



IN MEMORIAM: DR. EYAD YOUSSEF



In September 2021, the College of Business suddenly lost beloved faculty member, Dr. Eyad Youssef, Assistant Professor of Marketing, who came to FSU in Fall 2016. An excellent teacher-scholar and mentor to his students, Dr. Youssef truly distinguished himself in the area of service to the Department, College, and University. He was appointed by the Dean to serve as the MBA Program Coordinator in May 2018 and remained in the role until his death. Under Dr. Youssef's excellent leadership, the MBA program experienced some of its most notable improvements, which included the implementation of new concentrations in Business Analytics and Health Care Management, the transition from a 15-week to a 7-week delivery model, as well as the launch of post-baccalaureate certificate programs in Business Analytics, Health Care Management, and Management. He served on the University's Graduate Council and chaired the College of Business's Graduate Policy Committee. An avid innovator and experimenter by disposition, Dr. Youssef created a new course in Digital Marketing that is among the best subscribed courses in the Department of Marketing and Finance.

According to College of Business Dean, Dr. Sudhir Singh, "Anyone who knew and worked with Eyad will recall the purpose, positivity, and unfailingly gracious and pleasant demeanor he exuded. He made too many wonderful contributions to enumerate but, suffice it to say our community has suffered a devastating loss. Eyad leaves a void that will be difficult to fill."

Dr. Carol Gaumer, Marketing & Finance Department Chair at the time of his death, said, "I think of Eyad as genuinely kind, witty, and humble. He loved to learn new things and wasn't afraid to reimagine his courses or our programs. He was collaborative and supportive as a colleague and friend. He was a family man, immensely proud of his wife, Janie, and his five children. He always shared pictures and videos, saying he was the 'cool dad.' He was that and more."

Dr. Youssef was in the process of applying for tenure and promotion to Associate Professor at the time of his death and, as a heartfelt tribute to his legacy of service, University bodies at all levels unanimously have approved his application for such award posthumously.

The College continued its journey in Fall by responding to persistent pandemic-induced uncertainties – and some of the attendant fiscal consequences - with nimbleness and resolve. Some highlights follow --

First, on a sad note, the College suffered a major shock with the untimely demise of one of its most talented and dynamic teacher-scholars in Dr. Eyad Youssef early last semester. We mourn his loss as a community and will attempt to honor his legacy with a relentless pursuit of innovation in all that we do as a collegiate entity.

Reputationally, we are gratified to share that our MBA Program has been ranked in fifth place by the Baltimore Business Journal out of all programs offered by both public and private institutions in Maryland, and in the company of some of the State's flagship institutions.

Programmatically, the College's drive toward seeking interdisciplinarity in its programmatic growth continued with fervor, with the crafting of an interdisciplinary minor in Diversity Management in partnership with the Sociology department, and another minor in the area of Construction Management being developed in partnership with the Lifecycle Facilities Management Program.

In an ongoing effort to meet the needs of significant populations of working adults, the College has developed four new stackable certificate programs in the areas of: Crisis Leadership, Diversity Leadership, Human Resources and Telework Management, and Social Entrepreneurship. These programs await internal and external approvals. Likewise, new courses in the some of the topical areas of negotiation, health and wellness, business analytics, e-commerce, and the like are also being offered in Spring '22.

Toward student engagement and spreading new understandings of entrepreneurship and personal growth as well as adapting to the realities of telework, College faculty spearheaded two invited talks that were widely attended and appreciated. We will continue to offer new and impactful programming in the service of our students and the broader community. Another exemplar of engagement is the spirited new effort of Frostburg alumni to partner with us in mentoring current students and the launch of an Alumni Mentoring Program.

On a bittersweet note, the College bid a heartfelt goodbye to two of its longtime stalwart faculty leaders, Dr. William Anderson and Dr. David Kiriazis, both professors of Economics, with their retirement at the end of December '21. We thank them for their distinguished service at every level of the institution and wish them new joys and new successes as they embark on the next phase of their lives. We also eagerly await bringing in new faculty in the areas of Accounting, Economics, and Marketing disciplines with search processes underway.

These are times of immense uncertainty and change. As the College continues to embrace change in its march forward, we remain inspired by the inedible words of Charles Darwin: "It is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent that survives. It is the one that is most adaptable to change."

In closing, we thank all friends of the College of Business for the unwavering contribution of their time, treasure, and talent in helping the College advance to be all that it can be – in its service to its students, its faculty and staff, to the institution at large, and to the wider community.

GUEST SPEAKER MAKES ENCORE VISIT TO PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT CLASSES

In Spring 2020, pre-pandemic, students in Ms. Heidi Shadel's Professional Development I and II classes (MGMT 110 and MGMT 310, respectively) had the opportunity to hear from guest speaker, Mr. Damon Lester, president of the National Association of Automobile Dealers (NAMAD). At Frostburg's invitation, Mr. Lester made his second visit to the campus in October 2021 and presented to the two classes again in Dunkle Hall.

