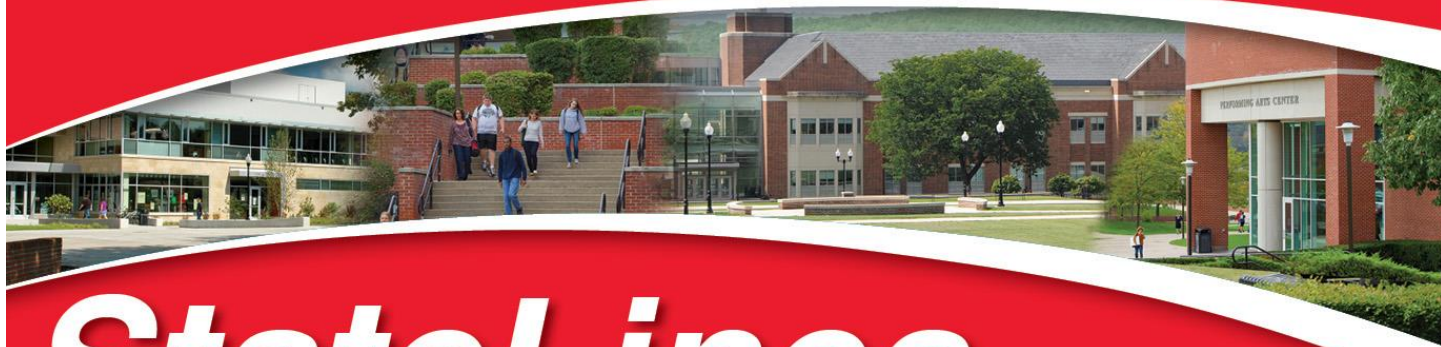

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BestMasterofScienceinNursing.com Ranks FSU One of Most Up-and-Coming Nursing Schools in East



BestMasterofScienceinNursing.com recently ranked FSU among the 10 most up-and-coming nursing schools in the East.

The ranking was created from a list of nursing schools in the eastern part of the country. The schools were then critiqued based on innovative teaching methods, cutting-edge technological resources, facilities and student organizations.

FSU, ranked 10th, is noted for its nursing content being delivered online with synchronous virtual classes and for its fairly new RN to BSN program. FSU received approval to begin RN to BSN classes in 2008 and received Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education accreditation in 2011. The RN to BSN program was developed for licensed registered nurses with a desire to complete a bachelor's degree. The nursing content is delivered online, so students never need to attend campus. The RN to BSN program was recognized and ranked fifth in the nation as a best buy in online nursing programs by GetEducated.com. FSU also offers students membership in the Sigma Theta Tau Nursing Honor Society. BestMasterofScienceinNursing.com calculated the cost of FSU's program at \$12,952.

Planetarium

FSU Planetarium Unveils Live Feed Capabilities, New Schedule



The FSU Planetarium and Multimedia Learning Center will offer new programs and feature expanded capabilities in 2016.

MLC is now able to broadcast live feeds of the sky from the observatory into the planetarium during shows, if conditions permit. The rooftop observatory at the Gira Center features a 14-inch Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope with an attachable camera to capture deep space images and planets.

Additionally, the planetarium will launch a new show schedule this year. Wednesday Sky Tours at 6 and 7 p.m. will be offered weekly in February, March, April, September, October and November when FSU is in session. They will feature a special topic that digs into a particular astronomical subject with an emphasis on the most recent, cutting-edge discoveries. The times for the Wednesday Sky Tours allow for the opportunity to view the sun or nighttime objects in a telescope, depending on the time of year.

Science Saturdays are on the second Saturday of the month from February through December. They feature a special topic presentation or a full-dome movie, depending on the month. The time of each Science Saturday will change to optimize the

potential for viewing the moon and the visible planets in a telescope. The next Science Saturday, “Hubble’s Greatest Hits,” will be **Feb. 13** at 5 p.m. Times for later events and other links can be found at www.frostburg.edu/mlc/planetarium/public-shows.

