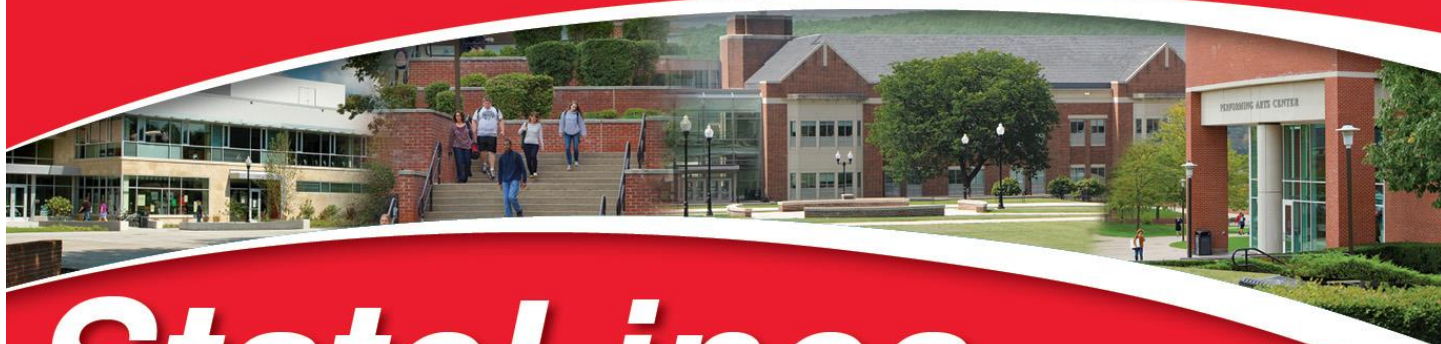

CES at FSU to Present Moscow Festival Ballet in ‘The Sleeping Beauty’



CES at FSU will offer two performances of the Moscow Festival Ballet in “The Sleeping Beauty” on **Wednesday, March 23**, and **Thursday, March 24**, at 7:30 p.m. in the FSU Performing Arts Center Drama Theatre.

Based on the classic French fairy tale by Charles Perrault and featuring Pytor Ilyich Tchaikovsky’s breathtaking score, “The Sleeping Beauty” is often considered to be the pinnacle of ballet classicism. Since its 1890 debut in Imperial Russia, ballet lovers have treasured the tale of the beautiful Princess Aurora, cursed by the wicked fairy Carabosse and awakened from 100 years of enchanted sleep by the power of true love.

The Moscow Festival Ballet was founded in 1989 by former Bolshoi Ballet star Sergei Radchenko. Under Radchenko’s artistic direction, these Russian artists travel the world bringing life to some of the most legendary works in the ballet repertory.

Tickets are \$40 for adults and \$34 for youth under 17. **Note: A recent mailing that area residents may have received contained an incorrect price.** Corporate and group discount rates are also available.

Mountain City Traditional Arts will host a reception and exhibit, titled “Meet Home Ground,” on **Wednesday, March 9**, at 7 p.m. at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The exhibit, produced by FSU students enrolled in Sociology of the Environment, features documentation and interviews conducted in the fall by Folklore in Appalachia students. The event is free and open to the public.

“Meet Home Ground” will provide area residents with the opportunity to learn more about the program offerings and experiences that Home Ground supports. Home Ground is an Allegany County-based organization committed to bringing people together to enjoy the outdoors and to appreciate the vital role of nature in peoples’ lives and communities. It also seeks to inspire citizens to support sustainable use and conservation of land and water resources.

Students involved in this project are participants in the Appalachian Teaching Project, which engages students and regional citizens in posing answers to the question, “How can we build a sustainable future for Appalachian communities?” The project teaches students and communities about the work of the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), its state and local partners, and the goals of ARC’s strategic plan.

The Appalachian Teaching Project is a collaboration between ARC and the Consortium of Appalachian Centers, composed of 15 colleges, universities and community colleges from the Appalachian region dedicated to working more closely together in service to the Appalachian region to improve the quality of life for its residents.

