The FSU Department of Music will present the West Shore Piano Trio in a livestreamed Faculty-Guest Artist Series concert on **Sunday, Feb. 21**, at 3 p.m.

The West Shore Piano Trio, comprised of **Dr. Jay DeWire** on piano, Heather Haughn on the violin and Diana Flesner on the cello, will perform “Piano Trio in A Minor, Op. 150” by Amy Beach, “Piano Trio in E-flat Major, Op. 33” by Louise Farrenc and “Piano Trio” by Rebecca Clarke.

“Piano Trio in A Minor, Op. 150” was composed late in Beach’s career in 1938. Immersed in the developmental processes of late-19th-century models while quoting two Inuit folk songs, the piece incorporates lush romantic melodies over various textures, tones and impressionistic colors.

Farrenc, a French composer, virtuoso pianist and teacher, wrote much of her chamber music, considered her best work, during the 1840s. Her 1843 piece, "Piano Trio in E-flat Major, Op. 33," unifies the strings with the piano in a supportive, balanced setting of exuberant French elegance.

"Piano Trio" (1921) showcases Clarke's unique harmonic language, influenced by French and British styles of the early 20th century, as well as folk music. It begins with a dark, dissonant and alarming theme but ends with a bright, affirmative one, suggesting a reflection of WWI with its violent devastation and dual aftermath of sorrow and renewed hope.

DeWire, an assistant professor in FSU's Department of Music, teaches piano, pedagogy and music history.

Haughn enjoys a diverse career as an active chamber musician, orchestral player and teacher. She plays with the Annapolis Symphony Orchestra, Concert Artists of Baltimore, Delaware Symphony Orchestra, Lancaster Symphony Orchestra, Maryland Symphony Orchestra and the National Philharmonic. She is on the faculty of Goucher College and the Duke Ellington School of the Arts. Haughn has performed as soloist and concertmaster with the Berkeley Symphony Orchestra, the San Francisco Sinfonietta and the San Francisco Concerto Orchestra.

Active as a chamber musician, Flesner was a member of the Cervantes String Quartet for two years. She has participated in the Manchester Music Festival and the Quartet Program at Bucknell and has played in master classes or coached with members of the Pacifica, Miró, Miami, Kocian, Tokyo, Juilliard, Tákacs and Kronos quartets. Flesner served as principal cellist for the University of Illinois Symphony Orchestra and has played with BACH (Baroque Artists of Champaign-Urbana), the Prairie Ensemble, Opera Illinois, Champaign-Urbana Symphony, Peoria Symphony, Illinois Symphony, Annapolis Symphony Orchestra and Fairfax Symphony.

FSU's CES and the FSU Student Activities program will present "Reimagining Dinosaurs," a free streaming event from the National Geographic Live Virtual Speaker Series, on **Tuesday, Feb. 23**, at 7 p.m. Through stories and conversation, the live program brings viewers behind the scenes with two world-renowned paleontologists.

National Geographic Explorers Nizar Ibrahim and Sebastián Rozadilla reveal the groundbreaking new science that is changing previous theories about how dinosaurs

looked, moved and lived. Newfound troves from the Moroccan desert suggest that the immense predator Spinosaurus spent much of its time in the water. Meanwhile, in Chile, scientists have discovered a shocking new theropod that consumed a vegetarian diet, unlike its cousins, Velociraptor and T. rex.

Upcoming programs include "Feats of Filmmaking," on **Tuesday, March 16**; "Mysterious Seas" on **Tuesday, March 30**; and "Women and Migration" on **Tuesday, April 13**.

Roper Gallery to Host Exhibition by Rachel Underwood, 'Sleepwalking Toward Extinction'

FSU's Department of Visual Arts will present an exhibition by Rachel Underwood, titled "Sleepwalking Toward Extinction," which will open on **Friday, March 5**, at the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery in FSU's Fine Arts Building. This exhibition, which is free and open to the public, will be on display through **Friday, March 26**.

The existential and conceptual problems posed by the current geological age are those at the heart of humanistic inquiry: what does it mean to be human, to live during this time? Underwood's large-scale paintings explore moments of animalistic urges, death, adaptation and the consequences of human actions. She often uses a life-size scale so the viewer can directly relate to and be confronted by the painting. Humans tend to primarily see themselves as apart from nature, rather than a part of it. Underwood examines the similarities and differences between the human animal and nature and what those relationships mean for the future.

