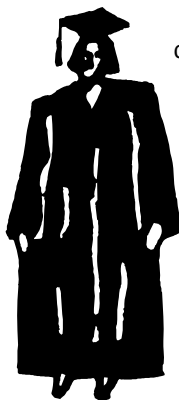
Honors in General Education

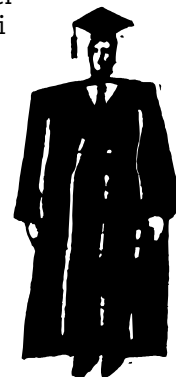

She has also worked at the FSU Children's Center as a child-care aide. Abucevicz is an accomplished athlete, excelling in several sports, including volleyball, basketball and track. Doggett will earn an early childhood/elementary education degree. During her various internships, Doggett organized a classroom science fair for

kindergarten, coordinated successful service learning projects within her school community and implemented a variety of performance-based activities. She developed technology application projects, participated in "Read Across America" celebrations and was involved in the service activities of the Maryland Student Education Association. Most recently, Doggett served as a student member of the FSU committee preparing the University's accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). She is a native of Williamsport, Md.

VanFleet of LaVale will graduate with a double major in International Studies (International Politics track) and Spanish. His continued interest in international human rights has led VanFleet to participate in the study abroad program in Argentina where he conducted interviews with families of victims suffering from human rights abuses. He performed an internship in the Science and Human Rights Program at the American Association for the Advancement of Science in Washington, D.C., and is conducting research on protection mechanisms for indigenous knowledge in Latin American patent law. Locally, VanFleet volunteered to teach Spanish to first-grade students at Frost Elementary School. He will attend The University of Cincinnati College of Law.

'Flame' Last Film in Spring Africana Series

The final film in the spring 2002 Africana Film Series is "Flame," which will be shown Tuesday, May 14, in the Lane University Center's Atkinson Room (201). The series is sponsored by the African American Studies Program.

"Flame" is a tribute to women fighters in the Zimbabwean liberation struggle of the 1960s and 1970s that culminated in the independence of Zimbabwe from white minority rule in 1980. The film is the story of two close friends, Florence, impulsive and brave, and Nyasha, scholarly and cautious, whose involvement in the war of liberation leads to very different outcomes. In 1975, while still teenagers, they join the *Chimurenga*, the Zimbabwean freedom struggle, at its camps in Mozambique; Florence assumes the war name, "Flame," while Nyasha chooses "Liberty." We watch as they grow into confident women, training as soldiers and learning about their political rights.

The documentary is the result of work performed by FSU Mass Communication students in the "Doing Biographies" class taught by Ed Mallory. Joyce Middleton, Accounting, participated as a member of a panel titled "Tax Educators' Dialogue" at the Mid-Atlantic regional meeting of the American Accounting Association, held in Baltimore, Md., from April 25 to 27. She also served as the moderator for two other sessions - "Tax and Teaching" and "Curriculum."

Dr. George R. Plitnik, physics, and **Dr. Paul R. La Chance**, English, recently received a 2002 Development Grant award for \$2,000 from the Berkeley, Calif.-based Center for Theology and the Natural Sciences (CTNS).

As a part of their "Science and Religion Course Program," CTNS offers this development incentive to professors who have previously won the global "Science and Religion Course Competition" and who have gone on to further enhance the course and re-offer it with significant and improved modifications.

La Chance and Plitnik originally were awarded the 2000 CTNS Course Award for \$10,000 in a worldwide competition open to all private and public colleges

and seminaries. Both professors traveled to Oxford, England, in the summer of 2000 to join other winners from around the world at a four-day conference on "God and Time." Then, after attending an additional conference on "Science and Spirituality" at Harvard University in October of 2001, La Chance and Plitnik submitted to CTNS the revisions and additions they made to their already highly acknowledged team-taught course "Physics and Metaphysics" (PHSC 444). CTNS, based upon these further course improvements and the successful re-offering of the course, named both professors as the 2002 Development Grant recipients.

Half of the original award, \$5,000, was donated to the FSU Ort Library for about 300 new books in the field of science and religion.

FSU senior **Roger Skipper** of Oakland, Md., a 50-year-old Navy veteran and grandfather who put two children and his wife through college before pursuing his own education, is among the first group of students to be awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Graduate Scholarship.

Skipper will pursue a Master in Fine Arts degree in Creative Writing through a non-residential program at Vermont College in Montpelier, Vt. He will graduate summa cum laude from FSU on May 25 with a bachelor of arts degree in English with a focus on creative writing. He also received departmental honors in English.

Skipper is one of 50 men and women ages 19 to 50, who represent the "first class" of Cooke Foundation scholars. Each will receive up to \$50,000 a year for up to six years to pursue graduate studies at an accredited university.

Skipper, who was an executive with Beachy Lumber before he returned to college, has written one novel and has a second in the works. He also builds and plays musical instruments. Since 1990, he has dedicated most of his summers to helping build buildings and furniture in Sucre, Bolivia, primarily for a children's home. The project allows the children to live in a large, family-style home rather than in an institutional setting.

Dr. Joan DeVee Dixon, an associate professor of music at FSU and former church musician, received an unusual Easter gift this year. While visiting Venice with her mother during Holy Week this past March, Dixon had the opportunity to play the Prelude and Postlude for Easter Mass at St. Mark's Cathedral.

Annual Competition for Fulbright Grants Opens

The U.S. Department of State, the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board and the Institute of International Education (IIE) announce the opening of the 2003-2004 competition for Fulbright and related grants for graduate study or research abroad in academic fields and for professional training in the creative and performing arts.

The purpose of these grants is to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and other countries through the exchange of persons, knowledge and skills.

For all grants, applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application and hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by the beginning date of the grant. Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but they must have four years of relevant training or study.

All applicants are required to have sufficient proficiency in the language of the host country to carry out their proposed study or research.

Full grants provide round-trip international travel, maintenance for the tenure of the award, a research allowance and tuition waivers, if applicable. All grants include supplemental health and accident insurance.

Complete program and application information is contained in the brochure, "Fulbright and Related Grants for Graduate Study and Research Abroad, 2003-2004," and on IIE's Web site at www.iie.org/fulbright/us.

School for International Training

FSU is affiliated with the School for International Training (SIT). This enables FSU students to study through SIT in over 50 locations while remaining registered at FSU. All financial aid will transfer. SIT offers programs in Africa, Asia, South America, Europe and Austral-asia. This is a fantastic opportunity for students who would like to spend a semester, year or summer off the beaten track.

Study in Limerick, Ireland, Spring 2003

Students interested in taking part in the Ireland Exchange Program in Limerick during spring 2003 should pick up an application at the CIE office. Participants in the program study at Mary Immaculate College and take one FSU class and three MIC classes. Next spring, Dr. Kenneth Witmer (Educational Professions) will accompany the group and will teach three classes. All financial aid will transfer and scholarships are available.

Study Down Under: Australia, New Zealand

FSU is affiliated with AustraLearn, an organization that provides unique opportunities for students to study at universities in Australia and New Zealand. AustraLearn arranges cheap flights, an orientation program on the Great Barrier Reef, pre-registration and transcript evaluation. Students may choose from a range of courses at campuses in exotic surroundings. Scholarships are available from both FSU and AustraLearn. Applications for fall 2002 and spring 2003 are now being accepted.

Study in Newcastle, England

Students interested in studying at the University of Northumbria in Newcastle, England, may apply now for spring 2003 semester. Newcastle is one of the liveliest cities in the UK, just across the Channel from Amsterdam, and three hours north of London (one hour south of Edinburgh) by train. Courses are available in a wide variety of subjects. The cost is about the same as one semester at FSU and all financial aid will transfer.

Semester Overseas for Same Price as FSU

The International Student Exchange Program allows FSU students to register at FSU, pay FSU tuition and housing, and then study overseas for a semester, year or summer at one of more than 200 locations. Students may take financial aid with them and apply for scholarships from the CIE. Students may choose programs taught in English or other languages. For the price of an airline ticket, this is a great way to earn credit toward an FSU degree while enjoying life in a foreign culture. Apply now for spring 2003.

FSU affiliates with the American Institute for Foreign Study, which offers

study abroad programs at a variety of universities around the world. Programs are open to all majors. Study in Prague, South Africa or Japan. Register at FSU and use your financial aid for all programs. AIFS offers scholarships to qualified students. Apply now for spring 2003.

Do Your Student Teaching in Copenhagen

Education majors who would like to earn a semester of FSU credits while studying in Denmark should apply now for the spring 2003 semester's exchange program with the KDAS School of Teacher Training in Copenhagen. Students complete projects and spend several weeks in Danish schools practicing student teaching skills. All courses are in English. Financial aid transfers and scholarships are available.

Gain Work/Volunteer Experience Overseas

Students interested in working abroad should come by the CIE for information about internships, volunteer organizations and paid work overseas. Many organizations help students obtain jobs and work permits, and some help to arrange housing as well. Students can choose from short experiences (one to two months) to longer experiences (four to 12 months), or even look into a more serious commitment (one to three years). Destinations are available throughout the world.

Learn More about Study Abroad

Students who would like to learn more about study abroad opportunities and how they fit into a degree program may come to the CIE. The CIE staff will provide an overview of study abroad programs and requirements and have applications available. Scholarship and financial aid information will also be available. Students may use the CIE library and computer to search for programs. Many videos are also available.