All shows are free and open to the public. The FSU Science Discover Center in the Compton Science Center will be open until 8 p.m. for tours during the Wednesday Sky Tours and on Science Saturdays will be open one hour before planetarium show times.

Private shows are available for schools and other groups on request. Shows for school groups are free. Those interested in a private show should call Dr. Jason Speights, director of the FSU Planetarium and MLC, at 301-687-7348. FSU’s 77-seat planetarium and MLC are on the first floor of the Gira Center.

FSU Saxophone Day With Guest Artist James Houlik



FSU’s Department of Music will present guest artist James Houlik in a Day of Saxophone on **Sunday, Feb. 14**. He will hold a master class at 3 p.m. as well as a recital at 7 p.m. He will be accompanied by pianist Vahan Sargsyan.

Houlik will perform “Miniature – Andante con passion” by Alojzy Thomys, “Serenade Toscane” and “Fleur Jetée” by Gabriel Fauré, “Ballad in Memory of Shirley Horn” by Richard Rodney Bennett, “Sonata” (“Allegretto ben moderato y Allegro”) by César Franck, “Songe de Coppélius” by Florent Schmitt, the Latin movements “Oblivion” by Astor Piazzolla and “Farewell Patagonia” by Geoff Eales, “How Sweet the Place” and “Spring Waters” by Sergei Rachmaninoff and “Excursion” by Mike Tomaro.

Houlik is a leading performer on his instrument. His pioneering efforts on behalf of the tenor saxophone have resulted in the composition of more than 85 new concert works for the instrument and important performances around the world. From the East Room of the White House, to solo appearances with orchestras in London, Prague, Istanbul, Berlin, Chicago, Phoenix and New York, to recitals in the music capitals of the world, Houlik has redefined the role of the tenor saxophone.

Armenian pianist Vahan Sargsyan has performed as a soloist with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and is regularly seen at the orchestra’s keyboards. He is the staff pianist and chamber music coach at Carnegie Mellon University.

Theatre and Dance at FSU will present a theatrical performance of Harper Lee’s Pulitzer Prize-winning novel “To Kill a Mockingbird” on **Friday, Feb. 26**, and **Saturday, Feb. 27**, and **Thursday, March 3, through Saturday, March 5**, at 7:30 p.m., with a matinee on **Feb. 27** at 2 p.m. All performances will take place in the in the PAC Drama Theatre.

Scout is a young girl in the summer of 1935 when her sleepy Alabama town erupts in a storm of intolerance, anger and fear. Tom Robinson – a poor black man – has been accused of attacking a white woman, and it is up to Scout’s father, Atticus Finch, to defend him against the charges.

Adapted for the stage by Christopher Sergel and directed by Jennifer Goff, “To Kill a Mockingbird” is a courtroom drama, a coming-of-age story and a reminder to us all that the hard and important work of human decency is never over.

‘The Dakota 38: Remembering the Civil War as an Indian War’



FSU's Department of History will host Dr. Ari Kelman, who will present “The Dakota 38: Remembering the Civil War as an Indian War,” on **Wednesday, Feb. 17**, at 7 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). This event is free and open to the public.

On December 26, 1862, federal authorities dispatched to the frontier outpost of Mankato, Minn., oversaw the largest public execution in U.S. history: the hanging of 38 members of the Dakota tribe. This explosion of violence on the borderlands was the pivotal event in what later became known as the Dakota War, a multiyear fight that left hundreds of soldiers, settlers and Native Americans dead and millions of dollars' worth of property in ruins. Kelman, a historian at Penn State University, will place the Dakota War in the context of the American Civil War, suggesting that these two conflicts, long understood as entirely separate, were actually inextricably intertwined – part of a broader struggle over the relationship between empire and liberty in the mid-19th century.

Kelman is the McCabe Greer Professor of History at Penn State University, where he teaches a wide range of history courses. He has written several books and received numerous awards and grants, most notably from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Huntington Library. He is working on a book tentatively titled “For Liberty and Empire: How the Civil War Bled Into the Indian Wars.”
