UT to Present Melodrama 'Under the Gaslight'

University Theatre will present "Under the Gaslight," one of the most famous melodramas ever written, a classic tale of Good versus Evil filled with suspense and action.

Performances will be March 2, 8, 9 and 10 at 8 p.m. in the PAC's F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre. A matinee is scheduled for March 3 at 2 p.m.

Written in 1867 by Augustin Daly, one of the first modern directors, "Under the Gaslight" is set in the post-civil war period of the 19th century. For its time, the play displays a surprising awareness of major social issues of the time – class conflict, income tax problems, capricious court systems, poor treatment of war veterans and women's suffrage.

The action begins in Manhattan when the pure and lovely Laura Courtland's engagement to rich playboy Ray Trafford is thwarted after the villainous Byke calls her birthright into question. With her position in high society destroyed and her engagement ended, Laura seeks answers among her former high society peers and the city's rough street people, none of whom are what they appear to be. Despite Byke's efforts to thwart and control her, Laura's strength and resourcefulness prove her to be more than just a pretty face.

In the play's most famous scene, Laura is kidnapped by Byke and plunged into a raging river while a wounded soldier tied to the railroad tracks faces a locomotive rumbling right toward him – on stage. By the play's end, family secrets and characters' hidden motives are exposed.

FBI Super Sleuth John Douglas to Speak

John Douglas, a legendary figure in law enforcement, will offer a fascinating inside look at some of the most intriguing criminal cases of our time. Sponsored by the Campus Activities Board, his lecture is scheduled for Wednesday, March 7 at 7 p.m. in the Lane Center's Manicur Assembly Hall.

Now retired after 25 years of service, Douglas is free to share his experiences as chief of the FBI's Investigative Support Unit, the team that tackles the

most baffling and senseless of unsolved violent crimes. He explores the cat-andmouse struggle between his elite squad of investigators and a chilling rogue's gallery of assailants, a sort of surreal chess game with life-and-death consequences. Along the way, he also shows how understanding the minds and motives of opponents can influence success in any arena.

A pioneer in using the behavioral sciences for criminal profiling, Douglas was the model for the Scott Glenn character in "The Silence of the Lambs" and the original choice to play the role. He has hunted some of the most notorious and sadistic criminals of our time: the Trailside Killer of San Francisco, the Atlanta child murderer, the mastermind of the Tylenol poisonings, the man who hunted prostitutes for sport in the Alaska woods and Seattle's Green River killer, the case that almost killed him. He has also confronted, interviewed and studied such notorious figures as Charles Manson, Sirhan Sirhan, Richard Speck, John Wayne Gacy, David Berkowitz (the Son of Sam) and James Earl Ray to better understand the criminal mind.

Douglas is the author of the national bestsellers "The Anatomy of Motive," "Obsession" and "Mind Hunter and Unabomber: On the Trail of America's Most Wanted Serial Killer," co-authored with Mark Olshaker.

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Given the recent release of the movie "Hannibal," Douglas' FSU appearance is perfectly timed for fans of the Hannibal Lecter series of films. It is free and open to the public.

Weaving together themes of community, suicide and love of animals, she writes about her sister's death, aging parents and a basset hound, "legless as a walrus," that shows her "the meaning of character." In other poems, she speaks through the persona of a French painter and an Auschwitz victim to explore the complexities of sexuality and survivorship. At times humorous, poignant and tender, the poems in her most recent book, The Horse Fair, have earned widespread praise. Becker teaches at Pennsylvania State University

Cris Williamson to Perform March 12

In celebration of Women's History Month, the legendary singer/songwriter Cris Williamson will perform at Frostburg State University on Monday, March 12 at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre. Tickets for the concert, which are free, become available Feb. 19.

Williamson's groundbreaking record "The Changer and The Changed," recorded in 1975, propelled her into the limelight and initiated a new genre, women's music. The recording is one of the best selling independent releases ever. With 19 albums to her credit, she is now working on the album "Lucky Dog" and embarking on her first solo tour in almost 15 years.

A former schoolteacher, she has been called a "heroic character [whose] tireless activism continues" by The Boston Phoenix. She has appeared on a multitude of benefit records, performed with Bonnie Raitt and Jackson Brown on behalf of Native American issues and cofounded In the Best Interests of the Children, a pediatric AIDS organization. Her lyrics are often cited in books, thesis papers and women's studies courses.

Maori Paintings on Exhibit in Roper Gallery

The contemporary Maori paintings of New Zealand artist and educator Greg Whitecliffe will be on exhibit through Saturday, Feb. 27, at the Roper Gallery.

Whitecliffe's bicultural identity as the son of a Maori father and English mother has inspired his work in both the European traditions of impressionism and expressionism and the Maori tradition of art as "taunga," a treasure imbued with life force.

This exhibit represents a departure from his previous path following the footsteps of his mother's descendants, which included English court painters. In a mid-career change, Whitecliffe, also known by his Maori name Kerehi Tikihana Pararaki Wikiriwhi, explores his Maori roots as a first son of a first son from 13 generations of tribal leaders. The paintings serve as a living myth, reflecting 29 generations of a Maori tradition that honors Papa, the earth mother and Rangi, the sky father.