A powerhouse of Irish traditional music, The Truckley Howl, consisting of John Blake, Mairead Hurley and Nathan Gourley, will perform at Mountain City Traditional Arts at 25 E. Main St. in Frostburg on **Tuesday, March 8**, at 7 p.m. The program is open to the public; a \$15 donation is suggested.

Blake is a traditional Irish flute player, guitarist and pianist. A former member of the traditional group Teada, he has performed and recorded with Irish musicians John Carty, Paddy Glackin, Noel Hill, Liam O’Flynn, Jesse Smith, Harry Bradley, Colm Gannon, The Kane Sisters and James Kelly.

Hurley is from Ballymote, County Sligo, and won the All-Ireland Concertina Senior Championships at the Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann in 2006. She has been playing since she was four years old.

Gourley is one of America’s most highly regarded young players of traditional Irish music. He started playing music at age five. FSU to Celebrate Jazz with First Annual Jazz Festival

The Department of Music will host FSU’s First Annual Jazz Festival on Friday and Saturday, April 1 and 2. The Festival celebrates the spirit of jazz with performances by FSU jazz ensembles, local high school groups and special guest artist Darmon Meader, a Grammy Award-winning vocalist and saxophonist.

Friday events will highlight vocal jazz and include a concert by Meader and the FSU Vocal Jazz Ensemble at 7:30 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall. The performance will feature works by Meader, The Real Group and Duke Ellington.

On Saturday, instrumental jazz will take center stage with a concert featuring Meader and the FSU Jazz Orchestra at 7:30 p.m. in the Pealer Recital Hall. The concert will include works by Meader, Ellington, Eric Richards, Claudio Roditi and Irving Berlin.

Meader is a highly respected vocalist, arranger and saxophonist. He has achieved international recognition as the founder, musical director, chief arranger, composer, producer, saxophonist and vocalist of the group New York Voices. In addition to several projects with New York Voices, Meader has published his work as a solo album, “And So Am I,” which reflects his varied interests and skills through a collection of jazz standards and original works.

Admission to the FSU Ensemble concerts each night is \$10 for general admission and \$5 for students, with admission free for children 12 and under. Tickets are available at the door for cash only.

Both Friday and Saturday performances will be preceded by non-competitive invitational festivals for high school jazz ensembles, with vocal groups performing on Friday and instrumental groups on Saturday.

Spring Break Travelers Urged To Protect Themselves Against Zika Virus

Mosquitoes Spreading Virus in Many Central American, South American and Caribbean Countries

As college students and families pack for Spring Break vacations that might take them to popular destinations where the Zika virus is being spread by mosquito, the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene is reminding them to exercise caution.

“We certainly want college kids on Spring Break and other travelers to enjoy themselves,” said DHMH Secretary Van T. Mitchell. “We just want them to remember to pack with protecting themselves in mind. The confirmed Zika virus cases in Maryland so far have occurred during travel abroad.”

According to the CDC, Zika virus is chiefly spread through mosquito bites, though less frequently, transmission via sexual contact, blood transfusion and to newborns during pregnancy has been documented.

Because of the chance of a link between Zika and the microcephaly birth defect, characterized by smaller heads and underdeveloped brains in newborns, the CDC recommends that pregnant women or those trying to become pregnant consider postponing travel to areas where Zika virus is spreading.

Travelers also should be sure to guard against mosquito bites for the seven days after they return home, to prevent a mosquito from passing on any potential infection. The CDC says most infected people are non-symptomatic. Men who have traveled to an area with Zika and whose partner is pregnant should use condoms every time they have sex – or they should abstain from sex – during the pregnancy.

When traveling to countries where Zika virus or other viruses spread by mosquitoes are found, travelers are advised to take the following steps: wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants, stay in places with air conditioning or that use window and door screens to keep mosquitoes outside, sleep under a mosquito bed net if you are overseas or outside and are not able to protect yourself from mosquito bites, use EPA-registered insect repellents and treat clothing and gear with permethrin or purchase permethrin-treated items.

