FSU to Participate in Second Annual National 'Enough Is Enough' Campaign to End Campus Violence

FSU will participate in "Enough Is Enough," the national campaign to end campus violence, the week of Monday, April 2, through Friday, April 6. Each day will have a different theme, and events, workshops and information will be offered throughout.

Monday is kickoff day, starting with the annual rally and Harmony Walk, beginning at 6:30 p.m. by the Martin Luther King waterfall in the Lane Center lower lobby. FSU alumna Theresa Harrison, president of George Street Services Inc., and C. Natasha Richburg, entrepreneur, preacher, teacher, author and speaker, will lead an interactive session on "Using Conflict as a Tool for Growth: Being Right and Doing Right Are Not the Same" at 7 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall.

Tuesday is Take the Pledge Day, in which members of the campus community can sign a pledge to take a stand against violence. The first of a series of brown bag lunches will be held from noon to 1 p.m. in Lane 111, beginning with an interactive presentation by the FSU No More Violence in My Life team, in which participants will discuss their own experiences with violence. BTGLASS will hold a screening of their "It Gets Better" video at 7 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). This video features footage from the spring 2011 semester in which members interviewed students, faculty and staff about their experiences with bullying and violence.

Wednesday, the anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., will kick off with the annual

Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration, honoring of the life of the Civil Rights leader, at 4 p.m. in the Atkinson Room. Student participants will share reflections on King's work with the civil rights movement. The second workshop in the Campus and Community Dialogues series will also take place Wednesday. (See following article.)

Thursday will be Take Action Day. It will feature the second brown bag lunch series, "Closing the Gap: Creating a More Peaceful Frostburg," by members of the CMST 345 Conflict Management class, in the Lane Atkinson Room from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. The presentation will offer insights on how to close the gap between long- and short-term Frostburg residents. That evening, "Welcome to the Party," an interactive program by the President's Advisory Council on Gender-Based Violence, will focus on sexual assault and alcohol abuse. It will be held in the Atkinson Room from 7 to 8 p.m.

Friday, for Beats for Peace Day, members of the FSU National Coalition-Building Institute team will present a workshop titled "FSU Building Community Through Diversity" from noon to 4 p.m. in Lane 111. Everyone is welcome, but seating is limited to 50 participants. Participation in a workshop may allow for training to become a diversity facilitator.

"Sustaining Campus and Community" Dialogue Series

As part of the "Sustaining Campus and Community" Dialogue Series, FSU will host the next dialogue session on **Wednesday, April 4**, from 6 to 8 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall. The workshop will be preceded by a reception at 5 p.m.

Taking place during Enough Is
Enough week, this dialogue will
emphasize violence prevention and
community conflict management. The
focus of this dialogue will be on
understanding perceptions and
tensions within the student
community, as well as between the
year-round Frostburg residents and the
student community. A greater
understanding of what resources are
available or needed for student and
community conflict management will
be the goal.

Two top scholar-practitioners in conflict resolution will offer their expertise: Dr. Frank Dukes, lecturer and director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, and Dr. Marvin Johnson, founder and executive director of the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution.

All members of the campus and surrounding community are encouraged to attend.

FSU Honored Again for Community Service



The Corporation for National and Community Service has honored FSU as a leader among institutions of higher education for their support of volunteering, service-learning and civic engagement.

FSU was admitted to the 2012 President's Higher Education

Community Service Honor Roll for engaging its students, faculty and staff in meaningful service that achieves measurable results in the community. FSU students' service, in particular, covers a wide range of volunteer activities, including tutoring children, helping with tax returns, cleaning streets and shoveling snow, raising money for numerous charities, helping rebuild New Orleans, performing environmental projects and, particularly, serving areas of need in the Western Maryland region.

FSU students collectively average more than 30,000 hours of service each year, through programs such as ECHOSTARS (Empowering Communities, Helping Others), a first-year, livinglearning-serving experience for students committed to making a change in the community. Other programs include the VOICE (Volunteer Opportunities in the Community Environment) Clearinghouse program, which connects students, faculty and staff with volunteer opportunities in Western Maryland, and Relay for Life, FSU's best-attended annual event that raised \$52,470 to support the American Cancer Society in 2011.

The President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll recognizes higher education institutions that reflect the values of exemplary community service and achieve meaningful outcomes in their communities. Inspired by the thousands of college students who traveled across the country to support relief efforts along the Gulf Coast after Hurricane Katrina, the initiative celebrates the transformative power and volunteer spirit that exists within the higher education community.

The Corporation for National and Community Service, which has administered the Honor Roll since 2006, admitted over 642 colleges and universities for their impact on issues from literacy and neighborhood revitalization to supporting at-risk youth. Of that total, 513 were named to the Honor Roll, 110 received the recognition of Honor Roll with distinction, 14 were identified as finalists and five received the Presidential Award.

FSU was a member of last year's Honor Roll, as well as in 2008, and in 2000, was awarded the first-ever Higher Education Award for Leadership in National Service by the CNCS.

A forum titled "To Occupy or Not to Occupy? Leadership in the Labor Movement" will be held on Monday at 6 p.m. in Compton 226. An "Occupy Compton" reception featuring networking with guests will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the second floor atrium of Compton.

A luncheon for faculty and staff will also be held, featuring discussion about "Teaching Students to be Citizen Leaders" and how the University offers experiential learning and leadership development activities.
