Official Notices to be Sent in Student E-Mail

Starting in the spring 2004 semester, the University will begin using University assigned e-mail addresses to communicate official information to students. General announcements, as well as student specific notices from faculty and administrative offices will be sent to the FSU e-mail address assigned to students when they first arrived on campus instead of using the postal service and the student's local address.

The use of e-mail will increase as the new student software system (PAWS) is fully implemented. Automated financial and academic communications will be sent through PAWS to assigned e-mail addresses. Therefore, it is imperative that students check their University email account on a daily basis.

Students can access e-mail from any Web browser by going to www.frostburg.edu/mail/. From here, students can read on-line instructions, sign-on as a first time user, look up email username or login to the e-mail system. Students should become familiar with the system as soon as possible.

If students experience difficulty accessing their e-mail accounts, they should contact the FSU Help Desk at x7777 (301-687-7777 from off-campus).

Muth Interim Director of Hagerstown Center

Lewis F. Muth III, a university business instructor, has been named interim director of the FSU Hagerstown and Frederick centers, following the retirement of Director Dr. James W. Shaw.

Muth will direct the operations of the two FSU centers until the opening of the University System of Maryland Hagerstown Education Center in January 2005. A search is under way for a director of the new USM center.

FSU's Frederick Center will close at the end of 2004, and the FSU Hagerstown Center's operations will be incorporated into the USM Center.

In addition to managing day-to-day operations, part of Muth's role will be to facilitate the transition from the current centers. Muth, a resident of Hagerstown, will also continue as a part-time faculty member for FSU's College of Business, for which he has taught in Hagerstown for a number of years.

Legislative Update

StateLines will bring you updates on the USM-related happenings in Annapolis during the legislative session.

The Maryland legislature begins its second week. Some important calendar dates are already set:

On Jan. 21, the governor sent his operating budget to the legislature. We are expecting the USM budget to remain the same as the final approved budget for last year with some additional funds for the new Hagerstown Center.

Jan. 27- the Governor will submit his capital budget.

Jan. 29- the State of the State address by Gov. Ehrlich

March 4- President Gira will give her testimony before the Senate committee on March 4 and the House committee on March 9.

Three bills that have an impact on USM have already been filed but no dates have been established to hear testimony on them.

HB 10 (introduced by Del Healy et al)- proposes a cap of 25 percent on out of state undergraduate enrollment at USM campuses. (FYI, FSU's undergraduate out of state enrollment is about 10-11 percent.)

HB 66 (Del. McMillan et.al.)- proposes a cap on tuition at or below the CPI for the previous year.

HB 96 (Del. McKee)- proposes a tuition plan which provides that a student's tuition remain the same for the four years he or she is at the university working for a degree. There are also provisions for students who require more than 4 years to get a degree and for transfer students.

Undergraduate Ed. Initiative Proposal

This spring, the steering committee of the Undergraduate Education Initiative will present its proposal for the reform of the University's undergraduate curriculum.

The proposal represents almost two years of work that included an evaluation of the current curriculum, research into national curricular trends, and collection of input from faculty. In addition to the work of the steering committee, four sub-committees prepared comprehensive reports reflecting recommendations for their designated areas: The Classroom Experience; Multiculturalism, Gender, and Internationalization; Co-Curricular and Experiential Education; and Technology and Information Literacy.

The timeline for the review of the proposal is as follows:

2004: Feb. 20: The proposal is submitted to the president, the provost, the deans, and the Faculty Senate and posted on the Undergraduate Education Initiative Web site.

<u>March</u>: In addition to general campus review, the proposal is submitted for initial consideration by the Academic Standards Sub-Committee and the General Education/Program Assessment Sub-Committee of the Faculty Senate.

<u>April</u>: A faculty assembly provides opportunity for voicing of faculty opinion regarding the proposal.

<u>May/summer:</u> After making any appropriate revisions as a result of the faculty assembly, the UEI Steering Committee formally presents the proposal to the chair of Faculty Senate.

<u>September-December</u>: Faculty Senate discusses various tenets of the proposal and acts to accept, revise or reject.

<u>2005: Fall 2005:</u> Changes to the undergraduate curriculum, as approved, take effect.

Points of Pride

FSU's mechanical and electrical engineering programs, offered in collaboration with the University of Maryland College Park, have been accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, a designation indicating that met ABET's standards and that graduates are prepared to begin professional practice or graduate study.

The unique FSU-UM programs employ an innovative use of distance learning to provide new opportunities for engineering education in a region in which this resource had previously been lacking. Students enrolled in these programs complete all course work on the FSU campus, with approximately 20 percent of the curriculum delivered from professors at the University of Maryland's acclaimed A. James Clark School of Engineering through the use of interactive video technology linking classrooms at FSU and UM. The majority of the coursework, however, including all design and laboratory courses, is taught by engineering faculty on-site at FSU.

Students receive UM degrees but are in residence at FSU for the duration of the program.

The accreditation is considered retroactive to the beginning of the program, meaning all students who have graduated from the program since the first class in May of 2001 have degrees from an accredited program, a requirement of many graduate schools, government agencies and licensing boards.

Students at FSU work closely with Dr. *Oguz Soysal* in electrical engineering and Dr. *Chandrasekhar Thamire* in mechanical engineering.

The Law Enforcement Training Network (LETN) has honored **10 Univer***sity Police Officers* as part of its firstever list of "*Training Heroes.*" Seven of those officers ranked in the network's top 10 in the nation. The honorees were determined on the basis of the number of training courses taken and passed.

Officer *Timothy Stevens* completed 64 of the online courses, ranking fourth in the LETN top finishers.

Officers **Robert Drees, Kevin Fearon, Louis Femi, Lynn Lewis, Cynthia Powers** and **John Ralston** each completed 63 courses, rounding out the LETN top 10. Officers **T. Scott Donahue** and **Jamie Winters,** who completed 62, and Officer **Krista Livengood**, who completed 61, were also recognized.


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Student Telemarketing Positions Offered

Students Offer Free Tax Preparation Help

Free help preparing 2003 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee these student preparers.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. Students will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Framptom Hall (except for March 20 and 27). A drop-off service will also be available throughout the week.

Taxpayers arriving for an appointment should bring any tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, interest and dividend statements (Form 1099), a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses. Taxpayer and dependent social security numbers and birth dates are also needed.


Women's Studies Scholarship Offered
