President Gibraltar Named Co-Chair of NIAAA College Presidents Working Group to Address Harmful Student Drinking

President Jonathan Gibraltar, who has emerged in recent years as a national leader in efforts to reduce the culture of high-risk drinking among college students, is continuing in that role in a new position as co-chair of the College Presidents Working Group to Address Harmful Student Drinking, a program of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA). NIAAA is one of the 27 Institutes and Centers of the National Institutes of Health and the lead federal agency for research on alcohol, including college drinking.

Gibraltar was invited to join the group when it was formed in 2011. He was selected as co-chair following the resignation of former Dartmouth College President Jim Yong Kim when Kim was named president of the World Bank. Gibraltar's co-chair is Dr. Robert Carothers, president emeritus of the University of Rhode Island.

"It is important that college and university presidents take a leadership role in describing the impact of high-risk drinking, just as we have a role to play in speaking out on any topic that affects the well-being of our students," Gibraltar said. "I'm proud that this appointment highlights the success that FSU has achieved through our broad-based and research-supported efforts."

FSU has seen a significant decline in high-risk – sometimes called "binge" – drinking in recent years. Based on the national Core Drug and Alcohol Survey, administered to FSU students every three years since 1997, the percentage of students who reported binge-drinking (five or more drinks at a sitting) within the previous two weeks fell from 59 percent in 1997 to 41 percent in 2012, below the national average of 43.1 percent. Similar decreases were reported among those students who reported drinking anything at all for the previous 30 days. Perhaps most telling, the average number of drinks students reported consuming per week dropped from 9.5 in 1997 to 3.9 in 2012; the majority of that decrease has occurred since 2006, which is the year Gibraltar assumed FSU's presidency.

Gibraltar and FSU have been recognized nationally for this leadership. In 2008, Gibraltar was given the first-ever Presidential Leadership Award from a group of seven major higher education organizations for his success in promoting a vibrant intellectual and social campus climate that de-emphasizes the role of alcohol. In 2011, FSU was invited to join the Learning Collaborative on High-Risk Drinking, housed at Dartmouth, a group predominantly populated by

flagship state universities or Ivy League schools.

Gibraltar has spoken at numerous conferences and presented workshops about FSU's efforts and the importance of presidential leadership in fighting alcohol abuse. He was a featured contributor on the topic in the spring 2012 issue of "The Presidency," the American Council on Education's magazine.

The NIAAA College Presidents Working Group to Address Harmful Student Drinking was formed to help bridge the gap between research that continues to identify promising interventions and the development of real-world campus programs to address alcohol-related problems. The 10 presidents in the invitation-only group advise NIAAA on the types of information they need and the ways they want to receive it.

One practical remedy under development by the NIAAA is an idea promoted by the presidents group: an interactive, user-friendly, online "decision support system" to help colleges and universities select appropriate strategies to meet their alcohol intervention goals. The ultimate goal is to share science-based information in accessible and practical ways to provide college administrators with a planning foundation.

FSU Honored as a Tree Campus USA

FSU has been honored as a Tree Campus USA, a national program of the Arbor Day Foundation and Toyota Motor North America Inc., which honors colleges and universities and their leaders for promoting healthy trees and engaging students and staff in the spirit of conservation.

To obtain this distinction, FSU met five core standards for sustainable campus forestry required by Tree Campus USA, including establishing a tree advisory committee, evidence of a

campus tree-care plan, dedicated annual expenditures for its campus tree program, an Arbor Day observance and the sponsorship of student service-learning projects.

"We are honored by the Tree Campus USA recognition," said President Gibraltar. "Providing hands-on learning opportunities for our campus community to support environmental stewardship by beautifying our campus with native trees is a huge part of how we're working to make sustainability a part of our institutional culture. I know our students, faculty, staff and community members and partners will continue making great strides in supporting sustainability at Frostburg."

FSU is the only campus in Maryland that has adopted a standard of planting native trees and shrubs, according to **Dr. Sunshine Brosi**, an assistant professor in the FSU

Department of Biology and chair of the Campus Tree Advisory Committee.

Other members of the Campus Tree Advisory Committee include **Greg Partsch** from the Facilities Department, Safety and Sustainability Coordinator **Lawrence Gingerich**, Assistant Professor of Biology **David Puthoff**, Becky Wilson from the Maryland Department of Resources and community member Liz McDowell.

FSU students **Laura G. Smith**, an undergraduate ethnobotany major, and **Mitch Hall**, an ethnobotany graduate and student in the Applied Ecology and Conservation Biology master's program, played a large part in achieving the recognition. Smith, of LaVale, worked on completing the application, and Hall, of Accident, assisted in developing the tree care plan. Both are also members of the Campus Tree Advisory Committee.

Dr. Joseph Hoffman, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Science,

praised Brosi's role in bringing this Tree Campus USA designation to FSU. "Dr. Brosi's tireless and effective leadership was instrumental in FSU receiving this honor and distinction as a Tree Campus USA," Hoffman said. "This award is still another example of FSU's institutional dedication to improving our regional environment."

Murchison plays piccolo with the West Virginia, Akron and Ohio Valley Symphony Orchestras. She is also active as a chamber musician, performing with Matt Murchison Mutiny and other chamber groups throughout Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Maryland. She was a founding member of Mainspring, a chamber group devoted to a fusion of classical and world music. Murchison holds degrees from Duquesne and Youngstown State Universities, and is completing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at West Virginia University.

Gallagher is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where he received a B.M. degree and studied with Lawrence McDonald. He also holds an M.M. degree from the Eastman School of Music, having studied with D. Stanley Hasty, and a D.M.A. degree from the University of Wisconsin-

His recent concerts include solo recitals in Guildenhorn Recital Hall at the University of Maryland; performances of the West Shore Trio in the D.C. area, including Oaklands Presbyterian church; and a collaborative performance in Auer Hall of Indiana University with John Tafoya. DeWire has recorded three live performance solo CDs and has also received numerous prizes, including the Brander Wyatt Morrison Prize. He received a B.A. with High Distinction and a Master of Arts in piano performance from the University of Virginia, a Master of Music from the New England Conservatory and a D.M.A. from the University of Maryland School of Music (College Park).

region and its people, begin at 7 p.m. on Mondays in February and March. All are free and open to the public.

The film series is a major component of the One Vision Many Voices project of The Appalachian Independent. OVMV uses the arts and humanities to spark dialogue about the community and its vision for a healthier, more sustainable future.

The film series opens **Feb. 11** with "Green Fire, Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic for Our Time" in ACM's Zimmer Theatre. This feature-length documentary about the legendary environmentalist highlights an extraordinary career that shaped and influenced the modern environmental movement.

A panel discussion will follow the film screening, and representatives of local organizations who are working with these issues will be present for discussion with interested individuals.

The post-film discussions at ACM will be facilitated by students and members of the college's Democracy Commitment initiative, while those at FSU will be led by students in the University's Sociology of the Environment course.

The other three films are:

- "Home" – Filmmaker Yann Arthus-Bertrand uses aerial-only footage to provide an awe-inspiring view of the planet and a concern for its health. His tour of over 50 countries provides a unique perspective and insight into the effects that humans have had on Earth. (**Feb. 25** in ACM's Zimmer Theatre)
- "Dirt! The Movie" – This timely film takes a humorous but substantial look into the history and current state of the underappreciated living organic matter under our feet. The film was inspired by author William Bryant Logan's acclaimed book "Dirt: The Ecstatic Skin of the Earth." (**March 4** in Compton 226)
- "Getting to the Point: Five Issues, Five Films" – Food, water, energy, the economy and the environment are examined in five short but eye-opening films that explore some of the biggest concerns of our times. (**March 11** in Compton 226).

FSU Presents Int'l Film Festival

FSU will host the Fourth Annual Bridges to the World International Film Festival featuring films from Uruguay, Israel, Taiwan, Australia and the Czech Republic, in conjunction with the Office of Student Activities and Greek Life, International Division of Maryland's Office of the Secretary of State and World Artists Experience.

"Journey to the Sea" (Uruguay), the first film, will be screened on **Tuesday, Feb. 12**, at 7 p.m. in Lane 111. The film is free and open to the public and will be shown with English subtitles.

"Journey to the Sea" ("El viaje hacia el mar") is a warm and sunny film about friendship and adventure, based on a short story by Juan José Morosoli, an important literary figure in Uruguay. On a Sunday morning in 1963, six men (and a dog) travel from the small, interior town of Minas to the Atlantic Ocean. Driving through Uruguay, the men talk, drink, sing and share their lives and philosophies. "El viaje hacia el mar" is one of Uruguay's best films, with a unique tone and flavor that captures personality of the country. The film runs 80 minutes.

V-Day Presents a Benefit Production of "Vagina Monologues"



V-Day@FSU will present benefit performances of Eve Ensler's award-winning play, "The Vagina Monologues," at FSU on **Feb. 22 and 23** at 7:30 p.m. in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. This year's student director is **Shelby Herbert**.

Doors open at 6:30 p.m. for the Information Festival, which features the Clothesline Project, campus and community groups who provide assistance, and V-Day merchandise. The Clothesline Project was designed to essentially "air out society's dirty laundry." Both women and men are invited to create their own T-shirts to be put on display as a visual representation of real stories of violence against women. Alongside the Clothesline Project is the scarf sale, otherwise known as the Scarf Project.

Tickets will be available **starting Feb. 4** and are \$12 for the general public and \$6 for students and may be purchased by phoning x7462 Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 to 4 p.m. For the 12th year in a row, V-Day@FSU will donate the proceeds from ticket and merchandise sales. The Dove Center and the Family Crisis Resource Center will benefit, as well as this year's V-Day Spotlight, One Billion Rising, a campaign that has issued a call to one billion women and men to walk out, dance, rise up and demand an end to violence against women on **Feb. 14, 2013**, V-Day's 15th anniversary.

Hailed by The New York Times as "funny" and "poignant" and by the Daily News as "intelligent" and "courageous," "The Vagina Monologues," which was first performed off-Broadway by Ensler, dives into the mystery, humor, pain, power, wisdom, outrage and excitement buried in women's experiences. Ensler has performed the play to great acclaim all around the world. Villard Books/Random House first published "The Vagina Monologues," which includes a foreword by Gloria Steinem, in February 1998. A special edition was released in hard cover and paperback in February 2008 in honor of V-Day's 10-year anniversary.

V-Day is a global activist movement to end violence against women and girls, and is a catalyst that promotes creative events to increase awareness, raise money and revitalize the spirit of existing anti-violence organizations. V-Day generates broader attention for the fight to stop violence against women and girls, including rape, battery, incest, female genital mutilation and sex slavery. This movement strives to empower women to find their collective voices and demand an end to the violence that affects one in three women in the U.S. and around the world.

The V-Day movement is growing at a rapid pace throughout the world in 140 countries from Europe to Asia, Africa and the Caribbean and all of North America. In 2001, V-Day was named one of Worth Magazine's "100 Best Charities," in 2006 one of Marie Claire Magazine's Top Ten Charities and in 2010 was named as one of the top-rated organizations on GreatNonprofits. In 11 years, the V-Day movement has raised over \$85 million.
