#### **Princeton Review Lists FSU Among 'Greenest Colleges'**

FSU is one of the 322 most environmentally responsible colleges in the U.S. and Canada, according to The Princeton Review. The education services company known for its college rankings, ratings, guidebooks and test prep, profiles FSU in the fourth annual edition of its free, downloadable book, "The Princeton Review's Guide to 322 Green Colleges."

The Princeton Review chose the schools for this guide based on a 50-question survey it conducted in 2012 of administrators at hundreds of four-year colleges, analyzing the schools' course offerings, campus infrastructure, activities and career preparation to measure commitment to the environment and sustainability.

In the guide's profile on FSU, The Princeton Review highlights
Frostburg's commitment to green education and lifestyle, highlighting the Learning Green, Living Green initiative that addresses multiple sustainability aspects, a wide variety of academic opportunities for greenminded students, its off-grid Sustainable Energy Research Facility for the study of renewable energy technologies, student involvement in environmentally focused organizations and institutional policies designed to reduce energy consumption and waste.



"I am so proud of students, faculty and staff for ensuring, through their numerous efforts, that Frostburg State University maintain a strong commitment to sustainability and addressing climate change, which has led to us being highlighted in 'The Princeton Review's Guide to 322 Green Colleges," said FSU President Jonathan Gibralter. "This has included everything from securing LEED Gold certification on our beautifully renovated student union center to organizing a variety of great educational events for our campus that allow our community to critically examine environmental issues. I know this tremendous momentum in making sustainability a part of our institutional identity will only grow in the years ahead."

FSU, which was first listed among Princeton Review's Green Colleges in 2010, received an 87 rating out of a possible 99.

FSU and Gibralter have been widely recognized for commitment to sustainability. Gibralter is a charter signatory to the American College & University Presidents Climate Commitment and has been a member of its steering committee since 2010. FSU was recently designated a Tree Campus USA, a national program of the Arbor Day Foundation and Toyota Motor North America, Inc., for meeting five core standards for sustainable campus forestry. The University was listed in the 2012 edition of Sierra magazine's ranking of the nation's "Coolest Schools," which salutes U.S. colleges that are helping solve climate problems and making significant efforts to operate sustainably. In 2011, FSU was recognized for its commitment to sustainability and environmental education with a Second Nature's Second Annual Climate Leadership Award for Institutional Excellence in Climate Leadership.

Published just before the April 22 celebration of Earth Day, the 215-page guide is the only free, comprehensive resource of its kind. Gary Mauer, Craig Schulman and Ciarán Sheehan, three Broadway stars who have performed the coveted title role in Andrew Lloyd Webber's "The Phantom of the Opera," will present solos, duets and trios from the male repertoire of American musical theatre. In addition to songs from "Phantom," they will share selections from such Broadway hits as "Les Misérables," "Guys and Dolls, "Man of La Mancha," "Jesus Christ Superstar," "West Side Story" and "Kiss Me Kate."

#### **Percussion Ensemble**

The FSU Percussion Ensemble will present its spring concert on **Thursday, April 25**, at 8 p.m.

The concert will begin with a classic of the percussion ensemble repertoire, the "Overture for Percussion Ensemble" by John Beck, followed by "Alegre Muchacho" by percussionist and noted humorist Alan Abel. The first half of the program will conclude with Christopher Rouse's tribute to the drumming rituals of the Caribbean, "Oqoun Badagris."

Also included is a selection by Ney Rosauro, the world-renowned Brazilian composer and percussionist. His "Mitos Basileiros" ("Brazilian Myths") explores five legends of the country's folklore through the timbres and rhythms of the percussion family – with additional sound effect surprises. The program will conclude with a transcription of a Bela Fleck favorite, "Sinister Minister."

#### 'Carmina Burana'

FSU's Department of Music will present "Carmina Burana" by Carl Orff on **Sunday, April 28**, at 3 p.m.

"Carmina Burana" is one of the most popular works of the 20th century. The texts ("Songs From Beuern") are taken from a 13th-century manuscript found in the early 19th century in a secularized monastery at Benedictbeuern near Munich. The work is in three parts: "Spring," "In the Tavern" and "Love." In 1956, Orff arranged the scenic cantata for two pianos and percussion. This was intended to make the music more widely available to schools and choral

groups where large orchestras were not available.

This collaborative concert features the FSU University Chorale, directed by Dr. Karen Soderberg; the Cumberland Choral Society, directed by Judith Brown; the FSU Children's Choir, directed by Olivia Hartman; the FSU Percussion Ensemble, directed by Dr. Ron Horner; and duo-pianists Dr. Jay DeWire and Thomas Hunter. The soloists include baritone Eugene Galvin, an FSU alumnus and professor of voice at George Washington University and Catholic University; soprano Mariana Mihai-Zoeter, a professor of voice at FSU; and tenor Peter Drackley, a student at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.

# 'Thin Ice,' the Story of Climate Science

FSU will celebrate Earth Day by presenting a screening of the film "Thin Ice" on **Monday, April 22**, at 4:30 p.m. in Compton 226. This event is free and open to the public.

In recent years, climate science has come under increasing attack, so geologist Simon Lamb took his camera to find out what is really going on from his climate science colleagues.

The aim from the outset was to give people from all walks of the life the chance to see the astonishing range of human activity as well as scientific endeavor required to help understand Earth's changing climate. Lamb visited researchers on four continents and the ocean as they studied the changes in the atmosphere, oceans and ice sheets through measurements (from instruments, satellites, ice and rock) and computer modeling. They talk about their work, and their hopes and fears with a rare candor and directness. Lamb notes that we have to think in terms of human time scales (hundreds of years), as well as Ice Age time scales (tens of thousands of years) and even beyond (before 2 to 3 million years ago) when Earth was naturally warmer.

The 73-minute film will be followed by a commentary and brief question-and-answer session.

#### 'Contesting the Arctic'

The Department of Geography will present Dr. Jeremy Tasch on Tuesday, April 23, at 7 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). He will discuss the results of his research in "Contesting the Arctic: Politics and Imaginaries in the Circumpolar North."

Tasch is Towson University's first interdisciplinary hire in Eurasian and global studies. He came to Towson from his previous position as an assistant professor at the University of Alaska, Anchorage, where he helped create the university's first geography and environmental studies department and first undergraduate degree program in international studies. Tasch is a principal investigator on a fivecountry, NSF-funded study of the geopolitics of climate change in the Arctic. A recipient of two Fulbright awards to the Russian Far East and the Kyrgyz Republic, he spent almost five years as country director of an international educational nongovernmental organization in Azerbaijan, where he helped create the first multi-institutional educational center and library funded by the U.S. Department of State.

After the presentation, student inductees in Gamma Theta Upsilon, the International Geography Honor Society, and other accomplished geography students will be recognized.

#### **FSU's Upward Bound Program Now Accepting Applications**

The Upward Bound Program of FSU is accepting applications. This precollege program is designed to assist 89 qualified Allegany County students in developing the skills and motivation necessary for success in high school and college. The program serves rising ninth graders through graduating high school seniors, is funded entirely by the U.S. Department of Education and is free to participants.

Upward Bound offers academic support and enrichment in an environment that helps foster personal growth and development. To accomplish this, Upward Bound is structured as a year-round program that offers an academic year component and a three- or six-week

summer residential program. The program's goal is to help students overcome the financial, social, academic and cultural barriers to higher education that can exist for the individual student. Students also have the unique opportunity to meet and work with students from other Allegany County high schools.

Applications are accepted from students in grades 8 through 11. High school seniors are not eligible to apply. Once accepted, Upward Bound students may participate until graduation from high school. Students can expect to receive assistance in many areas, including academic advising, tutoring, career exploration, enrichment classes, assistance with filling out forms, scholarship information, SAT and ACT prep, college visits and field trips.

To be accepted for Upward Bound, students must have the potential for post-secondary education and meet one or both of the following criteria: have a first-generation college status, meaning that the parent(s) the student lives with does not have a bachelor's degree from a four-year college, and/or come from a family with a modest income. This varies according to household size and is based on taxable, not gross, income.