Underwood is a U.S. Navy veteran. Currently, she paints about the climate crisis and is illustrating a children's book about friendly dinosaurs. She earned her BFA from Towson University and her MFA at the University of South Florida. Underwood also plans to work toward a degree in environmental science.

Ort Library Hosting Four Exhibits for Black History Month

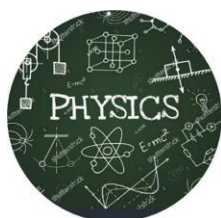


Images from "The Black Family," left, and "Barack Obama" on display at the Ort Library.

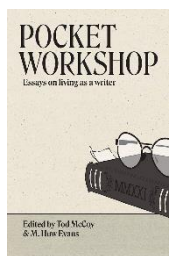

CLC COVID-19 Protocols for Spring 2021

The Children’s Literature Center (Frampton 206) will be open **Mondays through Thursdays** from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. CLC will be closed on **Fridays**.

To Identify Possible Books

When looking for a children’s book to fit your teaching plans/project, go to <http://clcd.com/#/advancedsearch> and type in a topic, title, author, etc. This database will identify a number of possibilities.

If on campus, no username and password are needed.

If off campus, the username is wbingman@frostburg.edu, and the password is lit (for literature).

From that list, you can identify specific books and then visit the CLC database at <https://clc.goalexandria.com> to see if those books are in the collection of 16,000+ books.

To Search the CLC Collection (From a Campus Location Only)

Browse the book collection at: <https://clc.goalexandria.com>.

To then reserve a book, fill out the Google Form at <https://bit.ly/3sXbalw>.

Allow 48 hours for the CLC team to collect and enter your books into the system. CLC will send you a confirmation email that your reserved books are ready for pickup.

To Pick Up Your Reserved Book(s)

Stand outside CLC and knock on the door. Do not walk into CLC. A staff member will ask your name and then direct you to the “Reserved Books” cart, inside the door, where you can pick up your labeled package of books.

Books can be checked out for two weeks. To return books to CLC, place them in the “Book Collection Box,” in front of the CLC windows. Books should be placed in the box no later than **Thursday** each week. Books are not to be brought back into CLC. CLC needs to quarantine the books for a specified time before they can be put back into circulation.

Students are encouraged to apply for an Allegany County Public Library card (<https://www.alleganycountylibrary.info>) in case CLC does not have the books you need. The Frostburg Community Library is located at 65 E. Main St.

NSE and HBCU Opportunities

February is African American History Month and a great time to learn about exchange offerings with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Many were founded as segregated teacher’s colleges (normal schools) for African Americans; others were later designated as land-grant universities. Most HBCUs with the National Student Exchange are among the 1890 Universities that gained land-grant status under the Morrill Act of 1890. There are 107 HBCUs in the U.S. and 63 are baccalaureate granting. NSE offers exchange with a dozen HBCUs. Health and Safety Messages

Be Careful Not to Slip and Fall!



Select proper footwear. Shoes or boots with rubber or neoprene composite soles provide better traction on ice and snow than leather or plastic.

Be alert to the possibility that you could quickly slip on an unseen patch of ice. Avoid the temptation to run. You can test your travel path by sliding your shoe or boot on it to see if it's slick.

Your arms help keep you balanced, so keep your hands out of your pockets and avoid carrying heavy loads that may cause you to become off-balance.

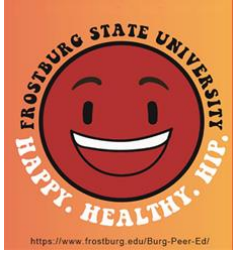
When you step on icy areas, take short, shuffling steps, curl your toes under and walk as flatfooted as possible. Spread your feet out slightly like a penguin to increase your center of gravity.

Many injuries occur when entering or exiting a vehicle. Be particularly careful and hold on to your vehicle to help support yourself.

Be sure you remove snow immediately, before it becomes packed down and turns to ice. Pay special attention to your porch stoops, steps, sidewalk and driveway by applying ice melt.

If you feel yourself starting to fall, try to avoid landing on your knees, wrists or back. Try to fall on a fleshy part of your body, such as your side. If you are able to relax your muscles when you fall, you may injure yourself less.