Mr. Lester shared with the students about his work with NAMAD, an industry organization committed to increasing equitable access for minority entrepreneurs and employees in the automotive retail sales, supplier, manufacturing, and service sectors. As president, he is responsible for membership outreach and recruitment, industry relations, dealership development, and government and media affairs.

He also spoke about the automobile industry being a key driver of the economy as well as the challenges the industry is currently facing with a decline in technicians in auto factories and dealerships. Finally, he touched

on the various innovations that manufacturers are making such as autonomous vehicles, increasing the levels of vehicle connectivity, with an eye to both increasing affordability to the customer and enhancing environmental sustainability.

The students had the opportunity to ask several questions and Mr. Lester was gracious to answer them as well as provide advice to the students regarding future career endeavors and internship

possibilities. Later in the day, Mr. Lester, accompanied by Mr. John Seaton, Area General Manager, Nissan Northeast Region, met with President Nowaczyk, Provost Mathias, and the three Deans to discuss collaborative possibilities. Opportunities for both internships and career prospects for Frostburg students with the Nissan corporation and auto dealerships were discussed, along with possibilities for project-based consulting for FSU faculty.

Gordon and Connor discussed many different issues with the attendees, including the importance of having a college education, possessing an entrepreneur mindset, effectively managing personal branding, and examining different ways to build influence. The event was well received as "engaging, thoughtprovoking, and impactful" by many participants, marking an excellent start to a proposed regular CoB speaker series, which aims to bring influential speakers to have meaningful dialogue on relevant topics with members of the FSU campus community.

Similarly, with an eye for providing some current best-practices to the FSU campus community, the College of Business Dean's Office, along with the CoB Student Engagement Committee, partnered with FSU's Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (ODEI) jointly hosted a second event on December 6, 2021. Mr. Jay Morwick presented a virtual session titled "The Future Workplace."

Morwick, an accomplished author and consultant for such organizations as the U.S. Patent and Trade Office (USPTO) and Internal Revenue Service (IRS), offered key insights from his research on how to better work from home and engage in remote work.

Given the overwhelming nature of the pandemic and the recent surge in the Omicron variant, Morwick believes that the traditional workplace is likely gone forever and impressed upon our students their need to be prepared to work virtually within decentralized arrangements. He also touched on how a new virtual normal can shape an organization's initiatives on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI).

In feedback gathered after the event, students shared their appreciation for the investment the College was making in keeping them current with best practices and notable trends. They also expressed a better understanding of the importance of staying connected in remote work arrangements. One student also reflected that she would definitely lead differently based on insights from this presentation.

Both events were unique and timely and reaffirmed the College's role in preparing our existing students, along with alumni, for continued success in the future.





Learn best practices from how leading companies are addressing hybrid and remote work as well as the diversity, equity, and inclusion issues related to a distributed workforce. COVID-19 has forced organizations to rethink how they work. The experience of the past 18 months showed that employees want more flexibility, while employers realized they are no longer restricted to local talent pools. Despite the promising opportunities, hybrid and remote models are fraught with challenges, including managing performance, collaborating at a distance, and maintaining a diverse, equitable and inclusive workplace.

Leaders in the "new normal" will need new competencies — and a different way of thinking — to be successful.

This online presentation is meant to better prepare our students for the workplace of the future.

VENEZIA COMPLETES SABBATICAL IN TAIWAN

Dr. Chiulien Venezia, Professor of Accounting, took a semester-long sabbatical leave to Taiwan during Fall 2021 and offered reflections on her experiences in her native country.

"I knew taking a sabbatical during a pandemic would be a challenge, but I have learned over the years, when faced with adversity, it is better to face the challenge than hide and wait another day. After going through an extensive quarantine, I began to arrange for meetings with our sister universities in Taiwan. Since I am a native Taiwanese, I hoped they would be more open to meeting and fostering a bridge between our two countries.

I first met with the faculty and Dean of Southern Taiwan University of Science and Technology. Their business school was awarded AASCB accreditation in 2017. Fortunately, they were holding their 17th Annual International Conference on Knowledge-Based Economy, November 25-26, 2021. Having taught there for twelve years prior to joining Frostburg State University, I got to network and greet fellow colleagues and introduce them to Frostburg. That afternoon, the Dean, Dr. Chou Te-Kuang, and I met privately to go over the plans for a possible 2+2 program, opportunities for exchange study and other ideas for building a relationship between our two schools. His initial reaction was favorable with more detailed conversations to follow.

On December 1, I visited National United University (NUU) and met with Dr. Hu, Vice President, Dr. Wu, Dean of Research and Development, and Dr. Chen, Dean of the College of Management. We discussed the possibility of renewal of the Memorandum of Understanding between NUU and FSU, which was initially signed in 2017, and would cover a 2+2 program and possible exchange study. We also discussed a possible 2+1 program for Frostburg's MBA. I also had the chance to meet with faculty and students that afternoon and present a PowerPoint presentation with Q&A introducing Frostburg State University and its programs."

In December 2021, The College of Business wished a warm, yet bittersweet, goodbye to two distinguished faculty colleagues in the Department of Economics. Dr. William "Bill" Anderson and Dr. David Kiriazis both retired after careers spanning over 20 years each with Frostburg State University.

During Dr. Anderson's 21-year tenure, he has proven to be an outstanding colleague, teacher, mentor, and friend to so many within the College community.

He served as MBA Program Coordinator in the 2012-13 academic year and led the increase in course offerings in the then, still new at the time, online modality at the Frostburg and Hagerstown locations. His writing ability was heavily relied upon in the CoB as he oversaw collecting data and writing the final self-study report that was submitted to AACSB for FSU's initial accreditation in 2005. He worked on the report for reaffirmation in 2010 and contributed to the most recent continuous improvement report, which resulted in reaffirmation of accreditation in 2020.

Bill has been an enthusiastic supporter of Frostburg's landmark partnership with Hunan University of Technology and Business (HUTB) in China, having traveled several times to Changsha to teach onsite as well as virtually.

Dr. David Kiriazis has been an outstanding colleague, teacher, and mentor in the Economics Department over the past two decades. David served as Chair of Economics for a remarkable 18 years! In the history of the department, no other Chair has served even a third of that duration. As Chair, he did so many things for the department. He represented the department at all the Open Houses and conducted all the transfer advising. He also chaired the Department Evaluation Committee, as well as several search committees for new hires in his department over the years.

Since 2015, David was instrumental in shepherding Frostburg's participation in the dual degree program with HUTB in China. He himself traveled several times to Changsha to teach onsite in China and, more recently taught virtually because of the pandemic. More generally, he led major staffing, logistical, curricular, and assessment efforts towards the success of this flagship international partnership.

Both dear colleagues will be greatly missed within the Economics Department, the College of Business, and the Frostburg State University campus community. Congratulations and our very best wishes, Bill and Dave!

ANDERSON INDUCTED INTO HIGH SCHOOL HALL OF FAME

This past October, the Baylor School (Chattanooga, TN) Class of 1971 celebrated its 50th high school class reunion and part of the festivities involved inducting former students into their Athletics Hall of Fame. Dr. Bill Anderson (ECON) was included in the 2021 prestigious group for his performance in Track and Field. Baylor included the following profile of him for the ceremony:

"In any discussion about distance running at Baylor, it seems that one name will be forever mentioned very early in the conversation. It is not an overstatement to call Bill Anderson ('71) the athlete that laid a foundation for the tradition of excellence in distance running that Baylor has been known for in the decades since his graduation.

A great cross-country runner, Anderson set numerous course records (including the McCallie course as a sophomore), was a Mid-South champion with a course record at St. Andrews in 1969 and was second at Baylor's first appearance in the TSSAA state meet in 1970.

Anderson's career on the track was even more remarkable as he set school records in the mile run in 1968, 1970, and 1971, the 880-yard run in 1970 and 1971, and the two-mile run in 1971. Those performances remained in the

Baylor record books until the midto late-1990s. He was a Mid-South champion in the mile and the 880 in 1970 and was third in the mile at the TSSAA state meet the following year.

At the University of Tennessee (UT), Anderson was part of SEC outdoor championship teams in 1973 and 1974, competing in the 880, the 1,000-yard run, the mile, the two-mile, and the three-mile run. In 1973, he set a UT record in the 1,000-yard run and was part of a two-mile relay team that won the SEC indoor championship and was runner-up at the NCAA indoor championships. He also went All-American that year. In 1974, his two-mile relay team won championships at the SEC indoor meet and the Penn Relays. UT also won the NCAA Outdoor Track Championship that year.

Anderson posted his best mile time in 1975, running a 4:03.3 for second place at the SEC outdoor championships. His career goal of breaking the four-minute mile was on track but was derailed by a back injury.

In addition to his bachelor's degree in communications earned at the University of Tennessee, Anderson holds an M.A. in Economics from Clemson University and a Ph.D. in Economics from Auburn University."

In December of 2020, several alumni from the Student Business Leadership Committee (along with the founding members of this group who originally came together to start a scholarship for the College of Business) had a casual reunion over a zoom call. As a result, the group reconnected to form the Student Business Leadership Council (SBLC). Their mission is to support networking and mentoring and create student-alumni connections for the College of Business so that students transition to their role as alumni with the desire and motivation to become volunteers and donors in support of the growth and success of the College of Business.

Ed Herold '83 of the FSU Alumni Association was invited to one of the first SBLC meetings as he was putting together a mentoring program as part of the efforts of the Student Outreach Committee of the Alumni Association. Seven out of the 10 mentors who volunteered were part of SBLC. Between the Alumni Board and the SBLC, the 10 alumni mentors were paired with 10 student leaders in CoB who were nominated by the faculty advisors of the various student organizations.

From the perspective of the Office of University Advancement, the SBLC

and its mentors represent the ideal structure for students to create a lifelong relationship with FSU. year and how they can connect with and meet the needs of the students as they prepare for a career. They have established a giving page with the FSU Foundation and have begun to raise funds in support of SBLC initiatives.
