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FSU Featured in 'The Princeton Review's Guide to 332 Green Colleges'

FSU has been designated one of the 332 most environmentally responsible colleges in the United States and Canada, according to The Princeton Review. The education services company profiled FSU in the fifth annual edition of its free downloadable book, "The Princeton Review's Guide to 332 Green Colleges." This is the third time, and the second year in a row, that FSU has been featured in the guide.

The Princeton Review chose the schools for this guide based on a survey it conducted in 2013 of administrators at hundreds of four-year colleges to measure the schools' commitment to the environment and sustainability. The institutional survey included questions on the schools' course offerings, campus infrastructure, activities and career preparation.

"I'm so proud of our Bobcats and everything we're working on together to ensure that our University is upholding its commitment to sustainability," said President Jonathan Gibralter. "Whether it is participating in RecycleMania, deciding our new buildings must be LEED certified or organizing educational events that help our campus community discuss environmental issues, we are making strides to support sustainability every step of the way."

Published April 17, a few days before the April 22 celebration of Earth Day, the 216-page guide can be downloaded at www.princetonreview.com/green-guide and www.centerforgreenschools.org/greenguide.

The Princeton Review created its "Guide to 332 Green Colleges" in partnership with the Center for Green Schools (www.usgbc.org) at the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC).

In the guide's profile on Frostburg, The Princeton Review highlights FSU's completely off-grid Sustainable Energy Research Facility, its annual day of learning on environmental sustainability and climate awareness known as Focus Frostburg, its new Frostburg Grows partnership and FSU's achievement of purchasing at least 15 percent of its electricity consumption from renewable resources, among other accomplishments.

"We are pleased to recommend Frostburg to the many students seeking colleges that practice and promote environmentally responsible choices and practices," said Rob Franek, senior vice president and publisher of The Princeton Review.

Franek noted his company's recent survey findings indicating significant interest among college applicants in attending "green" colleges. "Among 10,116 college applicants who participated in our 2014 'College Hopes & Worries Survey,' 61 percent said having information about a school's commitment to the environment would influence their decision to apply to or attend the school," he said.

The Princeton Review chose the schools based on a survey conducted in 2013 that asked administrators at hundreds of colleges across the United States and Canada about their institution's sustainability-related policies, practices and programs. Using survey data that covered more than 25 fields, The Princeton Review tallied its "Green Ratings" (scores from 60 to 99) for 832 schools and reported them in the school profiles on the company's website and in its college guides in summer 2013. Divisional Realignment, Freshman Advising System

As an important step in creating a sustainable and well-integrated retention, academic advisement and student success model for FSU, the University will implement a focused freshman advising system this fall under the Division of Academic Affairs and FSU's provost, **Dr. William Childs**. This move comes in concert with the previously announced change of Enrollment Management (Admissions and Financial Aid) returning to the supervision of Academic Affairs, as well as the concurrent move of the Registrar's Office to Academic Affairs.

The realignment is supported by findings from FSU's in-house Student Success and Retention Ad Hoc Committee and by Noel-Levitz consultants, who are assisting with the University's recruitment practices and advising FSU on its efforts to improve student success and retention. This move is also more in line with cutting-edge organizational practice at many regional comprehensive universities, including those within the University System of Maryland.

The following offices and personnel will be transferred to Academic Affairs: PASS (including the Tutoring Center, Developmental Math and Academic Skills Development), Disability Support Services, Student Support Services and the Registrar's Office. The personnel in these groups will not change, but some titles will be revised to reflect the change in division. Specifically, the title for **Dr. Jay Hegeman**, who will direct these offices, will change from associate vice president to associate provost. The functions of the Advising Center, ORIE, Upward Bound and the Regional Math and Science Center will also be overseen by Hegeman.

Wray Blair, associate vice president for Enrollment Management, will become associate provost for Enrollment Management.

This realignment is the beginning of a coordinated, aggressive effort to improve FSU's retention and graduation rates. By making use of intensive advising and improvements to FSU's online early-warning capacities in Beacon, the University will address issues with first-year students' educational adjustment well before the mid-term warnings. Childs has stated, "It is our ethical responsibility, as well as our mandated duty, to become a partner in guiding our students to success."

These moves are tied directly to Goal 3 in the University's Strategic Plan – Increase student quality, institutional retention and graduation rates while encouraging baccalaureate students to graduate within a four-year time frame – but more importantly, they are tied directly to FSU's reason for being – to serve and educate its students.