FSU’s Center for Literary Arts to Host Nightsun Writer’s Conference

FSU’s Center for Literary Arts will host its ninth annual Nightsun Writer’s Conference **from Thursday, July 28, to Sunday, July 31**, in downtown Frostburg.

The program provides participants with workshop opportunities, individualized attention, feedback and craft sessions. The conference is designed to generate new material for publication, hone the craft of creative writing and initiate a larger writing community. The event boasts fine food, friendship, seminars, memorable readings by faculty and participants and the unique opportunity to mingle with special guests as well as to share work at a reading at the end of the weekend.

This year’s conference will feature workshops with Nance Van Winckel for poetry; Ethelbert Miller for creative nonfiction; Andy Duncan for science fiction, fantasy and horror; and Patricia Henley for fiction.

Van Winckel teaches in the low-residency MFA in Writing Program at Vermont College of Fine Arts and has received numerous awards for her poetry, including two National Endowment for the Arts Poetry Fellowships, a Pushcart Prize and awards from the Poetry Society of America. She recently began creating “pho-toems,” which combine photographs with small poems and other graphic material.

Miller is a writer and literary activist, with works including several collections of poetry and two memoirs. He has been awarded fellowships from the Fulbright Senior Specialist Program, the Virginia Center for Creative Arts and the Gaea Foundation and has served in leadership roles with the Institute for Policy Studies, the Humanities Council of Washington, D.C., the D.C. Commission on the Arts and Humanities and the Ascension Poetry Reading Series. Two cities, Jackson, Tenn., and Washington, D.C., have proclaimed “E. Ethelbert Miller Days” in his honor.

Duncan has won three World Fantasy Awards, a Nebula Award and a Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award and has been a finalist 27 times for major awards in science fiction, fantasy and horror. His books include fiction collections “The Pottawatomie Giant and Other Stories” and “Beluthahatchie and Other Stories,” novellas “Wakulla Springs” and “The Night Cache” and a travel guide, “Alabama Curiosities,” in addition to numerous short stories published in periodicals and anthologies. He teaches creative writing, journalism and public relations at FSU.

Henley’s first book of stories, “Friday Night at Silver Star,” won the Montana First Book Award, and her first novel, “Hummingbird House,” was a finalist for the National Book Award. In addition to two poetry chapbooks, short story collections, novels and essays, she has authored a play, “If I Hold My Tongue,” which was produced at the Compass Rose Theater in Annapolis and given a staged reading at The Kennedy Center. Henley lives in Frostburg.

The cost of participation in the conference is \$350 plus accommodations and some meals. There is a \$50 discount for returning Nightsun participants. One-on-one faculty conferences will be available for an additional \$25. Discounts, scholarships and opportunities for Continuing Education credit are available.

Residence Hall Room Selection for 2016-2017

For students residing in the traditional residence halls:

If you plan to return for the 2016-2017 academic year, visit www.welcome-mat.net/frostburg_terms to submit a housing application.

You have until **Friday, March 25**, to go online and reclaim your room, with your same or with a different roommate.

If you want to apply for a single room or a cluster of rooms with friends, you should complete the application on Welcome Mat but not reclaim your same room, since this makes you ineligible for the single or cluster processes. To apply for a single room, you may come to the Residence Life Office any time after your course enrollment appointment to select from available spaces. You need not have registered for classes to select a single room, but you must have visited Welcome Mat and applied for a room.

If your enrollment appointment is scheduled after the lottery on **Wednesday, April 13**, you should attend the lottery and select a single at that time. If there are no singles available, you may select a room in a cluster with a group of friends instead and add your name to the singles waiting list.

Regardless of what room type you’d like, check your campus mailbox and refer to your pink-colored brochure for dates and information.

Remember, if you are selecting a particular roommate, you both must complete a housing application and indicate that you want each other as roommates.

Off-campus students wishing to move back on campus also must complete a housing application before coming to select a room.
