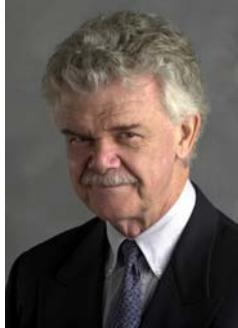

'Dreamer and the Dream': MLK Celebration

In memory of the life and accomplishments of Martin Luther King Jr., FSU will hold its annual MLK Celebration, "The Dreamer and the Dream," featuring guest speaker C. Fraser Smith. The event will be held at 7:30 p.m. on **Thursday, April 16**, in the PAC Pealer Recital Hall.

Smith is a columnist from the Baltimore Sun and news director of WYPR Radio in Baltimore. He has also written a book, "Here Lies Jim Crow: Civil Rights in Maryland," which recounts the tale of Jim Crow policies in Maryland through the stories, words and deeds of famous, infamous and little-known Marylanders. He traces the roots



of Jim Crow laws from Dred Scott to Plessy v. Ferguson and describes the parallel and opposite early efforts of those who struggled to establish freedom and basic rights for African Americans.

The celebration will be preceded by a special Harmony Walk: "Celebrating the Dream, Walking as One." All who are interested are invited to meet at the FSU Clock Tower at 6:15 p.m. The walk will begin at 6:45 p.m. and will go through campus and end at the Performing Arts Center by 7:15 p.m.

Student groups are encouraged to create a colorful banner incorporating the theme and the name of their organization. Prizes will be awarded for the three best banners: 1st prize – \$100, 2nd prize – \$75 and 3rd prize – \$50.

FSU Presents Spring Concert With Boys Like Girls and Vedera



Rock to the music of two up-and-coming national rock groups when FSU's CES Concerts and UPC present emo-pop group Boys Like Girls, with opening act indie-band Vedera **Sunday, April 26**, in the Cordts Main

Arena. The spring concert kicks off at 8 p.m. with doors opening at 7 p.m.

The Boston-area band includes Martin Johnson, lead singer and guitarist; John Keefe, drums; Bryan Donahue, bass; and Paul DiGiovanni, lead guitar. An early demo version of "The Great Escape" and acoustic spin on "Thunder" were the sparks that ignited a firestorm of attention to the band's MySpace and purevolume.com pages. By the end of 2005, the band was topping the purevolume.com New Artists chart and gathering thousands of MySpace friends.

Opening for Boys Like Girls is the indie/art rock band, Vedera. Hailing from Kansas City, Mo., the band was formed in 2004 by singer and guitarist/pianist Kristen May and lead guitarist Brian Little, with drummer Drew Little and bassist Jason Douglas.

'MMIX' Art Exhibition Showcases Seniors' Talent

"MMIX," an exhibition featuring artwork by FSU seniors Erin Cunningham, Michelle Nash, Kristina Schurg, Sarah Sine and Monika Wertman, will be on view **through Wednesday, April 15**, in the Stephanie Ann Roper Fine Arts Gallery.

Cunningham's expressive use of color and texture allows her artwork to communicate with viewers on two distinct levels: through her own fears and the fears of the viewers.

Nash's work mostly consists of detailed portraits of objects found in nature. These intimate portraits engage and inspire the viewer through organic lines and vibrant colors.

Schurg's work focuses on conveying a message and creating an atmosphere through the use of images and type.

Sine creates functional sculptures that show off the beauty of the material from which they are constructed. Her work is intended to collect the scuffs and scrapes from years of use as well as the aged, patched look from tender care.

Wertman's work consists of portraiture depicted in the 1930s/1940s Hollywood aesthetic of photographer George Hurrell and is influenced by the Art Deco style of Jean-Gabriel Domergue.

Artworks will be available for purchase from the artists throughout the duration of the exhibition.

Earth Week Offers Array of Activities



FSU is offering opportunities to celebrate environmental awareness and learn about "learning and living green" during an Earth Week 2009 celebration **Monday, April 20, through Friday, April 24**, on the FSU campus.

The festivities are divided into five categories for each day of Earth Week: "A Day of Celebration," "A Day of Learning," "A Day of Action," "A Day of Appreciation" and "A Day of Service." Each day's focus ensures a comprehensive look at environmental issues and FSU's many groups involved in its initiative, "Learning Green, Living Green," and in supporting environmental education in general.

"A Day of Celebration" on **Monday, April 20**, kicks off with a panel discussion from 3 to 4 p.m. in Lane 201, featuring FSU faculty members who will discuss ideas about incorporating environmental sustainability into the FSU curriculum. Later that evening, keynote speaker Brian Tokar, a noted advocate, author and prominent voice on environmental issues since the 1970s, will give a presentation on "From Climate Awareness to Climate Justice" from 7 to 10 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall. Food, music and prizes are included in this event. Tokar is the author of "The Green Alternative" and "Earth for Sale" and editor of "Redesigning Life?," an international collection on the politics and implications of biotechnology. His latest book is "Gene Traders: Biotechnology, World Trade and the Globalization of Hunger."

Tuesday, April 21, is "A Day of Learning" with Focus Frostburg 2009, a "Learn-in" for a Sustainable Future, featuring over 20 50-minute presentations by FSU faculty, staff, students and community partners on topics related to environmental sustainability and climate awareness. These sessions are open to the public and will be from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Lane Center and surrounding buildings. Visit www.frostburg.edu/lglg for a full schedule. Tuesday also includes the President's Earth Week Picnic from 4 to 7 p.m. in the lower quad near Chesapeake Dining Hall, a fun get-together featuring environmentally friendly dining options. FSU will also be offering tours of FSU's Arboretum and a native plant sale from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Tours are

scheduled every half hour and proceeds of the plant sale will benefit the Savage River Watershed Association. Meet at the gazebo near FSU's stadium lot to participate.

Wednesday, April 22, is "A Day of Action" featuring a presentation by ethnobotanist Jim Duke and activities highlighting ways people can get involved in the Earth's future. Duke will present "A Tale of Four Gardens," a discussion focusing on Maryland, Amazonian and Biblical ethnobotany, from noon to 1 p.m. in Lane 201. Interested parties can also participate in the following four activities:
