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Frostburg State University, President Gibraltar Honored in Annapolis

The Maryland General Assembly recognized FSU on Wednesday, Feb. 13, for its many contributions to Western Maryland, the state of Maryland, and for being named a national College of Distinction for 2012-13.

President Jonathan Gibraltar was received on the floors of both the House and Senate, where proclamations were read commending FSU for its commitment to academic excellence. Gibraltar was accompanied to the State House by a delegation of FSU students, who were also welcomed from the floor. The proclamations were sponsored by members of the local delegation, Sen. George Edwards (R-1st), Del. Wendell Beitzel (R-1A), Del. Kevin Kelly (D-1B) and Del. LeRoy Myers Jr. (R-1C).

The FSU delegation was greeted by Senate President Thomas V. Mike Miller Jr. (D-27), who said of FSU and Gibraltar, "It's a great college. It was a fine college and you've made it a just a wonderful college. We're very honored to have you here."

Edwards introduced Gibraltar and the students accompanying him to the Senate assembly, saying, "Dr. Gibraltar has done a tremendous job since he's been there. The University is moving forward and flourishing," Edwards said.

In the House, Gibraltar was welcomed to the General Assembly by

Speaker of the House Michael Busch (D-30). Beitzel introduced Gibraltar to his colleagues, saying the FSU president was being recognized "for his outstanding leadership of this outstanding Maryland institution of higher education."

Colleges of Distinction are higher education institutions that excel in four key areas: student engagement, quality of teaching, vibrancy of the college community and success of graduates. FSU was selected for the strength of its first-year experience, including learning communities and themed residence halls, the quality of faculty, its students' dedication to community service and sustainability and the clear direction presented in the University's strategic plan.

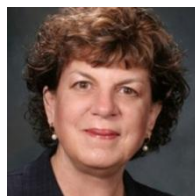

Leadership Competency Model

FSU will host leadership expert **Dr. Ronald Riggio** on **March 7 and 8**

for a series of events, and his visit will mark the launch of a leadership competency model that will highlight the University's efforts to educate and develop leadership internally. Developed with his assistance by a Leadership Task Force appointed by **President Gibraltar**, the model, which captures the key indicators of how leadership is taught and developed, will help FSU as an organization to promote leadership education and development.

On **Thursday, March 7**, at 11 a.m. in Lane 111, FSU faculty, staff and students are invited to join Riggio and the task force to officially launch the competency model and discuss the next steps in its implementation. In addition, Riggio will discuss transformative leadership and leadership ethics with students in leadership courses and will be featured in a public session titled "Talking Leadership" at 7 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). The session is open to student leaders to help them develop leadership within their campus organizations and classroom experiences as well as in life. Additionally, he will speak at the Sloop Institute for Excellence in Leadership, a leadership retreat featuring FSU alumni for competitively selected student leaders.

Riggio will serve as the scholar in residence for one of the largest interdisciplinary minors at FSU, the Leadership Studies minor.

Riggio is the Henry R. Kravis Professor of Leadership and Organizational Psychology and former director of the Kravis Leadership Institute at Claremont McKenna College. He is the author of over 100 books, book chapters and research articles on leadership, assessment centers, organizational psychology and social psychology.

'Bach at Leipzig'

FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance will perform the stage comedy "Bach at Leipzig" on **Friday and Saturday, March 1 and 2**, and **Thursday through Saturday, March 7 through 9**, at 7:30 p.m., with a 2 p.m. showing on **March 2**. Performances will be in the Smith Studio Theatre. Individual tickets are \$12 for general admission and \$6 for students.

Written by Itamar Moses and directed by **Darrell Rushton**, a member of the Department of Theatre and Dance faculty, the play takes place in Leipzig, Germany, in June 1722. The musical director of St. Thomas Church and master of St. Thomas School dies, and six of the best organists in Germany compete for his vacant post. The title guarantees fame and fortune throughout all of Europe, and the ambitious men resort to blackmail, betrayal and other crimes to secure their future.

"Bach at Leipzig" strikes chords with dexterous wordplay and sophisticated comedic wit and delivers a collision of ideologies about art, God and humanity, which resolves in a brilliantly crafted ending.

M.Ed. Program Earns National Recognition

FSU’s Master of Education (M.Ed.) program in Administration and Supervision has received national recognition from the Educational Leadership Constituents Council (ELCC) for FSU’s reaccreditation by the

National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE).

FSU's submission to ELCC fully met each of the 27 elements contained in the seven standards, according to **Dr. William Childs**, associate dean of the College of Education. Childs, who was previously the Administration and Supervision program coordinator, submitted the report in August 2012. The new program coordinator is **Dr. John Stoothoff**, who leads FSU's education programs at the University System of Maryland at Hagerstown.

NCATE accreditation is mandated by the state of Maryland. All teacher preparation programs at FSU are accredited.

FSU's M.Ed. in Administration and Supervision degree is offered in Frostburg and Hagerstown. The program is one of 13 FSU programs being evaluated for NCATE reaccreditation.

During the current academic year, the accreditation process will evaluate each program based on the national standards set by specialty professional area organizations. FSU's overall NCATE accreditation is due for review in 2015, and will incorporate each of the individual program reviews submitted this year.