As founder and president of the Whitecliffe College of Art & Design in Auckland, New Zealand, Whitecliffe has maintained an active professional career.

FSU to Celebrate National TRIO Week

FSU's TRIO programs, federally funded educational outreach programs designed to enhance educational opportunities for students who are the first in their families to go to college, who are economically disadvantaged or who have disabilities, will celebrate National TRIO Week, Feb. 19 to 24.

Throughout the week, representatives of FSU's TRIO programs — Student Support Services, Upward Bound, Upward Bound Regional Math/Science Center and the Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program will be available in the FSU Lane Center from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. to provide information about the programs.

In addition, during the week, Student Support Services participants will present certificates of appreciation to FSU faculty and staff who have been nominated for being particularly supportive of SSS students.

Students and staff from the SSS and Regional Math/Science programs also plan to attend the National TRIO Day celebration at the University of Maryland College Park on Saturday, Feb. 24.

The TRIO programs began with the establishment of Upward Bound, which grew out of the 1964 Economic Opportunity Act. Upward Bound was joined by Talent Search in 1965 and, in 1968, Student Support Services. By the late 1960s, these programs became known as TRIO.

Over the next three decades, five more programs were added, and the TRIO group now totals eight outreach and support programs targeted to help disadvantaged students progress from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs.

The University's Student Support Services is an academic support program entirely funded by the U.S. Department of Education. With an annual budget of over \$200,000, SSS serves 275 FSU students by providing academic advisement, personal counseling, student

financial aid assistance,
professional tutoring, academic success workshops, and educational and cultural events.
FSU's Upward Bound program provides high school students
with the skills and motivation necessary to succeed in high school and college. Program

participants are involved in both academic year and summer residential program components. The FSU Upward Bound program is

funded to serve 60 Allegany County high school students.

The Upward Bound Regional Math/ Science Center is comparable to the Upward Bound program but addresses the need for specific instruction in the fields of math and science and draws students from a wider geographic area.

The Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program's mission is to increase the number of undergraduates from under-represented populations enrolling in graduate school to pursue doctoral degrees. FSU students participating in this program attend classes, work with faculty mentors and prepare research projects during the summer at the University of Maryland College Park.

The American Red Cross Needs Your Blood

There will be a blood drive at the Lane Center Tuesday, Feb. 20, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Winter weather and poor driving conditions have caused area blood inventories to reach critical levels. Lower than usual blood inventories are expected during the winter season, but this year an increased demand for blood products has made the situation even more urgent.

There are eight blood types, and six of these types are at less than optimum levels. Three types – 0 Negative, A Negative and 0 Positive – are at less than a two-day supply.

This is cause for concern as a constant blood supply is needed to continue to supply Western Maryland Health Systems, Potomac Valley Hospital and Garrett County Memorial Hospital.

Blood products are broken down into components so one donation can help 3-4 hospital patients.

FSU Students Offer Free Tax Prep Assistance

Free help preparing 2000 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program at FSU. Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by volunteers from FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers who file Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.

Summer in Germany

Spend five weeks this summer in Schwäbisch Gmünd, Germany near Stuttgart and study at a University of Maryland campus. In Summer 2001 Dr. Joy Kroeger-Mappes will offer PHIL 304, 'Social Philosophy,' which can count towards BA/BS degree requirements at FSU. Weekend excursions are expected to include trips to Munich and Switzerland. Application deadline is 1 March.

Summer in Ireland - Social Work Majors

Students in human services fields are invited to apply for the summer field experience program in Limerick, Ireland. Students will be placed in agencies in the Limerick area and receive credit for SOWK 490 'Special Topics in Social Work.' Applications should reach the CIE this week.

Summer in Oxford, England

Art and Design students are encouraged to sign up for the FSU Summer in Oxford program which takes place during the first three weeks of August. Dr. Judy Dieruf will teach 'Watercolor in Britain,' and students may take part in a variety of field trips around Oxford. Application deadline March 10 for students who want to apply for an FSU scholarship.

Summer in Ecuador

The International Student Exchange Program (ISEP) allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of over 200 foreign locations. Students may take financial aid with them, and may apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in either English or in other languages. Work/Volunteer Experience Overseas

Students interested in working abroad should come by the CIE for information about internships, volunteer organizations and paid work overseas. Many organizations help students obtain jobs and work permits, and some help to arrange housing as well. Students can choose from short experiences (1-2 months) to longer experiences (4-12 months), or even look into a more serious commitment (1-3 years). Destinations are available throughout the world.

Study Abroad Information Sessions

Students who would like to learn more about study abroad opportunities, and how they fit into a degree program, may come to the Center for International Education in the Fuller House on any Tuesday at 3 p.m. for an information session. The CIE staff will provide an overview of study abroad programs and requirements, and have application forms available. Scholarship and financial aid information will also be available.
