# Terell Stafford Quintet To Hit High Notes at FSU

The Terell Stafford Quintet will perform at 8 p.m. in FSU's ARMAH on March 8. A preperformance dialogue is scheduled for 4:30 p.m.

The hearts of audience members will soar with the sounds of traditional trumpet infused with a modern twist when the Terell Stafford Quintet performs **March 8** at FSU. The muchanticipated event, part of the Cultural Events Series Jazz Club sponsored by Kauffman Music, includes a free, educational jazz session with the quintet at 4:30 p.m. in the Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall (ARMAH) of FSU's Lane University Center, followed by a ticketed performance later that evening at 8 p.m. in the ARMAH.

Stafford has been hailed as "one of the great players of our time, a fabulous trumpet player" by piano legend McCoy Tyner. Known for being a gifted and versatile player with a voice all his own, Stafford combines lyricism and a deep love of melody with a spirited, adventurous edge. This uniquely expressive, well-defined musical talent allows Stafford the ability to dance in and around the rich trumpet tradition of his predecessors while making his own inroads.

An educator as well as a performer, Stafford currently holds the positions of Professor of Music and Director of Jazz Studies at Temple University in Philadelphia and is a clinician for the prestigious Vail Foundation in Colorado and Jazz at Lincoln Center's Essentially Ellington Program. He has also served as a member of the faculty for the Juilliard Institute for Jazz Studies in New York. Stafford was born in Miami and raised in

# FSU Students Can Help with Taxes

Free help preparing 2007 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered from early February through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee these student preparers. The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible. Electronic filing will also be available for those who qualify.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Dr. Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at 301-687-4154. Students will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in FSU's Framptom Hall (except for March 15 and 22).

A drop-off service will also be available throughout the week.

Taxpayers arriving for an appointment should bring any tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, all Form 1099s, a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses. Taxpayer and dependent social security numbers and birth dates are also required.

# Feminist Classic Part of Main Stage Series

University Theatre will continue the Main Stage series with Sophie Treadwell's classic of 20th century feminist literature, "Machinal," on **Feb. 29, March 1, 6, 7 and 8** at 7:30 p.m. and **March 1** at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre of the Performing Arts Center.

"Machinal" is, in part, based on the celebrated 1927 trial of Ruth Snyder, the first woman to be put to death in New York's electric chair for the murder of her husband. Like many American women playwrights of her generation, Treadwell was trained as a reporter. Keenly aware that the legal system of the time and most social and cultural norms were dictated by male interests, Treadwell responded with a powerful play about "an ordinary young woman," whose inescapable entrapment in an



oppressively mechanized, materialistic and impersonal world drives her to commit murder. Expressionistic in style, "Machinal" presents events as seen through the eyes and the haunting perspective of the main character. As the New York Times wrote in 1928, "Machinal" is a work that "in a hundred years ... should still be vivid!"

## Wind, Solar Certified Program Available

FSU is offering an education program on design, installation and maintenance of residential wind and solar (PV) electric generation systems. The program includes an online component (March 31 through May 23) as well as hands-on training (May 29 through June 1) to prepare the attendees for the certification test administered by the North American Board of Certified Energy Practitioners (NABCEP), Inc. #### FSU Celebrates Continued Enrollment Success

A 2.7 percent increase in the number of undergraduate students this semester from the spring of 2007 – and a 1.8 increase in students overall – has FSU

officials celebrating their continued success in campus initiatives designed to reverse a recent downward trend in enrollment.

Total enrollment by headcount for spring stands at 4,667, up from 4,585 this time last year. The number of undergraduates was up by 107 students this spring, to 4,038 from last year's 3,931.

In terms of full-time equivalents, spring enrollment is up 2.9 percent from the previous year for all students, to 4,150 from 4,032; up 2.6 percent for undergraduate FTEs, to 3,810 from 3,712; and up 6.6 percent for graduate FTEs to 340 from 319.

#### **University Recognized for Service**

The Corporation for National and Community Service named Frostburg State University to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for exemplary service efforts and service to disadvantaged youth.

"I have been gratified to see the commitment to service of so many of Frostburg State University's students," said FSU President Jonathan C. Gibralter. "They show a dedication to the community and a passion for making things better that I find heartening and which makes me proud to be associated with them."

Launched in 2006, the Community Service Honor Roll is the highest federal recognition a school can achieve for its commitment to service-learning and civic engagement. Honorees for the award were chosen based on a series of selection factors including scope and innovativeness of service projects, percentage of student participation in service activities, incentives for service, and the extent to which the school offers academic service-learning courses.
